## BARKING DOGS - Is your dog missing you during the day?

Barking is a dog's natural means of communication and often signifies its alertness to danger or intruders. At times, however, a dog's continuous barking can affect nearby properties. It a dog's continuous barking is becoming a problem for you then you may need to speak directly to the dog's owner. Often owners are not aware of their dog's behaviour, especially if they are absent when it occurs. On many occasions, the dog's owner is appreciative of the direct approach, and this can resolve the issue and help generate good relations between neighbours.

Keep your pooch happy by understanding their habits. Is your dog bored, lonely or frustrated due to lack of company, exercise or mental stimulation. Left for long periods of time or may have anxiety when alone.

#### **MOSQUITO FOGGING**

The fogging program will commence firstly around the community oval only at this stage, this will support our local sporting teams due to the excess activity of mosquitoes on the oval. The Shire will be in contact with the sporting teams regarding their training times, so there is no interference or disruption. For any questions, contact the Shire on 9888 1005.

#### HARRISMITH LANDFILL CLOSURE

The Harrismith Landfill will be closed until further notice. This closure is in response to the illegal dumping of tyres within the premises. We apologize for any inconvenience this closure may cause and appreciate your cooperation in adhering to proper waste disposal regulations.

#### **YEALERING & TINCURRIN LANDFILLS**

The Yealering and Tincurrin landfills are now locked on the weekdays and open 4pm Fridays for the weekend and will close at 8am on Mondays. The Shire of Wickepin will then transition to fully staffed landfills, including Wickepin landfill, later in 2024. Further details including set times will be provided closer to the time of the permanent transition.

## TEMPORARY ARRANGEMENTS AT WICKEPIN WASTE SITE

The temporary waste area is situated within the existing waste site boundaries, specifically to the north of the current tipping area. Access to this temporary area remains unchanged, utilizing the same entrance road off the Wickepin Pingelly Road.

### Conditions of Use/Rules for the Temporary Waste Area:

- All directions given by the staff members must be fully complied with, including directives on waste disposal. Different areas are designated for various types of waste.
- Waste separation before arrival is required. Specific areas are allocated for steel, timber, mattresses, furniture, and garden waste. Only household waste is permitted in the designated waste cell (pit). Tyres cannot be accepted. Asbestos cannot be accepted; residents may dispose of asbestos at the Narrogin waste site with prior notice to the Shire of Narrogin (disposal fees apply). Access to the temporary waste area is restricted to Shire of Wickepin residents only. Proof of residency, such as a rates notice, driver's license, vehicle registration, or other bona fide evidence, must be presented to the supervisor at the entrance. Non-Shire residents will not be permitted access.

And holds us close, in their thoughts and prayers.







# EULOGY OF DOROTHY ELIZABETH FLEAY 23.04.1936 – 21.06.2024

Thank you for being with us today as we share our memories and celebrate a life well-loved. With laughter, and tears we remember our beloved Mum, Nana and great-Nan. Our little legend, our thoughtful friend...a beautiful lady who will be forever remembered as our 'darling Dossie'. Dossie's remarkable life was a testament to her unwavering strength and determination to not just live, but to live her best possible life – teaching us, that with a good dose of humour we can conquer the tough challenges!

Mum was born in Perth and raised by her loving parents, Hubert and Meryle Seal in their small Brookton home and with a strong emphasis on self-discipline and resourcefulness, Dossie's dedication to family developed at a very young age. She loved her parents dearly, particularly admiring her father who lived with the emotional and physical scars of World War-1 and was equally as protective of her older brother, Ben.

In 1934, entering a world not equipped to embrace Downs Syndrome, Ben faced teasing from children who did not know him, and the challenges and stigma felt by Mum and her family only amplified their determination to not let society define Ben's potential. He was loving, kind and hardworking and Dossie often referred to Ben as 'one of God's special children'. Her parents' garden was a haven where she and Ben enjoyed the fruits from their orchard, tended roses and vegetable gardens, poultry, goats, dogs and a menagerie of animals.

Kindness defined Dossie! Her father's WW1 stories, and her brothers' needs shaped Dossie's understanding - teaching resilience, adaptability, empathy and compassion from a very young age, and this legacy of loyalty forged in her early years, is a treasure that Dixie, Tim and I have cherished. Mum loved to sew and after completing school at age 15, she joined the Brookton Farmers Co-op as a junior draper assistant. By 18 she was the drapery buyer and accounting clerk, demonstrating her diligent aptitude for business and finance, while also perfecting her dress making - a skill that enabled her to mend and darn clothes and create beautiful garments for herself and later for us. In 1956, Dossie moved to Wickepin and commenced secretarial work with Elders. She was warmly welcomed by her relatives, Lesley and Tim Doncon (lovingly known as Aunty Lel and Uncle Tim) and their family, Judy, John and Sue where she lived until marrying our dad, Eric on the 2<sup>nd</sup> of November 1957.

Mum and Dad set up home together in a small house on Johnston Street, with Leanne (me) arriving in September 1958. They spent a year in this home before moving to Uncle Clarrie's farm 'Manna Fields' at East Wickepin.

Our parents embraced the chance to live and work with Uncle Clarrie on the farm, and with the arrival of Dixie in 1960 and Tim in 1964, their family was complete.

Mum managed the household in exchange for the opportunity for us to live with Clarrie, as an extended family. Uncle Clarrie was like a Grandparent, and the benefits were immense! Showered with extra love, never scolded but instead whisked away on spontaneous 'ice cream adventures' to town. What more could naughty kids want! He loved us and we dearly loved him.

The three of us have wonderful memories growing up at Manna Fields. Earlier - before TV, our evenings were often spent, around the piano, singing to Mums renditions of songs like "Puff the Magic Dragon and How Much is that Doggie in the Window". These tunes are now a lovely reminder of Mums piano playing, a special time before television became the focal point of our evenings. Mum handled the farm finances, cared for Clarrie, Dad, and us while encouraging her elderly parents to sell and move from Brookton, making it easier to support them. At their new house in Wickepin, our Grandparents and Ben planted an amazing orchard of fruit and vegetables, and we know how much Mum appreciated their beautiful fresh produce, for our table.

Mum assured her parents that she **would** provide for her brother, and true to her word, she took care of Ben for 4 years before he moved to a therapy unit in Beverly. In1983, Ben again returned to his quarters on the farm, where he remained for 10 years under 'His Dossies' loving care. What an exceptional wife, mother, daughter, sister and carer our Mum was!

Mum instilled in us two valuable principles: "To treat others with kindness and respect - as we would like to receive ourselves" and approach every task with enthusiasm, so "If a job is worth doing - it is worth doing properly". She lived by this timeless piece of advice, and the thought of her magic wooden spoon ensured that we got things right the first time!

In 1970, after completing First Aid and Ambulance training, Mum gave 10 years of service as a volunteer ambulance officer, however after attending a terrible accident close to home, the worry of finding one of her own in an emergency became too much, and she took a step back from active service to concentrate on the role of treasurer.

At this point the stage was set for adventure, when Mum and Dad embarked on their maiden cruise, together with Barb and Laurie Spark. The on-board experience of musicals, dances and island-hopping ignited Dossie's desire to travel.

Mums' life entered a new chapter becoming a loving Nana to Shayne in 1980, and her nine grandbabies that followed - Troy, Rick, Lee, Corey, Lauren, Kirsty, Nicki, Gavin and Daniel. Her most cherished role was being a hands-on "Nana Dossie" to her little people, and it was through these precious moments, that she felt most connected and fulfilled. I know Mum held tight to these happy memories, providing a peaceful escape through some of her more difficult times.

While still on the farm, Dossie enjoyed pottery lessons with Laura Easton but later found her forte in China Painting – and she was good at it! Mum created many beautiful pieces with Audrey Suckling and the talented China painting group, until she realised the solvent required for painting on porcelain affected her throat. She was advised to stop painting and was later diagnosed with Pulmonary Sarcoidosis.

At the time of her divorce, we encouraged Dossie to embark on a new chapter of independence. Enrolling in TAFE- Mum learnt to use a computer, purchased the Bulman house in Henry Street and moved from the farm. By 1995 she had secured an admin role at TAFE in Narrogin and continued to rebuild her life with confidence and purpose.

We were proud of her personal achievements and thrilled that she was enjoying life... in such a positive way!

At TAFE, I witnessed Mum's first aid training come to the fore, after a student collapsed requiring resuscitation. Dossie calmly attended to this young person on her own, administering lifesaving CPR!

In 1988 Dossie was again bitten by the travel bug, taking her to Scotland for Tims wedding, and later to Europe with her dearest friends Dawn and Red, and Ireland with the fabulous Nightingale Choir. She kicked up her heals in Tamworth with Georgie Beacham. What an outrageous time they had boot scooting the streets of Tamworth together.

Mum's dedication to community continued into her retirement working with Dixie in the Wickepin Newsagency, skilfully dressing the windows to reflect a time of years gone by. As an active member of the Townscape committee, Dossie passionately advocated alongside Linley to secure the stunning display of red and white roses planted in the main street - now a legacy in the heart of town. Nana Dossie's heart was once again filled with love as she welcomed 21 great-grandchildren, with beautiful Paige in 2002 and each darling little cherub, thereafter, lighting her soul. Mums gentle love was a precious gift, to each of them.

2003 – A year of change! Dossie thoroughly enjoyed the company of the Nightingales and the Bunbury choir, where she met her new companion - Roy.

I recall how 'vibrant, happy and young' she looked in her blue jeans, white t-shirt, pink denim jacket and white shoes when she came to say goodbye before driving to Bunbury to meet Roy and their friends. Armed with her water bottle, road map and handwritten sheet of instructions, she set off in her little white car.

We were thrilled to learn that Mum's weekend had been fabulous, the laughter contagious and I imagine the red wine flowing – what a wonderful memory to have!

On the afternoon of November 3<sup>rd</sup> - while on her way home to Wickepin, Dossie stopped for a coffee and cake in Collie. She then recalled driving through tall trees, but her memory of the journey ends there, with no recollection of what happens next. Sadly, a terrible car accident left Mum's life

forever altered and in that moment our lives, the lives of her family - instantly changed. A stark reminder of how fragile, life can be.

Mum was air-lifted to Royal Perth hospital with severe injuries requiring multiple surgeries and extensive rehabilitation. Her courage during this six- month ordeal inspired everyone who knew her, a testament to her unyielding spirit. We were extremely grateful to Roy, the Nightingale choir and her many friends as they remained a **major** part of Mums life, and ultimately, her recovery. After returning to Wickepin in 2004, Mum continued to prove she was so much more than just a survivor.

Living alone with the support from family and friends, Dossie returned to her much-loved garden and as she had said to Dixie, "It doesn't matter if there's nothing to eat if the roses bloom, the yard is tidy, and the weeds and those horrible stray cats from next door... are gone!

So, if you haven't read between the lines, Mum didn't like cats ...all that much, but she did love dogs! Tim laughed when he described Mum's obvious canine crush! She'd welcome his 4-legged workmates at **any** time of the day, but most often in the morning with schmacko dog treats. It was a winning combo: Tim was offered a cold beer or 2, the excited dogs would devour their snacks, but best of all, Mum got her doggie-fix.

Dossies garden gave immense meaning to her day and she could be found in the early hours of sunlight- in her nightie, outside, dead-heading her favourite Gold-Bunny roses, pruning and cutting each stem into gazillions of 2-inch pieces and squishing them down into her wheelie bin because that silly rubbish man said she couldn't put 2 bins out – only 1, and... she was very annoyed with him! Mums garden always looked spick-always! She was amazing.

In September 2018, Karinya became Dossie's permanent home, and although she didn't want to leave Wickepin, she made the most of the physical and emotional support from the wonderful caring staff at Karinya and enjoyed the company of her close resident friends.

While this is a condensed timeline of Mums life it is true to say that our darling Dossie DID live her best life with a naughty sense of humour, a MIGHTY big heart and a desire to help everyone. It is almost 21 years since the accident and during that time Dossie coped with a marathon of emotional and physical challenges and just recently, in one of her less confused moments she quietly confessed: "I don't know how I survived all that ... (and, pointing up) she said I know I went up, but I came back". Yes... she was a survivor in life and a gentle, gracious lady in death. Mum lived and died with such courage.

Dixie would like to share this little verse she found in Mums collection of junk: "People need people and friends need friends, and we all need love - for a full life depends not on vast riches or greater claim, not on success or worldly fame, but just in knowing that someone cares and holds us close in their thoughts and prayers" and this is so Dossie! We are grateful that you are here to share the kindness, friendship and the love... that was our beautiful Mum! Mum loved her friends; Mum loved her family and Mum loved her yellow roses!

Dixie, Tim and I along with our families, express our appreciation to friends who visited Dossie in Maxwell- Karinya, and the compassionate staff who cared for her & indulged her mischievous sense of humour. Your kindness made a profound difference to our dear Mum's life, and ultimately, to ours! We as a family appreciated your support!

Special thanks also to the **Wickepin Home and Community Care** for their wonderful support of Mum after she returned to Wickepin, and thank you, **Irene** for lovingly officiating her celebration today.

Our heartfelt gratitude to **Dawsons** for their professional care, **Flowers in the Valley** for the beautiful stunning yellow roses and **Tina and Di** who transformed this space into a beautiful reflection of Dossie's spirit. She would cherish your thoughtfulness and creativity – and so do we! Our appreciation also to both the **Wickepin P & C and Wickepin Football club** for providing the delicious food, opening the bar and hosting us today. You have both added to the joy of our celebration.

Before I close, I'd like to mention that we were sent a beautiful song dedicated to our gorgeous Dossie, by Jake, the young chef at Karinya Maxwell Wing. We have included this in the photo tribute, so please make sure you don't miss it. It's beautiful and epitomizes Dossie – thank you Jake!

#### TRIBUTES FROM AFAR

My early memories of you Nan, the one's that I hold onto, were your visits out to the farm. The best mash potato with chives, a dried chicken wishbone sitting on the Everhot-stove ready for the pinky finger challenge - the winner receiving the wish... Driving to the highest hill on our farm at Dongolocking and calling you on the 2-Way on a still, clear night. These were good times Nan, and great memories.

You were a strong, loving and caring independent lady, and very busy - through necessity. Busy making a life for yourself and keeping an eye on Ben, Uncle Clarrie and your growing family. Your mischievous spark shone, and your face lit up when we visited, especially with your greatgrandies... We loved you Nan and we are at peace knowing you are free of pain and reunited with your mum, dad and brother, who you adored.



# **Curried Sausages Recipe**



# Ingredients (11)

1 tbsp olive oil

800g thin beef sausages

1 large brown onion, thinly sliced

2 carrots, peeled, thinly sliced

2 garlic cloves, crushed

1 tbsp Traditional Curry Powder

2 tbsp fruit chutney

2 cups chicken style liquid stock

I cup frozen peas

Rice steamed to serve

Parsley leaves, to serve

# Method

Heat oil in a large, heavy-based saucepan over medium-high heat. Cook sausages, in batches, turning, for 5 to 6 minutes or until browned all over. Transfer to a large plate.

Add onion, carrot and garlic. Cook, stirring, for 5 minutes or until onion has softened. Add curry powder. Cook, stirring, for 30 seconds or until fragrant. Add fruit chutney and stock. Return sausages to pan. Cover, bring to the boil. Reduce heat to medium-low. Simmer, uncovered, for 25 minutes or until sausages are cooked through and sauce thickens.

Stir in peas. Season. Cook for 1 to 2 minutes or until heated through. Serve with steamed rice and sprinkled with parsley leaves.

# What are the origins of curried sausages?

While associated with the food of the English and early Australian settlers, curried sausages actually originated in Germany, where an enterprising Frau combined chopped up pork sausage with British condiments like curry powder and ketchup and started selling it on the streets of Berlin. Known as currywurst, this simple snack is now one of the national dishes of Germany, sold in restaurants and as street food as is or with fries. Currywurst is slightly drier than our curried sausages, which are saucier and sweeter.










# **Community Safety Awareness Sessions**

"I want to take the common-sense approach to policy and advocacy which I am known for to the Federal Parliament."


