Australia Post although a bit slow, has delivered my seeds and I can compare my vege seedlings with others on my phone.

My treat has been an occasional box of hot chips from Jean's shop.

I am glad that the hotel is now able to supply a limited menu of take away food. A phone call will have it ready when you go to collect it.

It was very surreal when I went for a walk at 10pm to collect the mail. I walked down the street and around the block and did not see a vehicle or any sign of a person. There were plenty of lights on but no person in sight. There is always a truck driving through town but not this time.

I had to go to Perth for emergency dental work. Drove straight to Craigie, doors propped open, no other patients at the time. Went to my sister's house and had lunch sitting around a large outdoor table. Visited my daughter, without getting out of the car and exchanged boxes. Went to Phil's daughters and picked up some things without going into her house and came home. When I got home I had a real feeling of elation- The highlight of my lockdown.

I am glad that I can feel free to go into a shop in Wickepin.

Garden Snippets.....

### Garden Bed Rejuvenation...

Do you have a garden bed that looks a bit shabby? Has it been neglected over Winter, or have the plants in it always failed to perform in it?

Well...It's Time for a MakeOver....

Remove Competition: Competition for water, light and nutrients can cause a garden bed to underperform. Removing weeds is the first task – You would be amazed at just "what" they will be stealing from your plants (water, light and nutrients), Plus they will be harbouring those "little pests and diseases" that jump onto your plants and cause misdemeanours. Your garden bed will look a million times better with all of the weeds gone.

Next – dig a spade depth around the edge of the garden bed to sever any feeder roots coming from nearby trees and shrubs. After that – assess whether these plants are also blocking light to your bed, and do a good prune of them if necessary.

If your lawn is invading your bed, install edging that sinks deep into your shovel dug trench – you can use concrete, rocks, posts etc., anything that is solid and has depth and weight that will assist in stopping lawn runners that creep in from deep underground, especially from lawns such as couch or kikuyu.

Revamp your Design: Now, Take a critical look at the bed to decide if maybe it is time for a complete re-design of plants. Often when plants are just thrown in without much thought the result is a mish-mash, So look at the combination of colours, shapes and form in the bed and remove anything that you don't like or doesn't belong.

Lastly – Look at the remaining plants to see if any have turned into "thugs" and are taking over. These you can prune, or divide as needed.

Water Issues: Garden beds commonly become "hydrophobic" (water repellent) so the plants don't receive proper watering regardless of how much water gets thrown at them. To test for this problem, first water the bed as normal and allow the water to drain away. Then lightly dig around the bed with a small shovel, rake or stick. If you find dry pockets then you will need to apply a wetting agent, and/or dig the soil over and incorporate some organic matter and aeration to correct the hydrophobic soil.

If the bed has the other problem of "Poor Drainage", then apply gypsum (if it's a clay soil) and build up the bed height by adding organic material and some sand. Consider laying drainage pipe under the soil around the bed to shuttle water away faster, or change your plantings to incorporate plants that love "wet feet".

Feeding plants and Soil: Improve soil structure and plant health by adding bulky organic material (manures and composts). Spread a good thick layer over the bed and lightly "turn it in". For really hungry plants, add some pelletised organic fertiliser and weekly applications of some liquid products to really get things charging along. All will provide valuable nutrients to your plants, and boost soil microbial activity, which, in turn, releases more nutrients to your plants, and adds to strong and healthy growth.

Test your Soil pH: Good soil is crucial to healthy plants, and most plants are happiest with pH around 6.5-7. Too far from this and the key nutrients become harder for the plants to absorb. If your soil pH is too acidic (or less than 6.5) then apply dolomite. If it is too alkaline (more than 7) then apply powdered sulphur. Test the soil again after one month, and repeat if necessary.

Littering and dumping of rubbish is prohibited. Penalties will be imposed if you are caught dumping your rubbish. These penalties are but not limited to the following:

# IN THE KITCHEN


### Roast loin of pork with apple compote

------ Serves 4-6

- One 1.75-kilogram bone-in pork loin roast (with thick layer of fat on top still intact)
- 2 tablespoons sea salt flakes, preferably Maldon
- + 2 garlic cloves, coarsely chopped
- 2 tablespoons fresh marjoram leaves, coarsely chopped apple compote
- 5 Fuji apples (about 750 grams total), peeled, cored and each cut into
- 8 wedges
- + 2 whole cloves
- + ¾ cup Calvados (apple brandy)
- + 2 teaspoons sugar (optional)

- 1. To prepare the pork: Position a rack on the bottom of the oven and preheat the oven to 240°C. Using a sharp knife, score the fat that covers the top of the pork. Rub the pork fat with the sea salt, garlic and half of the marjoram leaves. Place the pork on a rack set in a heavy roasting pan. Roast for 30 minutes. Then reduce the oven temperature to 180°C and roast the pork for another 45 minutes, or until an instant-read meat thermometer registers 70-75°C when inserted into the centre of the pork.
- 2. Remove the roasting pan from the oven and allow the pork to rest for 30 minutes before carving. Combine the pan juices from the roasting pan with the remaining marjoram leaves and set aside to keep warm.
- 3. While the pork is resting, prepare the apple compote: Combine the apples and cloves in a large heavy-based saucepan over medium to high heat, and stir for 3 minutes or until the apples just begin to soften slightly. Decrease the heat to medium-low. Add the Calvados and stir for 5 minutes, or until most of the liquid has evaporated. Cover the pan and cook the apples, stirring occasionally, for 8 minutes or until they are tender and most of the juices have evaporated. Remove the saucepan from the heat. Using a potato masher, coarsely mash the apples. If necessary, stir in the sugar to sweeten the compote slightly.
- 4. Thinly slice the pork on a cutting board, and arrange the pork slices on plates. Drizzle the pan juices, and any accumulated juices that have exuded from the pork while it was being sliced, over the pork slices. Spoon the warm apple compote alongside the pork, and serve.





### Peach and apricot sorbets with almond crisps

Preparation time 30 mins Cooking time 35 mins Serves 4

### **INGREDIENTS**

- 11/2 cups CSR LoGiCane Low GI Cane Sugar
- 3 cups water
- 4 white or yellow peaches, stone removed, roughly chopped
- 8 apricots, halved, stone removed, roughly chopped
- 2 eggwhites
- 1/2 cup CSR Brown Sugar
- 1 cup flaked almonds
- 2 Tbsp orange liqueur

### METHOD


- 1. Put sugar and water in a large saucepan over a medium heat and stir until sugar dissolves and mixture comes to the boil. Reduce heat to low and simmer for 10 minutes. Remove from heat and set aside to cool.
- 2. Put peach flesh in a food processor and process to make a smooth puree,

then transfer to a medium bowl, Rinse out food processor and repeat with apricot flesh. Transfer apricot puree to a separate medium bowl.

3. Divide sugar syrup evenly between

- two purees and stir to combine. Cover apricot puree and chill until needed. 4. Put 1 eggwhite in a large bowl and whisk, using an electric mixer, until soft peaks form. Fold through peach puree, then transfer to an ice-cream machine and churn following manufacturer's instructions. Spoon peach sorbet into a clip-lock container and freeze until ready to serve. Clean ice-cream machine and repeat with remaining
- 5. To make almond crisps, preheat oven to 180°C. Line an oven tray with baking paper. Combine brown sugar, almonds and liqueur in a bowl. Spread mixture over prepared tray in an even layer and bake for 15-20 minutes or until golden and crisp. Leave to cool, then break into shards. Serve a scoop of each sorbet with an almond crisp.
