COUNCIL NOTES



02 OCTOBER 2023

Restricted Burning Period

The restricted burning season commenced on the 1 October 2023 and goes through to 13 November 2023.

This means no burning can be carried out unless you have a permit from your local Fire Control Officer.

A full list of Fire Contract Officers can be found on the shire website.

Harvest Ban Alerts

The SMS (text) alert service will again be in operation over the coming harvest/bushfire period.

If you would like to register your number to receive these messages or have your number removed from the system, please contact the office or email your details to admin@wickepin.wa.gov.au.

Bush Fire Uniforms

Bush fire uniforms and personal protective goggles and respirators for Volunteer Bush Fire Brigade officers are available from the shire administration office, with one free uniform per registered brigade volunteer.

You MUST be registered with a brigade to receive a uniform.

Townsite Properties

In the coming weeks Shire Officers will be inspecting all townsites within the Shire of Wickepin and will be issuing notices to residence of unsightly properties.

This includes but is not limited to long grass, motor vehicles, general rubbish, etc. Failure to comply with these notices will result in the land owner being issued with a fine.

Parking - Obstructing Shire Footpaths

The Shire has received a number of complaints from residents regarding vehicles parking on footpaths, to the point where footpaths are completely obstructed or impassable by pedestrians.

Footpaths provide pedestrians with a safe alternative to walking on roads. Parking vehicles on and blocking any portion of a footpath, including the crossover, could force pedestrians onto the road. For people with prams, disabilities or young children if forced onto the road places them in danger.

The Shire would like to remind residents not to obstruct footpaths and be mindful of pedestrians' access.

Dog Control

Council has recently received a number of complaints in relation to roaming dogs. It is an owners responsibility to keep their dog limited to their properly unless being walked on a leash.

The Dog Act requires all dogs to be registered with the shire if it is three (3) months or older. The registration period is 1 November to 31 October, registration renewals for 2023/2024 will be issued soon.

All dogs must be microchipped before registration. Copies of microchipping papers must be provided on registration.

All dogs found roaming will be impounded and the owners fined. For the release of an unregistered dog the registration must be paid along with the fine.



Eulogy for Olivia

Olivia Dawes was born Olivia Esther Jane Hull in Cottesloe on 29th May 1932. Olivia was wife to Bill for 65 years, and a loved sister, mother, aunt, grandmother great grandmother, mother in law and friend.

Growing up in Cottesloe and then Mosman Park, Olivia lived with her parents Olivia and Philip Hull, and sisters Anna, Thelma and Ivy. Older brother Georgie passed away three months before Olivia was born. We are disappointed that Ivy can't be with us today, but we know we will be in her thoughts.

Olivia's early years included the Depression and WWII. These world-wide events meant their Dad went away from home for work and there were air-raid practises at school. In everyday life the family were very much at home in the neighbourhood, walking or riding to shops, the beach and the river where a favourite place was the Nook. The sisters shared many adventures which often seemed to include getting dumped at the beach, a wayward dog and falling off bikes. Photos and stories from this time show some developing interests – cooking, family and craft and the family saying "plenty of time there goes the bus" and know better next time emerged.

Olivia loved school, although her school memories were more like tales from Matilda than the classrooms she would go on to create. The teacher who had the wooden leg of a chair to keep order must have been terrifying. Olivia went on to Perth Modern School and Claremont Teachers' College to fulfil her dream of being a teacher.

As a young woman, Olivia ventured far from her family base when she went monitoring and teaching in the Wheatbelt. Her first teaching posting was to Wongan Hills and then Yealering, where as well as following her love of teaching she met and married Louis John Dawes (Bill) in 1958. They went on to raise their five children: Russell, Maree, Terry, Tim and Whippy on Rutherglen the family farm. Olivia and Bill were rarely apart and when they were they talked on the phone every day. Olivia moved to Karinya in Narrogin in 2021where she met up with old friends and made many new ones.

91 years is a great age, but scarcely seems enough for all the living Olivia packed in. Olivia took a traditional wife of the 1950's role and supported the growing family, farm business and sheep stud by running the household. Initially she had lamps, a wood stove, a kero fridge, a well and rain water tanks. She kept up three meals a day including cooked breakfasts, dinner and tea, and morning and afternoon tea as well. Mum used the Irish name for meals with Dinner being the midday meal and Tea the evening one, both of these always included desserts, or sweets as we called them. Workers including my cousin Vin would come to stay for seeding, and also need meals, as did the shearing teams who needed their smoko and dinner right on time, with smoko delivered to the shed. Agents and prospective buyers would also drop in, and I'm sure they timed it so they would be at Rutherglen just in time to be asked to lunch – with no warning for the cook. Once the kids were at school packed lunches were added to the mix. It's hard to remember that early on they usually had one trip a week to Yealering for groceries and the fridge only had a freezer which would take a few ice trays.

Hence tinned peas and some annoyance when the children ate the whole loaf of bread which was sent on the school bus while they walked home from the gate. Olivia prioritized cooking and time with children. She also enjoyed dressmaking and knitting and there was a lot of clothes mending to do. She was often off looking at pigeons, pigs or whatever a child's latest interest was. There were trials – children who stayed out mushrooming after dark, pigs that dug up the pansies, children who cooked odd birds in her oven and fires that got away.

Olivia loved Bill and the farm, but also loved travel. She connected with family in Ireland and went on a trip to Ireland and England, wore her feet out in Singapore, walked with the parrots in Binnaburra, loved the mountains in New Zealand and the beach at Yallingup. Olivia and Bill had several years when they combined the business of buying rams with a visit to Joan and Stan in Cooma. She took the children to stay with her sisters, their aunts and later visited those of her children and grandchildren who lived away from the farm including many trips to Rottnest. In one early adventure with Ivy they went to the NT together by small plane which included an emergency landing and a very delayed return.

Olivia's rural life expanded to include painting, writing and reading as well as a return to teaching as a Preschool and relief teacher which she loved. Olivia was involved in the Yealering Community through the P and C, the Guild and writing and reading groups and she made many lifelong friends, some of whom are here today. Her writing Group published an anthology and Olivia's own book is called Olivia her life in words.

Not a sporty type, Olivia did take up walking in her middle years, and had several paths around the farm for a daily walk. Later when the AFL included the Eagles she loved watching games on TV with Bill and they often watched repeats together if the team did well. She then took up footy tipping was successful in the town competition including winning. She didn't rely on advice from family members but carefully read up on post-game reports and the form every week before sending in her selections.

Never far from contact with extended family and friends she kept in contact through letter writing and long phone calls. Olivia and Bill also welcomed family, friends and their children's friends to their home for meals and extended stays. Olivia took Bill's family to her heart so there were many in laws and nieces and nephews to keep in contact with. When she and her sisters got together there was so much to say. They loved talking about "the olden days" and would often bring along a treasure from those times to share and talk about.

Olivia loved the ballet – starting out taking me to lessons and a Russian Ballet performance at his Majesty's in Perth. I think Aunty Anne may have played a part in this but Olivia would always do a few ballet moves in farewell - as we left the farm, Rottnest ... anywhere really. If you feel moved to pirouette or float into an arabesque in the next few days - go ahead I'm sure she would be pleased.

Olivia was smart and generous and kind, we were so fortunate to have her in our lives.



Easy recipes for children to cook during the holidays!

Macaroni Mince

1 tablespoon oil

1 onion, finely chopped

500g lean beef mince

Sprinkle of salt & pepper

425g can peeled tomatoes

¾ cup tomato puree

1 teaspoon dried oregano

¼ teaspoon sugar

1 cup water

1 ½ cups small shell macaroni

Method

Heat oil in a big pan. Fry onion until soft. Add mince. Cook stirring until brown.

Add salt, pepper, canned tomatoes, puree, oregano, sugar and water. Stir altogether until it starts to boil. Turn heat to low and simmer for 40 minutes.

Put macaroni into a big pot of boiling water and boil it for 10 minutes. Drain it well using a colander. Put it in a casserole dish and pour over hot mince.

Carrot cake

1 1/2 cups raw sugar

1 cup oil

4 eggs

3 cups grated carrot

2 cups wholemeal self-raising flour

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

Method

Turn oven to 180c. Grease a 20cm tin and line base with baking paper. Put raw sugar and oil in a mixing bowl. Bowl well.

Add eggs and beat well. Put grated carrot into a large mixing bowl. Stir in wholemeal flour and cinnamon.

Pour the egg mixture in. Mix it all well.

Pour into the tin and bake for 1 hour and 10 minutes.

Patty cakes or Cupcakes

2 cups self-raising flour

34 cup sugar

125g soft butter

3 eggs

½ cup milk

½ teaspoon vanilla essence

Preheat oven to 180c. set out 30 paper patty cases

Sift flour and sugar into a mixing bowl. Add butter, eggs, milk and vanilla. Beat it all in an electric mixer until it is quite smooth. Fill the patty cases until ¾ full of the mixture.

Ken left Wickepin in 1978. He died on 20th September in Geraldton and was cremated on the 26th September 2023.

What an eye opener to be shown the work that is done, from just two rooms of a private residence. We will continue to make and donate these bags and we express thanks to the general public who have donated fabrics for this worthy cause. We are not asking for donations of fabric as we still have plenty. Below is a brief outline of the work of Care Bags.

BACKGROUND

997 protection orders were granted in 2022. On average, that's 83 children a month throughout Western Australia entering Out of Home Care (Source: Department of Communities 2022 Annual Report). Care Bags - because children in care matter was created in 2018, to provide Care Bags to children going into the foster care system.

Often, the circumstances in which children enter care can be quite confusing and frightening. Just imagine you are 5 years old, picked up from school and told it's too unsafe for you to go home. You're taken to a stranger's home, with nothing but your school uniform and are now totally reliant on this carer to meet all your needs.

We wanted to give that child some belongings for their first few days in care. Some essential items to provide some measure of comfort, something they could own and have control over. We want our <u>Care Bags</u> to make a small yet positive impact on the journey into care and help start their journey of healing.

OUR MISSION

Our mission is to make a meaningful difference in the lives of children in care and at risk within Western Australia. We want them to feel valued, know they matter and understand the community cares about their future.

We provide <u>Care Bags</u> filled with essential items to support children through their first few days in care and to provide measure of comfort. We also now provide <u>Transient Teenager Toiletry 'TTT' Bags</u> to teenagers and young adults in care, transient or living on their own to help maintain personal hygiene and self-esteem.

Block your driver's licence to lock-out identity thieves

Money is not the only thing scammers are looking to steal these days – your personal identification can be just as valuable to them.

As part of their ruse, scammers posing as legitimate organisations or government service providers often pretend to need copies of your driver's licence and passport to verify your identity, when their actual aim is to steal it.

Having your identity stolen can cause devastating and long-lasting impacts, from finding unauthorised purchases on your credit card, through to having your name used to open bank accounts, take out loans and even to scam other people.

Just recently, Consumer Protection issued a <u>warning</u> about a fake WA Seniors Card website that was targeting seniors for both their money and multiple forms of identification. In reality, the WA Seniors Card is free of charge and applicants are never requested to pay a fee, or disclose personal identification in exchange for membership.

Aside from sending scammers your personal information, the other way they can get their hands on it is through data breaches that occur when cybercriminals hack into an organisation's system and leak their customers' details onto the dark web.

To help protect all WA consumers from identity theft, the Department of Transport has made it possible to put a <u>block on your driver's licence</u> to stop it being used to verify your identity online.

Putting a block on your driver's licence or learner's permit means if a scammer tries to use these documents for identity verification through the Australian Government's <u>Document Verification Service (DVS)</u>, it will be declined.

You can add and remove a driver's licence block anytime using <u>DoTDirect</u> by navigating to the 'Protect your identity' section on the 'Driver's licence' page. Your authority to drive is not affected by having a block on your driver's licence.


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Harrismith Golf Notes.
