













Bacon, spinach and tomato frittata

9 Ingredients

20g butter
1 brown onion sliced
3 bacon rashers, chopped
200g cup mushrooms, sliced
80g baby spinach
¼ cup chopped basil
250g cherry tomatoes, halved
8 eggs
½ cup finely grated parmesan



Method

Preheat grill on high.

Melt butter in a 20cm (base) heavy-based flameproof frying pan over medium heat. Cook sliced brown onion and chopped shortcut bacon rashers for 5 minutes or until browned. Add sliced cup mushrooms. Cook, stirring, for 5 minutes or until soft.

Add baby spinach, chopped basil and halved cherry tomatoes. Reduce heat to low.

Whisk 8 eggs and finely grated parmesan together. Season. Pour over vegetable mixture in pan. Lift and tilt pan to spread egg mixture evenly. Cook for 8 to 10 minutes or until frittata is almost set.

Place pan under grill. Grill for 5 minutes or until just set and light golden. Stand for 2 minutes before sliding onto a plate. Cut into wedges. Cool.

Refrigerate for up to 2 days.

A list of common foods that don't complement each other

Did you know that an apple a day may actually bring the doctor to your doorstep if eaten right after a meal? A list of common foods that don't complement each other.

Cereal and orange juice

The acids in orange juice destroy the enzyme that helps digest starches present in cereal. Also, acidic fruits or juices can curdle milk, turning it into a heavy mucus-like substance.

Melons and milk

Ayurveda states that while milk acts as a laxative, melons have diuretic properties - resulting in a clash of functions. Moreover, the stomach acids required to digest the melon make the milk curdle, causing gastric issues.

Fruits after meals

As fruits contain simple sugars that require no digestion, they do not stay long in the stomach - unlike other foods that are rich in fat, protein and starch. However, if you eat fruits after meals, the sugar therein is likely to sit in the stomach and ferment rather than get digested instantly.

Beans and cheese

Now, this is something you should keep in mind before entering a Mexican restaurant. When dairy cheese and beans are eaten with a hearty serving of guacamole and hot sauce, it is almost guaranteed to cause gas and bloating. Potent!

Garden Snippets...



...Autumn Transplanting

If you've been hankering to move a plant, now is one of the best times of the year to do it. Air temperatures have dropped so plants will be less stressed, but soils are still warm, which will help the roots to re-develop after the move. To achieve the best results, a bit of forethought, planning and preparation is the way to success.

Prepare the Plant: Two weeks beforehand, water the plant with a seaweed solution. Water again a week before, and then again the day before the move. This will prepare the plant to cope with the imminent stress and already have it in root development mode. Watering the day before ensures the plant is fully turgid at transplant time. Transplant death is usually due to a loss of root mass and the resulting dehydration of the plant, so these steps will work on both aspects.

Digging: Determine where the plant is going to go, and dig the new hole first. This minimises the length of time the plant is out of the ground, when the root ball is vulnerable to drying out. If the soil is dry, then fill the hole with water and let it drain through.

Next, dig the plant out by working your way around the plant, maintaining as large a root ball as possible. Don't be tempted to half dig and then yank the plant out, as this will tear the roots and greatly disturb the root ball.

Once out, check the outside of the root ball, and trim back any roots that have jagged edges, leaving sharp clean cuts which will heal faster. Wrap the root ball in hessian to hold it together and minimise drying out whilst it is in transit. Handle the plant by the root ball instead of the trunk to prevent damage to the trunk.

Planting: Check the new hole is the correct depth and width. The plant should sit at the same soil level as before, and there should be at least 10cm space between the root ball and the sides of the hole to allow the new roots to grow into softer soil. Gently place the plant in the hole, remove the hessian, and stand back and look at it from several angles to make sure you are happy with it's new positioning before backfilling with soil. Water in well, again with seaweed solution, so that the soil properly settles all around the root ball, adding more soil if needed.

Look for the Wobbles – If the plant is unstable in it's new position, then insert some stakes for several months until anchor roots develop.

Pruning: Even with the best of care, the plant will still be left with a reduced amount of roots. Pruning some foliage will reduce water loss and help restore the balance of roots to leaves. How much you cut back depends on the plant type and root-ball size, but generally aim to prune about 20-30 percent.


Aftercare: Plants will need weekly watering for the first month to get them properly established. Don't fertilise until they produce some new growth under their own steam.





MARVELLOUS BIRDS

(Submitted by Louie Gamble)

Visitors to Wickepin Caravan Park during late Spring, were treated to the sights and sounds of Nature 'getting on with business,...with pleasure'!

A pair of Willy Wagtails raising three chicks, bravely fending-off 'Maggies' & Kookaburras.

Two (or more) male Masked Woodswallows cooperatively tending a pair of fledglings.

We heard and saw daily, the Purple-Crowned Lorikeets and Regent Parrots ("Smokers"), Wee-bills and Honeyeaters,..most noticeably the small Yellow-plumed, Brown, Singing and White-Cheeked, with their sharp black, gold and white colouring.

Grey Shrike-thrush are quite tame, readily announcing their presence with loud, melodious calls. I felt privileged, spotting a Sacred Kingfisher, cautiously tending a robust youngster in a wattle tree on Dumbleyung Rd.

So these too, are happily breeding at Wickepin!

Conspicuous year-round, and a constant source of entertainment, is a local family of 12 White-browed Babblers. Chattering and trotting after one another, earnestly tossing mulch and foraging alongside Thornbills, bobbing about in the undergrowth.

Pretty Striated Pardalotes flit and feed high-up in Gum trees. Stubby-tailed, these little gems of the bird-world possibly have nest burrows in the Wogolin Creek.


Many other birds are still present ,... feeding, watering, bathing and socializing. Each has a 'vocabulary' of different sounds for different occasions eg social chatter versus warnings. (Wouldn't it be heavenly to recognize all these voices, identifying each and every bird by the minute ?!)

With no Indian Miners, nor masses of feral birds, as in Eastern Australia ,..and those increasingly aggressive Wattlebirds more peacefully occupied, our passerine birds seem to be in a happy balance. With noisy Corellas yet to "flock-up" in town, it has, all in all, been a comfortable breeding season for our finer 'feathered friends'!

Having a birdbath in place, one senses a respectful harmony between birds at watering times(ie early morning and late afternoon), ..the smallest birds always attending first.

Daunted by my lack of knowledge, or a keener interest, it's a fine time to praise those passionate people on never-ending quests for our wildlife; West Australians such as Malcolm French (Eucalypts), Michael Morcombe (Birds) and author-environmental activist, Tim Winton.

FACEY GROUP UPDATE



The annual summary of Facey Group trials was well attended by members and industry representatives on Thursday 7th of March 2024. Facey Group aims to ensure these presentations are farmer-focused and provide information that supports local farming systems.

Edward McGeoch, Associate Analyst from Rabobank, presentations with some big-picture views of where the market is in terms of sheep, lamb, wool, and the grain markets. He predicted interest rate cuts for late 2024 but thinks global economic headwinds will likely continue.

Through a series of interesting graphs that showed the domestic and export proportions of Western Australia's various agricultural commodities, he talked us through several factors that will be at play in the short term.

Next on the podium, the Facey Group AgREC Team.



Tina Astbury, Senior Project Coordinator, reviewed two years of complex findings on the Stubble Height project which is GRDC-funded and led by Liebe Group.

Claire Willcocks, Agricultural Research & Extension Coordinator, presented Facey Group's findings on our Soft Wheat Trial. InterGrain and AGT were kind enough to provide pre-release varieties for Facey Group to compare with RockStar.

Kaitlyn Anderson, Agricultural Research & Extension Coordinator, presented the findings from a range of legume trials that Facey Group has conducted recently. These projects have demonstrated that early sowing legumes can create greater yields in the following year's cereal crops, using a high-value legume as part of a double break can have positive effects on your three-year gross margin, and seeding lupin directly after soil amelioration may be a low-risk option.

Following our team's presentation, the attendees heard from Dr. Sarah Rich, Research Scientist at CSRO who shared findings of the Long Coleoptile and Deep Sowing Project. This demonstrated wheat that has been bred for longer coleoptiles will emerge from sowing depths as great as 120mm and will establish and yield at comparable rates. Deep sowing may suit opportunities where growers want to sow into stored moisture



from early rainfall events. Sarah also demonstrated the emergence rates and subsequent yield of various legumes and this site, chickpeas, field peas, lentils, and vetch. Due to the larger seed size, these varieties all emerge from depth very well and are an option if you choose to sow deeper into stored moisture.

Dr. Hayley Norman, Senior Research Scientist at CSIRO, discussed findings from the Future Drought Fund project 'Enhancing Low Production Paddocks for Productive Sheep Systems'. This trial demonstrated the capacity to fill feed gaps in low-productive areas among saltbush plantations. Two sites established a range of clover, sub-clover, medic, serradella, and wheatgrass. Various varieties produced considerable biomass, and the project will track which varieties will re-establish best in 2024.



The presentations were wound up with a well-earned beverage with local Arthur River farmer and #6Bs spokesperson, Sam Burgess, who gave a heartfelt presentation about the importance of your mental health and how looking out for yourself, and your mates is so vital. He is a proud member and spokesperson of #6Bs- Blokes, Barbecues, Bonfires, Beers, Bonding, and Bullsh*t where events are organised in regional Australia for men to relax and discuss their mental health in a safe space.

It was great to catch up for a drink and a bite to eat at the sundowner which was sponsored by Carbon Sync.
