Phil was the 'Go to fix it' man of Wickepin be it mechanical, domestic or community related he would tackle anything. If he couldn't fix it, he would find the person who could or find a replacement to get you going.

Phil was the favoured Ambulance officer of the Wickepin branch who didn't panic and thought clearly at an emergency. He would assess situations quickly and take control which included knowing exactly where everything was in the Ambulance and its purpose.

He was an Ambulance Officer for Wickepin for 50 years He was never happier than when he was in his shed changing the gear box or diff in an older vehicle.

He would spend hours sourcing parts on line until he found the right one for any old machine. YouTube would help him with the difficulties he might come across with installing something he hadn't encountered before, proving he was always willing to learn. Many an older farm machine was given an extended life not just in Wickepin but around the Ag region, due to Phil's expertise.

Phil died in 2021 leaving behind a grateful community and his working accomplice in Tom who is now doing the work and favours for 2 people.

The Wickepin Arts & Crafts commenced in 1984 in what was the Roads Board office building, generously given to the Arts & Crafts group by the shire. The Roads Board office moved to the then new Town Hall. The R.S.L. and Freemasons previously occupied the Roads Board office building. The building also comprises a hall which was used for public meetings, Church services by the Catholic Church and as the venue for the first Wickepin show (1915)

In the past the craft centre has accommodated patch workers, china painting, pottery and ceramics,




cake decorating, macrame and card making, Now that our numbers have dwindled, the centre accommodates sewing, diamond dotz, painting, colouring in, knitting and crocheting, with each member bringing in their own project, however we still enjoy weekly meetings and enjoying each others company. On occasions, where there is interest – workshops.

We were very proud to be included in the Intergenerational Programme when the students came and, under supervision, used sewing machines, making lolly bags for the senior's Christmas lunch. Most of the students had previously used sewing machines and we had positive feedback on their experience.



Our craft ladies now make skirts, shorts, jewellery bags, scrunchies, toilet bags, carry bags, marble bags, teddies, dolls and beanies. Once a year we have a community gathering to pack the shoeboxes for the Samaritans Purse Christmas Boxes. The boxes are taken to Perth to be checked and packed into a sea

We also join with the Toolseum for a sausage sizzle after the packing.




The Arts & Crafts also support Wheelchairs for Kids, supplying knitted toys and knitted or crocheted blankets. The factory is in Malaga and well worth a visit. The wheelchairs are made by volunteers in a very large warehouse.



RECOMMENDATION

Can recommend this packet of Casserple Base for a mild curry, following the instructions on the back. The ingredients ask for 500g cubed boneless lamb or 1kg stewing chops. I used 500g diced rump steak, so not technically a lamb casserole. Vegetable and Barley Soup

Ingredients (10)

- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 1 medium brown onion, chopped
- 1 large carrot, peeled, halved lengthways, chopped
- 4 Thin Sliced Streaky Bacon Rashers, trimmed, chopped
- 2 celery stalks, chopped
- 400g can whole peeled tomatoes
- 1 large zucchini halved lengthways, chopped
- 1 tbsp Chicken stock powder
- 6 cups cold water
- 1/2 cup pearl barley, rinsed



Method

Heat oil in a large saucepan over medium heat. Add onion, carrot, bacon and celery. Cook for 10 minutes or until onion has softened. Add tomato, zucchini, stock powder and water. Bring to the boil. Add barley. Reduce heat to low. Simmer, partially covered, for 40 minutes or until barley is tender. Garnish with chopped celery leaves, if you like. Stir into soup. Serve.

Easy Golden Syrup Pudding

Ingredients

1 sheet puff pastry defrosted 1/2 cup golden syrup

1/2 cup milk



Method

Preheat oven to 220C (200C fan-forced). Set aside a small baking or gratin dish. Spread golden syrup over the pastry sheet.

Take one corner and fold 3cm towards the centre, then continue to fold over and over.

Fold pointed ends to the centre and place in a small baking dish. Pour the milk evenly over the roll.

Bake for 25 minutes



How to Make Clay

It's easy to make your own homemade clay with four simple ingredients: baking soda, cornstarch, water and food coloring. If you really want to get fancy, break out some optional googly eyes, feathers, chenille sticks, craft sticks or pompoms! Here's all you need to do to make this simple and fun craft with your kids.

What You'll Need

2 cups baking soda
1 cup cornstarch
1 1/4 cups water
Food colouring
Wiggle eyes, feathers, chenille sticks, craft sticks, pompoms (optional)



What to Do

- 1. Pour the baking soda, cornstarch and water into a pot.
- 2. Cook the mixture over medium heat, stirring until it looks like mashed potatoes.
- 3. Let the clay cool; then divide it into four pieces.
- 4. Add food colouring and knead until smooth.
- 5. Turn your clay into amazing shapes and fun things.
- 6. Add wiggle eyes, feathers and other craft supplies to make cute critters!
- 7. Leave your art in a sunny place to dry.

FACEY GROUP UPDATE

A New Heart for Local Research: Facey Group Shed Opens in Wickepin

It might have been a brisk June evening, but spirits were high as the Facey Group officially opened its brand-new GRDC Research shed in Wickepin on Monday, June 16.

Locals, growers, and industry folks turned up not just to check out a shiny new building but to celebrate something much bigger: a new chapter for grassroots research and local farming know-how.

Like any good farm shed, it's already shaping up to be the practical heart of operations. A place where trials are launched,

ideas are exchanged, and muddy boots are welcome. As most farmers will tell you, a shed isn't just four walls and a roof; it's where the action happens.





This one is no different. The new shed gives Facey Group a permanent home for key equipment like the trial seeder and soil sampler, while also allowing room to grow into future needs. As Facey Group President Sam Horley put it, "It gives us the space and tools to keep pushing innovation relevant to this region."


Behind the scenes, the shed was years in the making, and much of that momentum came from the tireless efforts of Facey Group Deputy CEO Bronwyn Dew. Bronwyn's dogged determination helped turn a big idea into a real building. She

not only wrote the successful grant to GRDC, but also wrangled the tricky logistics to bring it all together. Her work hasn't gone unnoticed; the new shed is a testament to her tenacity.

The event had grazing boards, a barbecue, cold drinks, and warm conversation. Lifetime member and GRDC Western Panel Chair Gary Lang opened the evening with thoughtful remarks and a Q&A about GRDC's role in regional research. Later, another Lifetime member, Audrey Bird, had the honour of officially cutting the cake to mark the occasion.
