Eulogy For Peter Elson

Peter Thomas Elson was born at Wickepin Hospital on the 16th October 1928, youngest of 6 children(3 deceased) to Charles and Elsie. He passed away peacefully at the age of 94 on 24th July 2023.

Dad was a **loving husband** to Lesley for 71 years, **father to 7**, Ray, Ric, Beth, Sue, Doug, Tim & Terri, **Grandad to 17**, Sam, Adam, Amanda, Tegan, Brendan, Sarah, Rohan, Andrew, Carolyn, Tracy, Brie, Caris, Callum, Rhys, Clare, Gemma & Bryn, **Great Grandad to 27**, Brodie, Ken, Campbell, Georgia, Ruby, Bodhi, Jesse, Jake, Rivah, Lucy, MacKenzie, Asher, Jasmine, Cadence, William, Lucas, Matthew, Levi, Tyler, Jazlyn, Maddox, Harry, Charlie, Rafferty, Halle, Augie & Ned and **Great Grandad** to Kingston.

Dad started school at the age of 4. He went to Toolibin school where he recalled walking 2 miles through the bush to the little one teacher school with his sister, Marjie. Sometimes they would get a lift with a neighbour in her horse and cart, a real treat. In the history of the school, there was a couple of entries saying Dad was absent from school as he was required at home for shearing. This was when he was 10 & 11 years old. Life was tough in those days and money was short. He would tell us that when he got home from school he had chores to do and one of those was trapping rabbits. They would sell the meat and skins and more often than not, they would eat them. Once Dad had a choice of what he ate, he never touched rabbit again. Dad remembered fondly of the time spent with his parents at social tennis each weekend of summer in Toolibin. When the family moved to Dorakin, Dad attended Wickepin school. During the war, Dad spoke of having to dig trenches for protection just in case they were needed. He left school to work the farm with his Dad for a few years as Ralph had enlisted and his dad needed help. This is where he learnt to handle a team of horses. Dad went to the Narrogin Ag School for 2 years. The school had a dairy farm where all cows were milked by hand. Dad opted to do the milking as he was really fast at it, having had plenty of experience at milking on the family farm. He said it got him out of doing the other dirty or mundane chores in this area. He was an intelligent child whose best subject at school was Maths. He told the story that at one stage he had to teach the maths teacher how to do a particular math problem because the teacher didn't know how to do it. Dad achieved dux of the school.

After school Dad went shearing and carting then he bought a seed cleaning business, the Hannaford Grader. When Ralph had finished harvesting Dad would berrow his truck and go out to farms to get work. This left Ralph and his Mum without any transportation on the farm. So he decided to go to Perth with his friend Errol to buy them a car to use while he had the truck. They happened to meet an associate of Errol's who enquired why they were in Perth. Dad explained his plan. Uncle Errol's associate advised Dad to buy his own truck instead of the car and offered to lend him the extra money he needed to do this. So Dad went home the proud owner of his own truck. He was so surprised when he got home that his Mum was absolutely furious with him. She didn't think he would be able to repay the loan ... but this was the start of his own successful trucking business. And he did repay the debt. He was always grateful for the faith and opportunity this man had given him. Dad and Ray Halliday held the record for the most amount bags they could load onto the truck in a certain time which I don't think was ever broken to this day.

Dad and Mum married on 20th October 1951 and Dad decided to reduce his truck driving while also working as a farm hand around the district. Then in 1956 they were lucky to have a bank manager willing to back their endeavour to buy Cam Agar's farm west of Yealering, "Ben Lomond" and moved his young family there in Feb of that year. Over the next few years the family grew to 7 children. Later Dad was able to purchase adjoining land, part of Lillystones farm and then Sid James' farm thus ending up with a reasonable sized holding.

Dad would start his morning early by lighting the wood stove, putting on some porridge to cook, firing up the lighting plant for electricity to the house and going to milk the cows. Then he'd come home to stir the porridge and stoke the fire before going to feed the pigs. He'd then get home to cooked porridge, a boiling kettle and the family getting up ready for breakfast. He said he couldn't wait for Ray and Ric to be old enough to help him. Ric took over milking the cows when he was nine until he went off to boarding school at 12. Dad started teaching the two older boys to drive really early too. One day us younger siblings were out the front and heard the truck coming slowly up the driveway tooting the horn. Dad had stuck the truck in 1st gear and Ray and Ric were in the cab with Dad nowhere to be seen. As they got to the house there was panic as Dad had forgotten to tell them how to stop the truck! Mum came running out to rescue them but by the time she got anywhere near the truck it had been steered into a solid object ... the big fencepost. This had stopped the truck and no child, vehicle or fence was damaged in the process. All of us got to learn how to drive in that truck helping dad feed the sheep was our chance to hone our driving skills while providing dad with much needed help on the farm. A win-win situation. When Dad didn't have any helpers to feed the sheep, he would stick the truck into 1st gear, jump on the back, feed out the hay, then get back in the cab and drive to the next paddock. Many years later, Ric bought home an automatic ute which Dad decided to use one day to feed a mob of sheep. He did his usual thing of putting the ute in gear and then hopping on the back to feed out the hay. Unfortunately, he put the ute in drive and when it got to a downward slope of the land it started to gather speed and change up gears. It was heading straight for the fence at a great speed of knots. He still doesn't know how he did it, but Dad managed to scramble into the cab of the ute and stop it before it careered through the fence. Another lucky escape...

Dad had a really strong work ethic. Some times of the year were busier than others and with no spare funds to hire outside help, this meant dad worked some VERY long hours. During seeding he would often be up all night driving the tractor around and around the paddock. Stopping often to fill the combine with heavy bags of wheat and super. He would rug up with a woollen hat, scarf and said he was so grateful to have not one, but two of Uncle Ralph's army great coats to try to keep warm on those freezing cold nights. He would then catch a couple of hours sleep before heading out again to do the daytime chores. Thankfully, these busy times were of short duration.

Dad was very stoic, not one to complain. He never liked to be a nuisance. But one day a pain in his side got too much and he came home and asked Mum to drive him into Narrogin hospital. A 1 hour drive away. All us kids were piled into the station wagon for the journey. But before we went, there was one last chore Dad needed to do. There was a

cow stuck in the mud in one of the dams. So we stopped off at the dam and he threw ropes around her and we helped to drag her out of the mud. Then the fast journey into Narrogin with Dad groaning in the front seat and us kids in the back seat feeling really scared because it wasn't like Dad to be sick and in pain. We got to within 5 miles of Narrogin before we had to stop. Dad got out and vomited and all us kids then had to scramble into the boot or the front seat of the wagon while he lay down in agony on the back seat. Turned out he had appendicitis and his appendix had just burst. His reluctance to ask for help stayed with him all his life. HE WAS ALWAYS A FIERCELY INDEPENDENT MAN. He was also humble, a person who didn't seek the limelight, just went quietly about doing his best in whatever he was doing. As mentioned, he had a strong work ethic and he passed this quality onto all of us and we in turn have passed this onto the next generation.

Dad was a keen sportsman. He played tennis in summer, football in winter, and in later years bowls, being the greenkeeper at Yealering for over 20 years. When his body was no longer able to play football he turned his hand to goal umpiring. He encouraged his sons to play footy and often transported their friends to the games as well. On weekends during summer Dad played pennant tennis on Saturdays and social tennis on Sundays. Mum watched all the game and us kids swam in the lake coming home covered with midgie bites. **Boy did they itch.** Even when Dad took up bowls he managed to master this sport very quickly bringing home many trophies.

Dad was awarded Life Membership at the Yealering Football Club in 1969, Yealering Tennis Club in 1972 and Lake Yealering Bowling Club in 2001.

Dad loved his dancing, attending the local dances right here in this hall. It was lovely to watch him swish around the dance hall amongst the weeties scattered on the floor. He was a really smooth and stylish dancer and a much sort after partner. Meanwhile us kids ran amuck or slept in the back of the station wagon and Mum was preparing supper in the kitchen.

Christmas was always important family time. In the early days we would alternate between Uncle Ralph, Aunty Marjie and our farm spending time with our country cousins. In later years as the family grew and grandkids starting arriving, Christmas was always spent at the family farm. Dad loved sitting out on the verandah watching the annual family cricket game on the lawn and often participating in it.

For many years Dad would take a break at the end of harvest and we would holiday in a tiny 2 bedroom house, all 9 of us, at 40 Carlisle Street Safety Bay. It was very important to both Dad and Mum that we all learnt to swim, hence why we were able to swim unsupervised at the lake. Every year we had swimming lessons in Rockingham amongst the jellyfish, the occasional blue bottle and lots of seaweed. We remember having our city cousins visiting, eating watermelon out the back and having watermelon seed spitting competitions to see who could spit the furthest. Our big treats while on holidays were to occasionally have a shop bought Neapolitan ice cream block (that did not go far when 9 of us had to share it) and Dad would walk with us to pick up fish and chips from the little shop around the corner a couple of times over the 3 weeks.

Dad was very community minded. In 1966 the local progress association and community felt the need to form a Bush Fire Brigade. The driving force for this to happen was Dad, John Hiller and Doug Hill who sought donations of \$10 from the local farmers to purchase a suitable fire truck. The surrounding Shires also contributed. Some other organisations Dad belonged to were the Farmers Union and P&C.

Dad joined St John Ambulance in 1978 and was one of the 1st four first aiders in the voluntary service in the Yealering Sub Centre. He was made a Commandery member by St John Ambulance for 20 years of service to the community. Dad was lucky enough to be chosen to attend the Golden Jubilee Anniversary of the Singaporean St John Ambulance Association competition held in Singapore in 1984. The men team came home victorious and the women's team came second. Because of this amazing achievement they were invited to go to Parliament House for a luncheon. What an honour.

After 30 years of marriage in 1982 Dad and Mum were able to start spending some time exploring the world as Ric was looking after the farm. They embarked on the Womens Weekly World Tour for 3 months. The family, including grandkids were so excited for them that we all trooped down to Fremantle to wave them off on the Princess Cruise ship. This was the start of their many travels to different countries of the world.

Dad loved caring for the land. With the loss of vital vegetation he started to go around and collect seeds from existing trees on the farm and set up a tree nursery where he germinated hundreds of seedlings including salt bush which was important to treat the encroaching salinity on the farm. During the school holidays he would often recruit the grandkids to help him plant out the salt bush. This was never a chore for them as they loved spending time with Grandad.

When Dad was no longer able to participate in his beloved sports, he gained great pleasure out of watching it on TV. Minus all those "BLOODY ANNOYING ADVERTS" as he would put it. He was a staunch supporter of Subiaco Football Club, Carlton Football Club and then when the MIGHTY WEST COAST EAGLES joined the AFL in 1987, he became a ONE EYED SUPPORTER, literally, of the EAGLES. Not that they have brought him much joy this year, but he still remained very loyal.

Dad was always there when we needed him. Whether it was for a shoulder to cry on, some sage advice, someone to bounce ideas off or simply an ear to listen.

He had an amazing connection with the grandkids. He would try and have one on one conversations with them all to find out how they were going. Usually, this was in the ute as they go around the farm.

Dad always had a love of the land and his animals. After a long stint in hospital in Perth he was driven straight back to the farm on his release to jump into his ute with the dog on the back and head out into the paddocks.

HOPEFULLY WHERE EVER HE IS GOING, THERE WILL BE A UTE AND A DOG WAITING.

The Shire of Wickepin local government election will be held on Saturday 21 October, 2023.

Could you be a future Shire Councillor?

Local Government ordinary elections are held on the third Saturday in October every two (2) years.

As a Councillor you would be involved in running an organisation with the responsibility of making decisions that have a major impact on our lifestyle. As a representative of your community you will find the role enjoyable, challenging and stimulating with involvement in matters as diverse as recreation, the environment, town planning, health, roads and much more. Meeting fees, travel and IT expenses are paid.

Nominations open on **31** August **2023** to fill three (3) vacancies within the Shire of Wickepin.

Any person who is an Australian Citizen over the age of 18 years who is an elector of the district and is not disqualified under the *Local Government Act 1995* may nominate for council.

Councillors are elected for terms of four years in Western Australia. Elections are held every two (2) years for half of the council, and candidates are elected using operational preferential voting. If a vacancy occurs within a term, an extraordinary election is held.

Nominations close on **7 September 2023** and must be lodged with the Returning Officer at any time during the voting period by arrangement.




Adult Fiction: Tom Clancy Flash Point - Don Bentley



Every operation has a cost. This time the bill might just be too much to pay.

A fantastic time was had by all, and we're looking forward to a repeat performance soon.





Orange syrup

1/3 cup water

1 cup caster sugar

2/3 cup orange juice

Orange and poppy seed syrup cake

Ingredients:

1/3 cup poppy seeds

1/4 cup milk

185 g butter, softened

1 tablespoon finely grated orange rind

1 cup caster sugar

3 eggs

1 1/2 cup self-raising flour

1/2 cup plain flour

1/2 cup ground almonds

1/2 cup orange juice

Method:

Combine seeds and milk in a small bowl; stand for 20 minutes.

Preheat oven to 180°C. Grease a deep 22cm round cake tin, line base and side with baking paper.

Beat butter, rind and sugar in a small bowl with an electric mixer until light and fluffy; beat in eggs, one at a time. Transfer mixture to a large bowl; using a wooden spoon, stir in sifted flours, ground almonds, juice and poppy-seed mixture. Spread mixture into pan; bake about 1 hour.

Meanwhile, make orange syrup: using a wooden spoon, stir ingredients in a small saucepan over heat, without boiling, until sugar dissolves. Bring to the boil; reduce heat, simmer, uncovered, without stirring, for 2 minutes.

Leave cake in pan for 5 minutes before turning, top-side up, onto a wire rack set over a tray. Pour hot syrup over hot cake; serve warm.

Moist lemon cake

Ingredients:

250g butter, chopped, at room temperature

1 cup caster sugar

1 tbsp finely grated lemon rind

4 eggs

1 2/3 cups self-raising flour

100ml fresh lemon juice

Icing

1 1/4 cups icing sugar

1 tbsp lemon juice, plus extra if needed

Finely grated lemon rind to sprinkle, optional

Method:

Preheat the oven to 180C/160C fan forced. Grease a 20cm (base size) round cake tin. Line the base and side with baking paper.

Use electric beaters to beat the butter, sugar and lemon rind in a bowl until pale and creamy. Add the eggs, 1 at a time, beating well after each addition until well combined.

Use a spatula to fold the flour into the butter mixture until almost combined. Add the lemon juice and fold into mixture until just combined. Transfer to the prepared pan. Smooth the surface.

Bake for 50 minutes or until golden and cake springs back when lightly touched. Set aside in pan for 10 minutes to cool slightly before transferring to a wire rack to cool completely.

To make the icing, sift the icing sugar into a bowl. Add 1 tbsp lemon juice and stir until combined. Spread over the cooled cake and sprinkle with the lemon rind, if using. Set aside for 2 hours or until icing sets.

Garden Snippets...



...Phabulous Photinias

Photinia is a fast-growing, evergreen shrub or small tree from 2m to 6m high that produces bright-red to bronze-red new growth each spring. Photinia belongs to the Rose family which, apart from roses, also includes apples, pears, and many berry fruits. Known simply as "photinia", this shrub may sometimes be called "red-tip". They are often multi-trunked, which makes them perfect for hedging, and regular winter pruning will improve this display. On shrubs that are not pruned back there will appear dense heads of small, creamy-white flowers in early to mid spring which have a strong, not terribly pleasant smell.

How to grow photinia:

Photinia is very robust and thrives in most soils provided the drainage is good, suits climates from sub-tropical to cold and will thrive in most situations from part shade to full sun.

For Hedging, plant 60-80cm apart (the closer they are, the quicker they fill gaps to create the hedge). Allow them to grow a full season before you start clipping to create your hedge shape. Trim sides as well as the tops to avoid the hedge becoming too wide. Trim every 4-6 weeks to create a "formal" hedge. If you want a more "informal" look, trim the top but allow the sides to grow more naturally.

Photinias tolerate quite hard pruning, although this may leave your shrubs looking a little worse for wear for several months! If your hedge or shrub has grown out of control it can be severely dealt with by cutting down to within 15cm of ground level. Stumps will respond by sending out multitudes of new shoots in order to survive, and in two to three months, a dense mass of coloured leaves should completely camouflage the devastation you caused. However, this is not ideal, and photinias will behave far better if pruned on a regular basis from an early age, where both height and spread can be proportioned by simply running a cordless hedge trimmer over the sides and top every 4-6 weeks from spring to autumn. Each time you will be rewarded with a new flush of brightly coloured young shoots.

Watering and Feeding:

Once established, Photinia needs very little attention. Only water when absolutely necessary, during very hot, dry spells or prolonged periods of drought. Photinia has strong roots that grow down deep in search of moisture.

Photinia appreciate an annual application of all purpose fertiliser at the start of spring, which will keep the plants healthy and growing strongly. Compost or well-weathered animal manures may also be applied as a mulch over the roots to provide a little extra nourishment.

Diseases and Pests

Photinia is not greatly troubled by diseases or pests when it is vigorous and well maintained. However, powdery mildew and fungal leaf spot can an issue, similar to other members of the rose family. Just have good drainage and reasonable air circulation to prevent diseases and use a general purpose fungicide if necessary.



Facey Group Update

Does Amelioration Affect Nodulation in Lupin Crops?

After a favourable start to the growing season, lupin crops at our Soil Amelioration & Lupin Nodulation trial site are up & flourishing. This project is part of RiskWi\$e, an initiative conducted in partnership with grower groups, six action research group leads, research/extension partners, CSIRO and GRDC.

Facey Group are leading the RiskWi\$e research at this trial, investigating if different soil amelioration techniques alter the rate at which nodulation occurs in lupins. Facey Group staff are now digging up some lupins to begin nodulation assessments. The team will measure crop biomass, yield and soil nitrogen levels prior to the cereal crop that will be going in next year.

Diamond Back Moth Surveillance is Underway!!

Diamondback Moth surveillance is well underway in the Facey Group catchment area.


Facey Group is working on a GRDC funded project led by DPIRD that is hoping to catch early season risks of infestations due to the unpredictable dynamics of Diamondback Moth populations.

Agricultural Projects Coordinator, Kaitlyn, has been out checking traps and sweeping crops fortnightly to monitor numbers within the area. Numbers are still considered low and very few caterpillars have been detected across all monitoring sites.

New Acid Tolerant Rhizo Perfect Match for New French Serradella

Facey Group is participating in a new project looking at improving soil carbon and soil health using Plant-Based Solutions. Funded by DPIRD and SoilCRC, and led by WANTFA and Murdoch University, the project is in its second year at Bullaring. The team are looking at new approaches, such as using perennial legumes, ley-farming, and innovative cropping system options that could ameliorate deep sands by raising soil organic matter and improving soil performance.

Clay, Bednar, and interrow sowing of vetch treatments are showing promising results in lupin plots, with elevated biomass compared to the lupin plots that had no additional treatments. This site also includes Fran2.0, a novel French Serradella. Fran2.0 was sown with new acid-tolerant rhizobia and is showing impressive nodulation formation. There is a lot to look at in this trial so make sure you keep an eye out for the field walk coming up on September 7th
