

astounded at the shops in the town. Spud Shed, Aldi, Coles, Woolworths, IGA, Best &


Less, Red Dot, Reject shop,

<u>Operation Shoebox 2025 –</u> Wickepin's Generosity in Action



FIREBREAK INSPECTIONS

Fire Hazard Reduction inspections were conducted during the first week of October to ensure that all town properties within the Shire of Wickepin have compliant yards free of long grass and fire hazards in place for the upcoming Bush Fire Season.

If an inspection found that a property did not meet the required fire hazard standards, the property owner will receive a notification letter outlining the necessary works and a deadline for compliance.

Please note that if fire hazard reductions are not in place by the date specified in the letter, infringements of \$250 will be issued.

BURNING PERIODS

Restricted 1 October 2025 to 31 October 2025

Prohibited 1 November 2025 to 7 February 2026

Restricted 8 February 2026 to 14 April 2026

WICKEPIN SWIMMING POOL

The refurbishment of the Wickepin Swimming Pool is nearing completion, and refilling will begin soon. Residents may notice a temporary drop in water pressure during this time.

COUNCIL ELECTIONS – VOTING

As we near the end of the Council Election voting period, residents are advised that from Wednesday, 15 October, they can submit their completed ballot papers directly to the Shire of Wickepin office for late voting to ensure their votes are counted.

DOGS/CATS REGISTRATION RENEWALS

Registration renewals for dogs and cats are due by October 31, 2025. For new registrations, all animals must be microchipped, and microchip paperwork must be provided.

Please note:

- Dogs must be registered if they are 3 months of age or older.
- Cats must be registered if they are 6 months of age or older.

If your dog or cat has passed away, please inform the Shire so we can cancel the registration and ensure our

records are up to date and current.

Set calendar reminders to complete these preparations monthly during fire season.

- O Cut the grass around your property to 10cm or less.
- Prune shrubs so they are not dense.
- Ensure gas cylinders are chained/secured upright.
- Check gas release valves face away from property.
- O Clean gutters.



Complete these preparations if you own a rural property.

- Make sure fire trucks can access and turn around on your property.
- O Check bridge loading and cattle grid loading for fire truck access.
- Create fire breaks along paddock boundaries.
- Store petrol and gas safely.
- Install underground water pumps that lead from dams to the house.
- If a fire threatens, move livestock to a well grazed
- Check generator and pumps are working.

Keep gas cylinders away O from likely direction of fire (i.e. where bush is) and turn



- release valves outwards. Remove shrubs, wood, mulch
- or any flammable material. against or near the house.
- Block any gaps under floor, in the roof spaces, under eaves, external vents, skylights, chimneys and wall claddings.
- Install metal fly wire mesh on all windows, vents and install a protective screen on evaporative air conditioner.
- O Create a mineral earth firebreak along the boundary of your property.
- O Install a fire or heat radiant shield such as a solid fence.

There has been a significant rise in fires related to lithium-ion batteries. Find out how to identify these batteries, understand the risks and be prepared in the event of an incident.

Types of lithium-ion batteries

Many modern portable devices contain a rechargeable lithium-ion battery (LiB). This includes devices such as phones, tablets, power banks, computers, toys, appliances and tools, as well as mobility equipment such as electric bikes and scooters.

Identifying lithium-ion batteries

The batteries can be cylindrical, flat, rectangular, or pouch/device specific. They can be difficult to identify as there is currently no requirement or standard for labelling.

If the battery is rechargeable and has 'Li' or 'Lithium' printed on it, you can safely assume that it is a lithium-ion battery. Common printings include:



- lithium ion
- Li-ion
- Li-po
- Lithium-polymer
- · or other variations of 'Li'.

Why do lithium-ion batteries catch fire?

Lithium-ion batteries (LiBs) are energy-dense and contain material that is highly flammable. The risks and hazards associated with LiBs include fire and explosion, radiation, heat, chemical and electrical.

There are several situations that can lead to lithium-ion batteries catching fire, including:

- overcharging or use of non-compliant charging equipment
- overheating or exposure to heat or extreme temperatures
- physical abuse (e.g., dropping, crushing, piercing, and/or vibrations)
- · short-circuiting, battery cell malfunctions or system faults
- defects or contamination introduced during manufacture.

When LiBs fail, they can undergo thermal runaway. This involves violent bursting of one or multiple battery cells, hissing and release of toxic, flammable and explosive gases, and an intense, self-sustaining fire.

Non-rechargeable or disposable lithium batteries, or lithium metal batteries should also be treated with caution as they can expel molten flammable metal and emit toxic gases during a fire. Small fires involving single use, disposable lithium batteries should be treated as a LiB fire.

Preventing lithium-ion battery fires

To prevent an incident involving lithium-ion batteries (LiBs), only purchase and use devices and equipment from reputable manufacturers and suppliers.

Charging Advice

- Only use chargers that are supplied with the equipment or device, or certified third-party charging equipment that is compatible with the battery specifications. Using chargers with incorrect power delivery (voltage and current) can cause damage to the battery that can lead to fires.
- Check that chargers bear the Regulatory Compliance Mark, to show that it has met the relevant Australian Standards under the **Electrical Equipment Safety System (EESS)**.
- Avoid leaving batteries or devices unattended while being charged or charging overnight. Once the device or battery is fully charged, disconnect it from the charger.
- Don't charge batteries or devices on combustible and insulating surfaces (e.g., beds, couches, or carpet). Keep them away from flammable materials like blankets, clothing, and paper.
- Never use and charge devices such as phones, tablets and e-cigarettes or vaping devices in bed, where they can overheat if you fall asleep.
- Larger batteries and equipment (e.g., power tools and electric scooters) should be charged in the garage, shed or carport away from living spaces.
- Install a smoke or heat alarm in areas where devices are often charged. Have a
 licenced electrician install and interconnect mains-powered smoke alarms where
 possible. Check with the manufacturer or distributor to ensure device models are
 compatible for interconnection.

Usage and Storage Advice

- Never store or leave batteries and devices in areas where they can be exposed to heat or moisture.
- Never leave batteries and devices in direct sunlight or in parked vehicles.
- Never use batteries or devices that show signs of swelling, bulging, leaking, overheating, or signs of mechanical damage (cracked, dented, punctured, or crushed).



Ingredients (12)

- 300g Simply penne Pasta
- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 1 brown onion, cut into thin wedges
- 75g (1/4 cup) Pesto Tomato
- · 2 garlic cloves, crushed
- 2 tbsp plain flour
- 375ml (1 1/2 cups) milk
- 125ml (1/2 cup) thickened cream
- 415g can pink salmon, drained, flaked
- 60g baby spinach
- 80g (1/2 cup) Sun-Dried Tomato Strips
- 80g (1 cup) coarsely grated Coles Simply Cheddar Cheese



Method

Cook pasta in a large saucepan of boiling water following packet directions or until al dente. Drain. Meanwhile, heat oil in a large ovenproof frying pan over medium heat. Add onion and cook, stirring, for 5 minutes or until softened slightly. Add sun-dried tomato, pesto and garlic and cook, stirring, for 1 minute or until aromatic. Add flour and cook, stirring, for 30 seconds or until well combined. Gradually add milk and cream, stirring constantly, until the mixture comes to the boil.

Add the cooked pasta and stir until combined. Add salmon, spinach and sun-dried tomato strips and stir gently until combined. Season.

Preheat an oven grill on high. Sprinkle pasta mixture with cheese and grill for 3-5 minutes or until golden. Serve.

Easy Homemade Pasta

- 2 cups flour
- 3 large eggs, at room temperature
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons water, or as needed

Mix flour, eggs, olive oil, and salt in a bowl until combined. Add

water, 1 teaspoon at a time, to flour mixture until a smooth, thick dough forms.

Turn dough out onto a lightly floured work surface and knead for 10 minutes. Let dough rest for 5 to 10 minutes.


Divide dough into 8 balls; use a pasta machine to roll and cut dough into desired pasta shape.



Cook's Note

This dough makes really great homemade linguine or ravioli using a manual pasta machine. If the dough is too sticky, roll it in a bit of flour.

This recipe makes enough pasta for 24 small raviolis or 4 servings of linguine. Whatever pasta you make, it should take no more than 4 to 6 minutes to boil.



Pasta dishes vary widely across different cultures. Here's a look at some of the most beloved pasta dishes by country:

- Italy: Known for its rich pasta heritage, iconic dishes include Spaghetti Bolognese, Lasagna, and Fettuccine Alfredo.
- **USA**: Popular pasta dishes include Macaroni and Cheese and Pasta Salad, reflecting the country's love for creamy, hearty meals.






ADULT MYSTERY THRILLER: Dust - Michael Brissenden




ADULT HISTORICAL FICTION LARGE PRINT: Restless Dolly Maunder - Kate Grenville

Dolly Maunder was born at the end of the nineteenth century, when society's long-locked doors were starting to creak ajar for women. Growing up in a poor farming family in country New South Wales but clever, energetic and determined, Dolly spent her restless life pushing at those doors.

Most women like her have disappeared from view, remembered only in family photo albums as remote figures in impossible clothes, or maybe for a lemon-pudding recipe handed down through the generations. Restless Dolly Maunder brings one of these women to life as someone we can recognise and whose struggles we can empathise with.

In this compelling new novel, Kate Grenville uses family memories to imagine her way into the life of her grandmother. This is the story of a woman, working her way through a world of limits and obstacles, who was able—if at a cost—to make a life she could call her own. Their ordeal stunned the nation, and left a powerful legacy in its wake. It was the catalyst for many of the maritime safety laws we have today. Viewed through a modern lens, the incompetence of the authorities will leave you flabbergasted. I highly recommend Back From The Dead - I couldn't put it down!



Live Sheep Export Transition Support Packages!

The Australian Government is phasing out live sheep exports by sea from 1 May 2028. To help farm businesses adjust, there are some funding programs now open.

Below is a summary of what is available directly to farmers, how much can be applied for, and the main eligibility conditions.


1. Farm Business Transition Program (Open 7 October – 1 December 2025)

Eligibility

- Crops must be grown under dryland/rainfed conditions in Western Australia.
- Minimum paddock size is 35 ha
- Participants will need to provide crop and input information, with yield validated as whole paddock harvest.

How to Enter

- Entry is FREE
- One entry per crop type per participant
- Full details, including crop variety, sowing date, inputs and rainfall, must be provided.
- · Yields standardised by growing season rainfall.

3. Other Programs

While most other funding streams are directed at processors, transporters, or industry organisations, producers may benefit indirectly through improved supply chains and markets. At this stage, there are no other direct farm-level grants open beyond the two above.
