Family contribution extends to 60 years

The Wickepin community has come together to celebrate the work of the Astbury family. who have contributed 60 years of continuous service to the region on the council.

The dynasty began on May 25, 1963, when John Astbury was elected to represent the South Ward and it continues today with Wes Astbury serving as deputy president of the Shire of Wickepin.

John Astbury's son Dave Astbury OAM, who served on the council from 1997-2013, said the family's dedication to local government originated from an urge to be heard.

"Harrismith is about 45km away from Wickepin, we were a bit of a forgotten area in the Shire so we had to come over here to represent the place," he said.
"That was the old days

"That was the old days when the wards were around, it was called the south ward and it was the biggest ward in the Shire.

"It was always a bit of a competition between Tincurrin and Harrismith, we had to talk pretty loud to get a hearing. We got the jump on them because we had the bitumen road to Harrismith a long time before Tincurrin."

Mr Astbury said relocating the Albert Facey Homestead into the Wickepin townsite in 2000 was one of the highlights of his tenure.

"That was a big thing to have it in town and that sort of thing doesn't happen so much now," he said

"The farms have got big-

ger and there's less people around to involve themselves in what's going on."

John Astbury's grandson, former Shire of Wickepin president and now Liberal Agricultural Region MLC Steve Martin, opened the celebration.

"On May 25, 1963, John Astbury was elected to the south ward around three months after I was born, so for my entire life there's been an Astbury on the Wickepin Shire Council, at times a couple at once," he said.

"Being around the Astburys as often as I was as a kid, you do learn the ability to tell a story and to make a speech.

"The Astburys have always been able to convince people of their points of view and make a strong point of view, and I certainly learnt that on the Shire council serving with them."

Mr Martin joined the council in 2001 and he thanked then-deputy president Ted Astbury for giving him an opportunity to serve the community as president, a role he held for 10 years after being elected in 2005.

Following a speech from Freeman of the Shire of Wickepin Murray Lang, Wes Astbury's father, former councillor Bill Astbury, addressed the crowd.

"Dad was always very community-minded," he said

"To have a small community you've got to have district-minded people and I think that has flowed through all of us lot, that we're to contribute somewhere along the line."



Thank you to the owners/occupiers of townsite properties who have cleared their yards of debris and flammable material, your effort to keeping our community tidy and safe is commended.



'All lots within the townsites of Harrismith, Tincurrin, Toolibin, Wickepin and Yealering are required to be cleared and maintained free of all debris or flammable material. Failure to comply with these requirements renders the owner or occupier liable to a penalty not more than \$400.'

Christmas Stargazing!

With Christmas just around the corner, it's a hectic and crazy time. So why not take a breather, head outside and look up at the beauty of a star-filled night sky. Stargazing is awe-inspiring and yet peaceful and calming at the same time. It's bound to refresh your spirits and get you ready to tackle the Christmas preparations with renewed vigour.

This month, stargazers will be treated to a special display from the Geminids Meteor Shower. On a dark night, away from artificial light pollution, you might see up to 120 meteors (or "shooting stars") an hour!

The Geminids meteor shower is generated from asteroid 3200 Phaethon and is one of the most active and best meteor showers to see.

When and where to look: The best time to watch is after midnight until early morning on 13th and 14th December. Look to the northeast and north about 45 degrees above the horizon.

Throughout December the planets are also celebrating Christmas by putting on a 'Parade of Planets'! From our perspective here on Earth, as the planets continue their never-ending path around the Sun, their orbits can sometimes bring the planets together, along with the Moon, to form incredible conjunctions.

On Dec 24th, we have a special Christmas Eve treat. From 8pm, high in the north, the brightest star you can see is not a star at all – it's Jupiter! And to the east of Jupiter, a very bright moon lights up the sky!

To end our cosmic year on a high, early risers on New Year's Eve will be treated to quite a show in the low eastern sky. A bright Venus sits near to the constellation of Scorpio, while Mars and Mercury huddle together just underneath. Look from 4.30am-5.00am, 31st December.

Use the Quasar Publishing image as a guide. To find out more about what to see in the night sky, grab a copy of their latest Astronomy Australia almanac at Quasar Publishing.

Like most farmers in our region, Facey Group has been busy with harvest. In absence of large machinery and with our drive to get accurate, local relevant data to growers, the team has been busy getting hand-cut grain harvest yields from our trials.

To date the team has harvested and processed 116 grain samples by hand ready for quality testing.

Mini Christmas puddings

200g dark chocolate, chopped

700g fruit cake

1/3 cup orange juice (1/3 cup brandy can be substituted)

1/2 cup icing sugar mixture, sifted

250g white chocolate melts

40 assorted coloured mini jellybeans or glace cherries



Place dark chocolate in a heatproof bowl over a saucepan of simmering water.

Stir until melted and smooth.

Crumble cake into a large bowl. Add dark chocolate, orange juice and sugar. Stir to combine. Cover.

Refrigerate for 20 minutes or until firm enough to handle.

Roll level tablespoons of cake mixture into balls. Place on baking trays lined with baking paper, flattening bases slightly so they sit on trays. Refrigerate until firm.

Melt white chocolate melts following method above.. Cool for 10 minutes. Drizzle over puddings to form 'custard'. Do 10 at a time and decorate with jellybean or cherry before 'custard' sets.

Classic Rum Balls

250 gram plain biscuits (such as marie)

395 gram can sweetened condensed milk

1 cup desiccated coconut

1/4 cup cocoa powder

1 teaspoon finely grated orange rind

1/4 cup dark rum 1/2 cup desiccated coconut, toasted, extra



Process biscuits until fine crumbs.

Transfer crumbs to a large bowl; add condensed milk, coconut, sifted cocoa, rind and rum.

Stir well to combine.

Roll mixture into walnut-sized balls. Toss balls in extra coconut. Place on a tray; cover, refrigerate until firm.



Shortbread

250g unsalted butter, at room temperature

3/4 cup icing sugar, plus extra, to dust

13/4 cup plain flour

3/4 cup cornflour

Preheat oven to moderate, 180°C (160°C fan-forced). Line 2 baking trays with baking paper.

Using a pencil, draw an 18cm diameter circle on baking paper, then turn paper over so pencil marking faces down. Using an electric mixer, beat butter and sifted icing sugar in a medium bowl until light and creamy. Gradually add

sifted flour and cornflour. Turn out onto a floured surface; knead until dough is smooth.

Divide dough into 2 portions. Using marked circle as a guide, shape each portion on a prepared tray.

Smooth surface with a palette knife. Using fingers, crimp edges then prick surface with a fork. Using a sharp knife, score 8 wedges on each disc. Bake 10 minutes.

Reduce oven temperature to slow, 150°C (130°C fan-forced).

Bake shortbread a further 40 minutes, or until light golden. Cool 10 minutes on trays. Transfer to a wire rack to cool completely. Using scoring as a guide, cut into wedges. Serve dusted with extra icing sugar.

Garden Snippets...



...Happy Hippy's

The name Hippeastrum derives from hippos (a horse) and astrum (a star)-describing the shapes of the developing flower bud which resembles a horse's head, and the eventual flower which is star shaped. Many people, however, prefer the old name Amaryllis, named after the Roman shepherdess of legendary beauty.

Hippys take very little care. You can simply plant them into the ground or in pots - they are not fussy about the soil they are in as long as it is well drained, nor are they fussy about which way they face. They love the warm weather, but not direct sunshine (so dappled shade is best), throw a bit of water over them and as soon as the weather warms up the bulbs will kick into action. Some varieties will produce the flower spike first before the leaves, others will produce strappy leaves followed by the flower spike. Brilliant colours range from deep reds to the palest of pinks, solid colours or stripes and shadings, and there can be single or double flowering varieties — and if grown in pots they can be brought indoors for a splash of gorgeous colour when they are in bloom.

So, How to grow Hippeastrums:

Plant with neck and shoulder of the bulb above the soil level of either the pot or the ground, so only cover about 2/3rds of the bulb with soil (planting too deep can affect the flowering). Although they are not fussy about the type of soil, it must be well drained, so put some bark chips or coal or large stones in the base of the pots to assist drainage.

Put bulbs about 20cm apart in the ground, and in pots allow about 3cm between the bulb and the edge of the pot. Water thoroughly after planting, and keep moist but not wet during growth and flowering. Flowering commences early October, and first flowers can appear before the leaves with a second flowering later in some varieties. Fertiliser of a slow release type can be applied at the beginning of the flowering season.

After flowering, remove spent or damaged foliage or flower heads after they have died down. Bulbs can be left in the ground or pots for a number of years, repot when they become too crowded.


Troubleshooting:

Snails, slugs, thrips, grubs and slaters all love Hippeastrums, and can decimate the flowering spike, so it is advisable to keep a supply of snail pellets handy that will get rid of all of these pests.

Why Won't They Flower?:

Hippy's love to be "crowded", they love a bit of a "winter nap", and when they are active, they love a bit of sunshine (albeit "dappled") – So, if they are not flowering, then check the pot they are in (you may have to repot into something smaller), turn it onto it's side through winter to stop winter rain on them and enable eight weeks of "dry sleep", then place them in a sunnier spot when they are actively growing. If they are in the garden bed, then the best you can do is to give them perfect drainage and sternly refuse to water them from late autumn until spring. They will often settle, and start flowering once they multiply enough to get a little crowded.




XX ADULT FICTION LARGE PRINT: The Timber Girls - Rosie Archer

Born into wealth, Bee moved in Sydney's literary and artistic circles in the 1920's and 30's before taking up residence on the streets. A consummate performer, she caught the public's imagination with her acts of defiance - emerging from the surf with a knife strapped to each thigh, stopping a country train in its tracks, hitchhiking across Australia and drawing large city crowds with Shakespeare recitations. She was repeatedly imprisoned, placed in mental hospitals and treated brutally by authority figures, starting with her father.

Bee constantly defied conventional expectations of female behaviour. The public found her captivating, and fragments of her story have told again and again in many forms. Until now, no one has uncovered the real story behind the colourful legend. This first full biography offers a fascinating glimpse into a dark side of Australia's history.


Create THURSDAY 16TH NOV I PM WICKEPIN CRC






