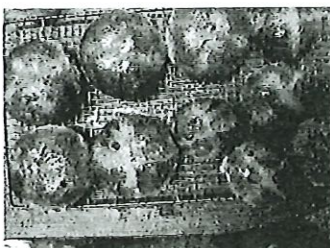

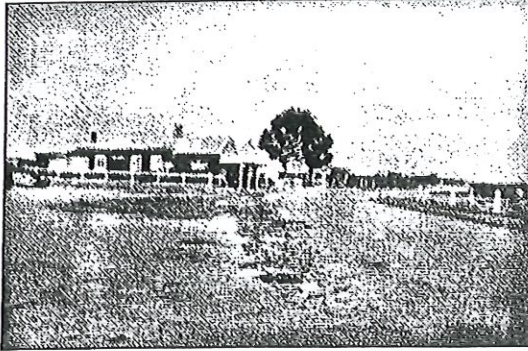

A Colourful History within the Shire of Wickpin: The Oasis Hotel.

In December 1926 Honor Waugh opened her boarding house, the Kia Ora Hostel, behind the site of the old shop. She operated the hostel until 1931. EMILY GRAY tells what it was like to work at the hostel.

KIA ORA Hostel opened in December 1926. I don't remember the exact date. I was scared stiff as I had never worked off a farm before and had heard such tales about commercial travellers, which all proved untrue. I never met one who said or did a thing that was not gentlemanly.

Mrs Waugh was only five years older than I, but well experienced in public life. We got along well together. I had a lifetime of experience with small children, and got on well with the three young Waughs.

If I remember rightly, we started with five regular boarders, namely Irene Parnell, who worked in the Post Office, Edna Smith, Jim Baxter from the Co-op Store, and Jim Beaty and George Kingshot during wheat lumping season.

In the shop attached to the hostel, we sold cool drinks, sweets and cigarettes. I liked the shop and had lots of fun there especially on Sunday afternoons when there was cricket or

football according to the season. We sold no alcohol, but there generally was plenty of 'Sly Grog' about and for special occasions 'The Heads' would get a special license to sell for a specified time in the shed behind the Hall, known locally as 'The Soak'.

The morning after the annual Agricultural Show, or some other important event, what sights we would see. Such as Mick Fury sitting on the back verandah praying to The Virgin Mary to take care of him, Mick Ryan wandering round continuously losing his matches, and Joe Kiesly coming to the kitchen door about every half hour, for "A bottle of loom and sodar". He was English.

One day Eleanor, who was then 5 ½ years old came crying from the side verandah: 'Mum, I sat down on some gentle Jesus.' Mrs Waugh, realising what had happened, sat down, turned her face down across her knees and commenced picking double gees out of her rear end. She was told they were double gees but for a long time persisted they were 'double Jesus'.

Each year when the wheat lumping season commenced, a big black cat came to live under the hall by day and roam the wheat stacks for mice at night. He was a gorgeous creature, more like a panther than a domestic cat, sleek and shining and moved with the grace of a jungle cat. Mr Whitford bought a white she cat for his wife and two daughters, and it was put in a shed at nights so that it wouldn't wander away.

Wheat carting season arrived and so did Panther. Got the scent of Snowy, with the usual result, a midnight serenade, which kept the Whitfords awake, and Mr Whitford shot panther and buried him in the scrub. About a fortnight later, with the temperature over 100°F in the shade, we couldn't find Stewart. Eventually (we) saw two small heads up in the low scrub. Mrs Waugh went to investigate and found Stewart and Leslie Whitford with a shovel, energetically digging to see if God had taken the cat up to heaven.

Mrs Waugh's mother came to Kia Ora to live and help with the cooking. In hot weather lots of brown blowflies used to come down the dining room chimney and end up on the inside of the kitchen wire door. One evening Ian was sitting by the door, catching blowflies, and pulling their wings off. Mrs Stewart grabbed the broom and started sweeping up crawling wingless flies, saying: "Bluey, you dirty boy, leave those blowflies alone." Ian was crawling round the floor gathering up his treasures, saying: "They are not blowflies Granny, I turned them into beetles."

Just before Agricultural Show day we tried to think of some thing different to sell on our stall. Decided to try toffee apples. The day before the show, bought several dozen small red apples, and wooden skewers, made a big pot of toffee and while I poked the skewers into the apples Mrs Waugh dipped them into the toffee and put them on flat trays covered with grease proof paper.

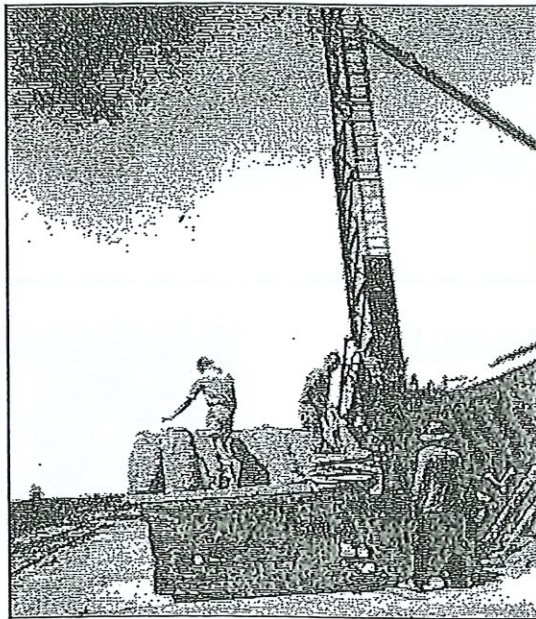
Next morning – tragedy – the toffee hadn't set properly. We decided to take them and by the end of the day many parents were 'blessing' us. "Mum, Dad, can I have a penny sticky apple". We sold them all.

Another incident I well remember, Arthur Harris was selling tomatoes for 2/- a case. Mrs Stewart decided to get two cases to make tomato sauce. The day the tomatoes came Mrs Stewart had to go to hospital with a large carbuncle on the back of her neck. The tomatoes ripened very quickly and Mrs Waugh decided we must do something about them or we would be in for it when Mrs Stewart came home. Neither of us had ever made tomato sauce, so got out the cook books, selected a recipe we thought we could manage and got started. Cut up the tomatoes into the big cast iron boiler, added the other ingredients called for and on top of the stove: Boiled for time stated in the book, carefully strained it through butter muslin and back into the boiler to boil again, but it would not thicken. The tomatoes had been too ripe. What to do next. Corn flour or gelatine were out. One of us suddenly thought "pie melon". It has very little flavour and good thickening qualities. We skinned and seeded 9 lb. of melon, put it through the finest cutter on the mincer and into the boiler. Half hour's boiling and – beautiful.

We cooled, bottled and sealed our tomato sauce. Mrs Stewart arrived home a few days later and while having a late cold lunch, said "I'll bet you two let those tomatoes go to waste". Mrs. Waugh answered "We made the sauce". "How did it turn out?" asked Mrs. Stewart. "Like to try some?" Mrs Waugh asked as she brought a bottle from the pantry.

Mrs Stewart pronounced it very good but said: "I've never seen tomato sauce with little lumps of jelly in it before." We both started to giggle.

She looked at us very suspiciously and demanded: "What have you two been up to". We told her the story and she said: "Well. I have never heard of melon in tomato sauce before but this has certainly been a success".

As time went on we received many compliments on our home made tomato sauce.

(Emily Gray worked at the Hostel for Mrs Waugh for five years in the 20s and early 30s. Emily came from Dudinin and it was 1982 when her brother, Tom Gray, passed away there. She married Ray Trimble. Eleanor Toy has the original copy of the above story.)

There is a ground plan of Kia Ora which is in the files at the Wickepin Shire.

Honor Waugh had the Kia Ora built and opened on December 13, 1926. In 1935–36 Harold and Clare Dare leased the building from Honor followed by Mrs Wilson, 1936, for a few years. It was then leased by Bob and Mary Stewart until 1945 or 46 when Honor sold out to Steve and Ruth Astbury who, in February 1962, changed it from the Kia Ora Hostel to the Oasis Hotel by adding the bar at the front.

Steve passed away in 1970 but Ruth continued, with a reputation for very good

meals, until 1998 when she passed away. Daughter June Worthington had returned a few years earlier to help and on the passing of her mother, took over the Oasis, selling to Russell and Judy Gray who, on June 1, 1999, settled in and commenced the changes that have been going on. The floors are all timber and have come up beautifully. The boarding house was well built in 1926 and has been brought to life again in 1999.

Emily Gray worked at Kia Ora from opening until 1931. Violet Stewart, aged 15, was there in 1928/29 and Charlie Wardrop worked at The Oasis in the 1980s.

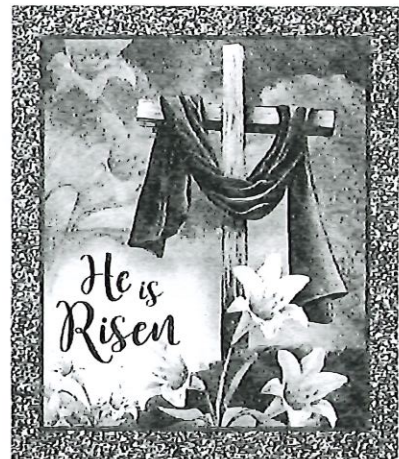

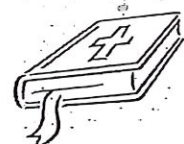

ASTROTOURISM – WICKEPIN & YEALERING

The Wickepin Astro Weekender was very well received. The Astro Photography session started in the Yealering Hall on Friday 01 April with a presentation by 'Mike' who went through the basics of using a DSLR camera to capture the night sky. After the presentation, the group congregated by the lake shore to set up their cameras and tripods. A number of children, who also came along, took advantage of asking some great questions and interacted with everyone. Mike and Riley were informative and entertaining. Some of the participants picnicked by the lake. Apart from some cloud cover, the conditions were perfect.

This was then followed by a "Stargazing" night at Wickepin Oval on the Saturday night. Four high tech (and impressive) telescopes were set up on the oval. There were three presenters from Astro Tourism, Mike and Riley joined us once again, along with Rob who volunteered for the evening and brought along a very large telescope which the children (and adults) were enthralled with. Astro Tourism brought along their lazer pointers and gave the spectators a tour of the sky. Both children and adults asked some fabulous questions and were entertained the entire time. We were very fortunate to have open skies directly above the oval.

The Friday night session attracted approximately 30 participants. A number of Yealering locals attended with approximately half of the participants travelling from Narrogin and Perth, bringing patronage to both the caravan park and the hotel.

Seafood For the Easter weekend: Easy As Pan Fried Australian Flathead with Lemon Yoghurt and salad

Ingredients:

BROAD BEAN AND FENNEL SALAD

500g frozen broad beans, cooked and lightly crushed
2 baby fennel bulbs, thinly sliced
2 tablespoons olive oil
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1 teaspoon crushed fennel seeds
¼ cup mint leaves
Sea salt and freshly cracked black pepper
Fresh lemon wedges to serve

LEMON YOGHURT

1 ½ cups Greek yoghurt
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 tablespoon lemon zest
2 teaspoons chopped mint leaves

FLATHEAD

8 x 100g Australian Flathead fillets – we've used fillets with the skin-on, but skin-off works too
2 tablespoons olive oil - Knob of butter - Sea salt

Double Choc Walnut Brownies With Caramel Cream

These easy Easter brownies are rich and full of chocolaty goodness. Serve them warm with the caramel cream for a decadent Easter dessert!

BROWNIES

Ingredients

150g brown sugar
150g caster sugar
60g cocoa powder
50g plain flour
1 tsp baking powder
180g Butter, melted
3 eggs, beaten
100g dark chocolate, roughly chopped
75g walnuts, roughly chopped
75g white chocolate, melted
18 mini speckled Easter eggs

Method

Preheat oven to 170c. Line a 20cm square cake tin with baking paper
Whisk the sugars, cocoa, flour and baking powder together in a large bowl. Beat in the butter and eggs. Fold in the dark chocolate and walnuts until evenly distributed



Method:

BROAD BEAN AND FENNEL SALAD

Kick things off by prepping the broad bean and fennel salad: add all the ingredients to a bowl, season, and toss to combine. Ta da, the salad's done!

LEMON YOGHURT

To make the zesty lemon yoghurt: combine the ingredients in a bowl and give it a stir

FLATHEAD

Now for the main event – the fish! Pat the flatty fillets dry with absorbent paper and heat a large non-stick pan over a medium-high heat. Toss in the olive oil and a knob of butter, wait for the butter to bubble, then add the fish, in batches, skin side down and cook for 4 minutes. Flip it and cook for another 1-2 minutes. Now it's showtime. Place the flatty fillets on a plate, add some salad and a dollop of your lemon yoghurt. Done. Easy peasy lemon squeezy.

Pour into the prepared tin and add the white chocolate in spoonfuls, creating a swirly effect with a teaspoon

Bake for 35 minutes. It should still be a little squidgy inside. While still hot, gently press the Easter eggs into the top of the brownie. Allow to cool in the tin for 10 minutes, then remove and cut into 9 pieces

CARAMEL CREAM

Ingredients

300ml Thickened Cream
2 tbsp store-bought caramel sauce

Method

For the caramel cream, whisk the cream into soft peaks. Gently fold the caramel sauce into the whipped cream to create a rippled effect. Eat the brownies warm or at room temperature with a dollop of caramel cream

Tips & Hints

Try substituting walnuts for macadamias or pecans. Or omit completely for a nut-free version.

You can swap the dark chocolate with milk chocolate for a less intense cocoa hit.

Garden Snippets...



...New Generation Geraniums

Geraniums, botanical name Pelargonium, have a bit of a reputation for being "old-fashioned" and looking rather scrappy. However with so many exciting hybrid varieties - including those with scented, variegated, multishaped and sized leaves, and those that stay in compact form and flower for longer - the humble "dunny bush" is fast earning new admirers. Needless to say, the geraniums do still need a bit of help to keep them looking fabulous, but it is worth the effort as they are great gap fillers and provide splashes of colour amongst other garden plants and in pots. Here's How:

At the Nursery: Choose well branched, compact plants that show new growth, healthy roots and plenty of new flower buds. Avoid tall, stretched plants with yellow foliage and brown roots – they rarely come good.

At home-Keep moist until planting, and keep in a bright spot out of direct sunlight until you can plant it. Geraniums stored any longer than two days in dark/low light will drop their new buds and turn yellow, and will take about a month to pick up again.

Planting-Geraniums love sunlight. Plant where they can get about six hours of full sun every day, but where is also protected from hot afternoon sun. Have a well drained site with some manure or compost dug in. In pots, use a good quality potting mix.

Watering-Water straight after planting. Strangely, geraniums don't wilt like other plants so they don't give any clues as to when they need to be watered. They like moist soil but also like to dry out between waterings to avoid root-rot, so the soil should become dry to touch before you water the plants again. Avoid watering the foliage.

Fertilising-Geraniums need regular feeding to produce abundant and large flowers, larger leaves and good healthy growth.

Pruning-Removing old flowers and leaves keeps the bushes healthy and promotes longer flowering. Tip-pruning constantly produces new growth and keeps the bushes compact and dense. In March or April, cut them back by one third to generate lots of new growth. Use these cuttings to propagate new plants for yourself or your friends.

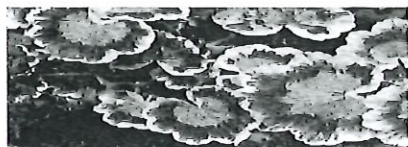
Hybrid Geraniums thrive in sunny, dry spots; form tight compact shrubs, many of which self clean (so the flowers fall off when they die); and are ideal for pots or look fabulous in a cottage or perennial garden. They can be divided into three separate varieties:

Zonal geraniums - distinguished by circular bands of colour on light green leaves that are round to kidney shaped. They have low bushy habit and heads of brightly coloured flowers during warmer months.

Regal Geraniums - have frilled flowers in spring that look rather like Azaleas. The leaves are distinctive with a serrated edge and three lobes, flowers range from white to black.

Ivy-Leafed Geraniums - flower from spring to autumn in clusters of white, pink, red, magenta and purple blooms. Their habit ranges from compact miniatures to sprawling scramblers, and they are ideal for hanging baskets.

Scented Geraniums are usually grown for their foliage which comes in all shapes and sizes. Crush their leaves between your fingers and you can smell peppermint, lime, rose, ginger, nutmeg, orange, cinnamon, apple, sweet lemon – and the list goes on! Flowers appear mainly in Spring and Summer, and the bushes just need good drainage to thrive. They can grow in semi shade, and if they are planted next to a path or the washing line the scents will be released as the leaves are touched. The leaves of the Scented Geraniums are edible, so they can be infused as herbal teas; used in sauce flavourings, or placed into the pot when stewing fruit to add flavour.
