EULOGY - LESLEY ELSON

Our beautiful Mum was born at Wickepin Hospital on the 25th February 1929, the 3rd child to Leonard and Edith Hosken. Mum, Lesley, Lel, Les or Grandma was very much loved by all.

Mum was a **loving wife** to Peter for 71 years, **father to 7**, Ray, Ric, Beth, Sue, Doug, Tim and Terri, **Grandma to 17**, Sam, Adam, Amanda, Tegan, Brendan, Sarah, Rohan, Andrew, Carolyn, Tracy, Brie, Caris, Callum, Rhys, Clare, Gemma & Bryn, **Great Grandma to 27**, Brodie, Ken, Campbell, Georgia, Ruby, Bodhi, Jesse, Jake, Rivah, Lucy, MacKenzie, Asher, Jasmine, Cadence, William, Lucas, Matthew, Levi, Tyler, Jazlyn, Maddox, Harry, Charlie, Rafferty, Halle, Augie & Ned and **Great Grandma to 2**, Kingston and Elouise.

Mum started school at Wickepin in 1935, aged 6 and went to Standard 3.1, before doing correspondence for 3 years. She then went to Perth to attend Claremont school where she boarded with her paternal grandmother. Mum always dreamt of becoming a wonderful singer and she hoped to take singing lessons when in Perth. Unfortunately war intervened and all children were evacuated to the country so she went back to the farm after only one term. So, back to Wicky School with a 4 mile drive to the bus stop in the mornings, dropping off her bike so she could ride home after school. She loved riding her bike especially on the sheep tracks on the way home, which made for quite a hairy ride. When Phyl, Mum's older sister joined the Air Force in 1943 that was the end of Mum's formal schooling and back to doing it by correspondence in between her chores. Mum enjoyed working on the farm. She spoke about driving the tractor, a Caterpillar D22 crawler that raced along at 2 miles an hour and was controlled by levers and pedals. After a couple of incidents Mum was banned from driving it and was back doing other jobs.

Later on a new family moved to the farm next door and Mum said "she felt a faint stirring" when the younger son, Peter, came home from the School of Ag in Narrogin. His sister, Marjorie and Mum's cousin June were working at the Wickepin Hospital, so when an extra hand was needed Mum applied and got the job. When Matron Ingram left the Wickepin hospital to go and run Bethal Convalescent Home in Guildford, she asked Mum and her cousin June to consider working for her. Mum was 17 and her dad was against it. He relented when he found out cousin June was going, and allowed her go.

Mum worked at Bethal for a year before realising the land was calling her back to the farm. Her brother, Russ, came back from the war and was on the farm again so at the age 19 she stayed on the farm to help as he needed a cook while her Mum, Dad and Elaine moved into town. It was a happy time for Mum as they went to dances, football and other outings on the back of a truck with other young people of the district. Mum learnt to drive, a three ton truck. In Mum's words, not very romantic, but it was transport. She joined the Junior Farmers and tried to interest the boy next door, Peter, offering to pick him up each meeting day, even saying he could drive the new acquired Oldsmobile car, had no effect. Mum went to Perth to attend the Junior Farmers conference without Peter. When Russ and Ailsa were married, Mum moved into Wicky and worked in the family newsagency and later in the co-op.

Mum and Dad's relationship obviously progressed as they got engaged on 20 Jan 1950 and later married on 20 Oct 1951.

We figured out that for the first 10 years of their marriage Mum was either pregnant, breastfeeding, or both as she had 7 children in just under 8 years. Obviously **NO** TV in those days or heaters and lots of cuddles. Two of us kids were really eager to meet the world. Sue was born in the front seat of the car on a cold night at a neighbours farm 3 miles from home. Tim was an unaccompanied home birth. Mum said he only gave enough warning for her to send the older kids out to find dad. When dad got to the house mum greeted him at the door with Tim wrapped up in a blanket!!

We look back on this now and wonder how on earth Mum coped with everything she had to do. Getting us ready for school (including our lunches), doing the bus run, cooking, washing, helping out with harvest, seeding, shearing, moving sheep, taking lunch and on occasions dinner out to dad while seeding and harvesting, feeding the shearing team and at the end of the day assisting with homework, reading etc. What a wonderful mother. She nailed multitasking!!

Someone asked Mum one time, how she coped. She responded saying that she taught the older kids how to look after the younger ones.

From a very early age Mum taught us how to do all the domestic jobs, eg: dishes, folding washing, prepping food, making the beds, did we mention doing the dishes for 9 people 3 times a day. This allowed Mum to do other things. She spent many hours behind the sewing machine making all our clothes. Mum had so much patience when it came to us wanting to learn at an early age how to knit or sew. She would just unpick our mistakes and pin it up again, and say "try it again". Mum was very active in making costumes for the End of School Concert and the Choral Group. I remember the yards and yards of ricrac she sewed on the skirts for the girl's cancan performance. As kids we were

always decked out in amazing costumes for fancy dress competitions, all sewn on the Singer sewing machine or hand sewn by Mum.

Mum was very active in a number of organizations. Junior Farmers, P & C, Yealering Choral Group, East Pingelly Muscular Dystrophy Research Association, Yealering Writing Group and the Local History Group.

Mum was a great singer and starred (in our eyes) in several musicals in this hall. In the Choral group, Mum's first solo performance was the song "Black Hills of Dakota" from Calamity Jane production. Mum said the words of this song echoed her love of the land. Another moment of glory for Mum was being asked to sing the role of Katisha in the production of the Mikado. We all sat very proudly in the audience watching mum in these shows.

Mum joined the East Pingelly Muscular Dystrophy Research Association in 1976. She was involved for 21 years and was Secretary & Treasurer for 17 of them. The group worked tirelessly fundraising for the research through catering functions, running stalls, selling their cookbooks etc. Every year Mum would attend the state conference in Perth, firstly at Sir Charles Gardiner hospital where the research was being conducted and then at Rocky Bay facility where she was able to interact with the children. It was a great sense of achievement to see where all the money raised would go.

Yealering Writing Group. Mum enjoyed being a part of the group as they all shared a common love of writing. The meetings originally were over morning tea but as the group evolved it turned out to be an all-day affair. The group produced a book entitled "Captured Images" in 1997, forming a strong bond in the sharing of their writing together. Ruth commented that the Writing group really appreciated and admired Lesley's evident talent.

Local History Group. Mum interviewed many pioneer farmers of the district to capture their stories of the days gone by. She would go out with the trusty cassette recorder and then come home and type out their stories. Years later a family asked if they could have the tape of their grandfather as they wanted to hear his voice once again as he told his life story.

As we got to high school age, we needed to go off to boarding school. This was a real wrench for most of us. On the drive to the hostel you would get this queasy feeling in your stomach. Mum understood this without us having to say anything. She had a lovely mischievous way of cheering us up when we were feeling down. There was one particular gravel hill that she knew if she took her foot off the accelerator at the right moment the car would kind of float over the hill and everyone in the back seat would feel their stomach doing backflips. It was always a fun thing, created lots of laughs, helped us all feel better on that awful drive away from our beloved farm. Mum was a great storyteller and we treasured the letters she sent us when we were at boarding school which kept us up-to-date and connected with everything that was happening at home. She had the uncanny ability with her writing that when reading her letters and stories it was as though she was right there speaking those words out loud to us. It still brings a smile to my face just thinking about it.

Not only did mum look after all us kids, she was a great support to dad in the many roles he took on eg: tennis club and football club. Especially the afternoon teas, occasionally washing the football jumpers and assisting with counting the gate takings on a Sunday night. I remember the hills hoist being full of 20 footy jumpers plus the family washing on several Mondays. Just as well we had the jumbo clothes line.

Christmas was always special in our family. A time to catch up with relatives we rarely saw. And in the later years, it was all about spending time with grandchildren. But for Mum, this time of year was about cooking and catering for the big event. Out would come her special Christmas day recipes and we all worked hard preparing food for the day. Mum's chicken stuffing was legendary. It had to be portioned up carefully so no one missed out on a piece. It was so popular that it became a dish in its own right and Mum would make a big tray of the stuffing. There was no recipe as such, just certain ingredients to create her magic. Mum would also make a Christmas pudding every year, in the early day with sixpences in the mixture, which was always exciting to see how much money we would get. It also meant that the Metters 2 wood stove would be cranked up even when the outside temperature was over 100 degrees Fahrenheit. For the younger ones that would be over 38 degrees. Many a hot sweaty christmas lunch was had in our kitchen dining room so we could enjoy this treat. One year Mum had all her teeth removed just before Christmas. Despite her pain, she soldiered on catering for the extended family, 30+ people, cooking up a storm, even though she couldn't touch a morsel herself. Mum did so much cooking in her life, but there was one staple that never changed in the 70 years of marriage. Each tea time was started with her split pea soup, winter and summer. But Mum had one night a week off from cooking which was a Friday night after shopping where we had pies and pasties. Pies for those who liked gristle and gravy and pasties for those who didn't. She not only cooked for our family of 9, she was always willing to cook and cater for charities, stalls, functions, dance evening, afternoon teas, wherever there was a good cause. And of course at shearing time she fed all the shearers morning and afternoon teas as well as lunch in our kitchen dining room.

When Mum and Dad moved onto their farm "Ben Lomond" in 1956 mum found a really good knife left in one of the drawers. This became her special knife. Over the next 60 years this knife was sharpened, broken, repaired and sharpened more, leading a 12" large blade to becoming a 3" skinny bladed knife that only Mum could use.

Along with all the things Mum HAD to do being a wife, mother, farmer, she also somehow found time to do some photography and tend her beautiful garden.

As us kids left home and Mum got older she wanted to explore some of the world and found a Women's Weekly World Tour she fancied doing. She told dad he could either come with her or she would go by herself. Luckily he chose to go and this was the start of their travels for pleasure.

Mum was the glue of the family. She was a kind, gentle and patient Mum. She always put the family needs before her own. She was a great sounding board to us all as we made important decisions in life. We were blessed to have Mum who was such a beautiful, kind, caring loving and compassionate Mother. She had the uncanny ability to know when to just listen or when people wanted some sage advice from her.

We will miss her so deeply.

Cash is king... or is it?

"Businesses have to accept legal tender." It's a comment we hear a lot at Consumer Protection, so I wanted to take the opportunity to clear this up and let you know what the law says about it.

Businesses can choose which payment types they accept. It is legal for a business to specify the terms and conditions that they will supply goods and services. This includes whether they will accept cash payment.

However, you must be made aware of these terms and conditions before you make a purchase. This could be a clear sign at the register or door stating the business does not accept cash, or the staff verbally informing you that you can't pay with cash.

We know a lot of people like to pay with cash to avoid credit card surcharges. The good news is there are rules about this too. Card surcharges are permitted under the Australian Consumer Law, however the fee must only reflect what it actually costs the business to process the payment, such as bank fees or terminal costs. If a business charges a payment surcharge, it must be able to prove the costs it is based on.

If there is no other way for you to pay without incurring a surcharge, then the business must include the fee in the total cost. For example, your local café charges \$5 for a coffee, but they do not accept cash, and all card payments are surcharged. Then it is not possible for you to buy that coffee at \$5. If the surcharge is 1% then the price displayed must clearly be \$5.05 so you can easily tell how much your coffee really costs.

While the costs associated with taking card payments is obvious, there are also costs for dealing in cash. Handling cash costs businesses in time and wages.

Remember, purchasing goods or services is entering into an agreement with a seller. You do not have to agree to make the purchase if the payment methods aren't acceptable to you. But, it is legal for the business to refuse to accept cash so long as they have made this clear.

If you believe a business is breaching the rules, it's best to broach it with them first. Should negotiations fail, contact Consumer Protection on 1300 30 40 54, or consumer@dmirs.wa.gov.au



EULOGY – THOMAS PETER WILLIAMSON

DAD's Story

I'd like to welcome everyone here today Dad would be so pleased to see you all.

Thomas Peter Williamson born 23 November 1927, born in Wickepin to a family of 4 children. Jim, Vina and Wally. His mum passed away when he was only 2, from that stage on Pop looked after them until Catherine-came out from the Shetlands, they married on the 7th November 1934 and that is the Nana we knew.

They all grew up on the farm 29 miles east of Wickepin on the No 2 Rabbit Proof Fence road, and attended the Elsinore school opened in 1917 and closed in 1946 it was on the corner of Elsinor road & 86 gate road.

He married Lorna Fulford on July 14 1954, they had 5 fantastic children Janet, Irene, Helen, Thomas and myself, and sadly Mum passed away on the 14 July 1999, and from that day Dad lived by himself.

TP Williamson, Pete, Uncle Pete, Pop but to us Dad. There were other names such as slave driver, silly old bugger, which we used quite a bit when we were on the farm

Dad was a big man with big hands but even a bigger heart.

Passion for family, was always high on Dads outlook on life. Dad was always in the house for lunch and Tea, 12 o'clock lunch 6pm Tea. If we were shearing or seeding he would go back to work at night. He also had the leather strap behind the kitchen door but I never saw him take it off to use it.

We had a 3 bedroom weather board house that we lived in as we all grew up, Dad thought it would be good to extend, so he purchased a house in Kulin, pulled it down, carted it all home to the farm and built a sleep out on the side of the house. The three girls then got that room Tommy and myself moved into the girls room and Pop Williamson moved into our old room. Cosy house hold. But we learned how to build onto a house, he was a great teacher, I'm sure sometimes he didn't think we were listening but it all comes back to me when you start doing a task now.

He had some do not's and superstitions one of them was not starting a new job on a Monday, which worked well for Tommy and myself, but Dad was one step ahead of us he would go and do something the day before just so it wasn't started on the Monday.

Dad was quick witted and this continued right through his life, even when he had his second last fall, the Ambulance officer asked him what he was doing prior to the fall, Dad came straight back with standing of course.

He was there for us and always willing to help with any working bees for any organisation that he was a part of, belonging to the P&C's of Wickepin & Kulin I remember sports days he would supply the sand for the long & high jump, now we didn't have a front end loader he would shovel it on and shovel it off no issues.

Dad was involved in the community that he was living in, didn't matter which one, he was really good at keeping the Wickepin and Narrogin shires on their toes, if he saw something that was not right around the area., he would write letters to explain the issue, such as footpaths not to the standard, over hanging trees, condition of public toilets or lack thereof, we're sure that they would cringe when a letter with his hand writing on it would come over the desk.

Dad was part of a lot of organisations and sporting clubs he had Life Membership's to the Ten Mile Tennis club, Dudinin Golf Club, Narrogin Senior Citizen, he also was recognised for his years of service with the Narrogin Hospital Auxiliary, he was awarded the Citizen of the year in Wickepin in 2008, he was also honoured to receive the Sharon Matthews trophy for his years of support to the Wickepin netball club.

Ten Mile Tennis club was one of Dads passions he had a bit of a competitive edge so there was no messing around when he played, he was an active member and was always ready to help new comers and the young ones come up through the years, I think everyone that lived around the area has memories of Dad. I will never forget the BBQ's they were wood in old steel tractor rims with rabbit netting over them, car lights or tilly lamps for lighting and lucky we had big chops because otherwise they would fall through the holes in the rabbit netting, it was just take it off and eat it, burnt most of the time.

Dudinin golf club was another one of Dads enjoyment, I remember when he, Kevin Wilson & Charlie Turner from our area along with the Bricks from Dudinin and others had the thought of reopening the club, we spent numerous weekends down there cutting down all the regrowth mowing the fairways and getting the sand greens into shape using of course environmentally approved sump oil on them.

86 Gate fire brigade which was established by all the farmers in our area, Dad was the chief of the brigade and it was only after one fire we attended that I saw him in the office writing stuff down, it was only then that I realised he did not only attend the fires but had to keep a record of what happened as well.

Dad & Mum would take a holiday every year the second week of January and go to Mandurah, 5 kids, the grey EH station wagon and the trailer. Scotties caravan park, was our first place I remembered staying at, some of these times were with the Fulford side of the family, awesome memories were made. Janet mentioned the other day that Dad made sure we attended swimming lessons that were held between the Mandurah jetties, it didn't matter what the weather was we were there. Fishing while we were there was a given most mornings and nights, we caught them and Mum would sit on the beach and clean them, they made a great team.

Dad was one of the hardest working people that I have ever known, he never seemed to stop, as the years went on it didn't seem to phase him, he always instilled in us you treat people the way you want to be treated and if you want something you work for it. I think back to when we purchased the other farm, Mum & I were in the house and we got the phone call from the bank, Dad ran down from the shed and came into the house and talked to the bank, when he got off the phone he said we have got the loan, but I think we have started off on the wrong foot, he lifted his right leg and his foot just dropped, he had snapped his Achilles tendon, with no showing of pain, he just asked Mum to take him to hospital, they got in the car and went off to Narrogin, this just shows how tough our Dad was. His arms and hands were huge, it was a few weeks ago I was talking to Craig and he said he remembered as a kid watching Pop wipe the dishes which he did every night with Mum and he said you couldn't really see the dinner plate he was wiping because of the size of his hands and his muscles in his arms were massive.

In the early days I always remember that the barbecue sauce bottles were plastic had a push on lid and when the bottle was nearly empty you got to pop the lid off and it would hit the roof but Mum didn't like that being done, so we were never allowed to do it but Dad would and we'd get told off for it because Mum never saw Dad doing it, he would sit there with a smile on his face.

One of the things that I really remember about Dad was in the shearing shed with the old Ajax wool press he was one of the very few people that could operate the twin handle wool press by himself, with little effort.

When he lived in Wickepin Dad would go around to check the elderly to make sure that they were all good, now he was in his 80's at this stage.

While living in Narrogin, Dad took up carpet bowls, once again he was involved in the running of club and made lots of friends during this time. When Dad turned 90 he purchased a new car a Ford, when I asked why he brought a ford he said I learnt in a T Model and I wanted my last car to be a Ford.

There are so many things we could have put in this story of Dad, but these memories will stay with us forever.

We all have great memories of this Man he was an inspiration to all of us and he will be remembered as the best Mate, Uncle, Pop and Dad you could ever have.

INFORMATION FOR CUSTOMERS



TEMPORARY ARRANGEMENTS AT WICKEPIN WASTE SITE

In light of the continued fire suppression efforts at the Wickepin Waste Site and the associated risks to public safety, the Wickepin Shire has activated a contingency plan to establish a temporary waste site for use by local residents.

The temporary waste area is situated within the existing waste site boundaries, specifically to the north of the current tipping area. Access to this temporary area remains unchanged, utilizing the same entrance road off the Wickepin Pingelly Road.

To ensure the safety of users, fencing has been installed, restricting access to areas under active fire suppression. It is imperative that individuals do not circumvent the fencing and enter restricted zones within the waste site, as these areas pose a significant danger.

Key Information:

- Opening Hours:
 - Saturdays: 7.00 AM to 11.00 AM; 12.00 PM to 4.00 PM
 - Sundays: 7.00 AM to 11.00 AM; 12.00 PM to 4.00 PM
- Supervised Access:
 - A supervisor will be onsite to direct waste disposal and ensure public safety.
 - Limited opening hours are necessitated by the associated costs of employing a supervisor.

Conditions of Use/Rules for the Temporary Waste Area:

- All directions given by the supervisor must be fully complied with, including directives on waste disposal. Different areas are designated for various types of waste.
- Waste separation before arrival is required. Specific areas are allocated for steel, timber, mattresses, furniture, and garden waste. Only household waste is permitted in the designated waste cell (pit).
- Tyres cannot be accepted.
- Asbestos cannot be accepted; residents may dispose of asbestos at the Narrogin waste site with prior notice to the Shire of Narrogin (disposal fees apply).
- Access to the temporary waste area is restricted to Shire of Wickepin residents only. Proof of
 residency, such as a rates notice, driver's license, vehicle registration, or other bona fide
 evidence, must be presented to the supervisor at the entrance. Non-Shire residents will not be
 permitted access.



Some "tried and true" preserves to use up the wonderful summer produce to be found in local gardens.

Zucchini Relish.

Ingredients

700 g zucchini diced

1 red capsicum diced 1 cup corn cob kernels

1 onion diced

1 1/2 cups white

vinegar

1 cup white sugar

4 tsp ground turmeric

4 tsp mustard powder

1 tsp allspice

1/4 tsp curry powder

2 garlic cloves crushed

1 tbs vegetable oil

1 tbs salt

2 tbs cornflour

1 tbs water

Method:

Combine all ingredients, except cornflour and water, in a pot and simmer for 1 hour, stirring often. Combine cornflour and water, stir into zucchini relish and simmer for a further 5 minutes. Transfer hot relish to sterilised jars with sealed lids.

Apple and Tomato Chutney

Spicy and a sweet, this delicious chutney goes well with breads, cheeses and chicken!

Ingredients

2 pounds apples - peeled, cored and sliced

2 cups water

2 pounds tomatoes, sliced

2 large onions, chopped

1 clove garlic, chopped

½ cup sultana raisins

34 cup white sugar

1 tablespoon mustard

powder

5 teaspoons curry powder

4 teaspoons salt

2 ½ cups malt vinegar

1 teaspoon cayenne pepper

Method

Place apples and water in a large saucepan. Bring to a boil, reduce heat, and cook 25 minutes, or until apples are tender, stirring

occasionally. Add more water as necessary to keep the apples simmering.
Add all other ingredients. Stir until sugar has dissolved.
Bring the mixture to a boil.
Reduce heat, and simmer 3 hours, stirring occassionally, until a thick chutney remains.
Remove and discard wrapped

mustard seed. Seal chutney in sterile containers until serving.

Tomato & Chilli Jam.

Ingredients:

2 red onions, finely chopped 800 g ripe tomatoes, roughly chopped

3 red chillies, de-seeded and finely chopped

5 cm piece of fresh ginger, peeled and grated

1 star anise

1 cup white wine vinegar

300 g brown sugar

2 tsp fish sauce

Method

Prepare the ingredients. Cook the red onion and chopped tomato in the large, heavy-based saucepan over a low heat. Add the chilli, ginger, star anise, vinegar and sugar. Bring to the boil, then simmer for about 30 minutes or until very thick. Add the fish sauce and cook for a further 2–3 minutes.


Transfer to hot sterilised jars, screw the lids on tightly, then label and decorate.
