

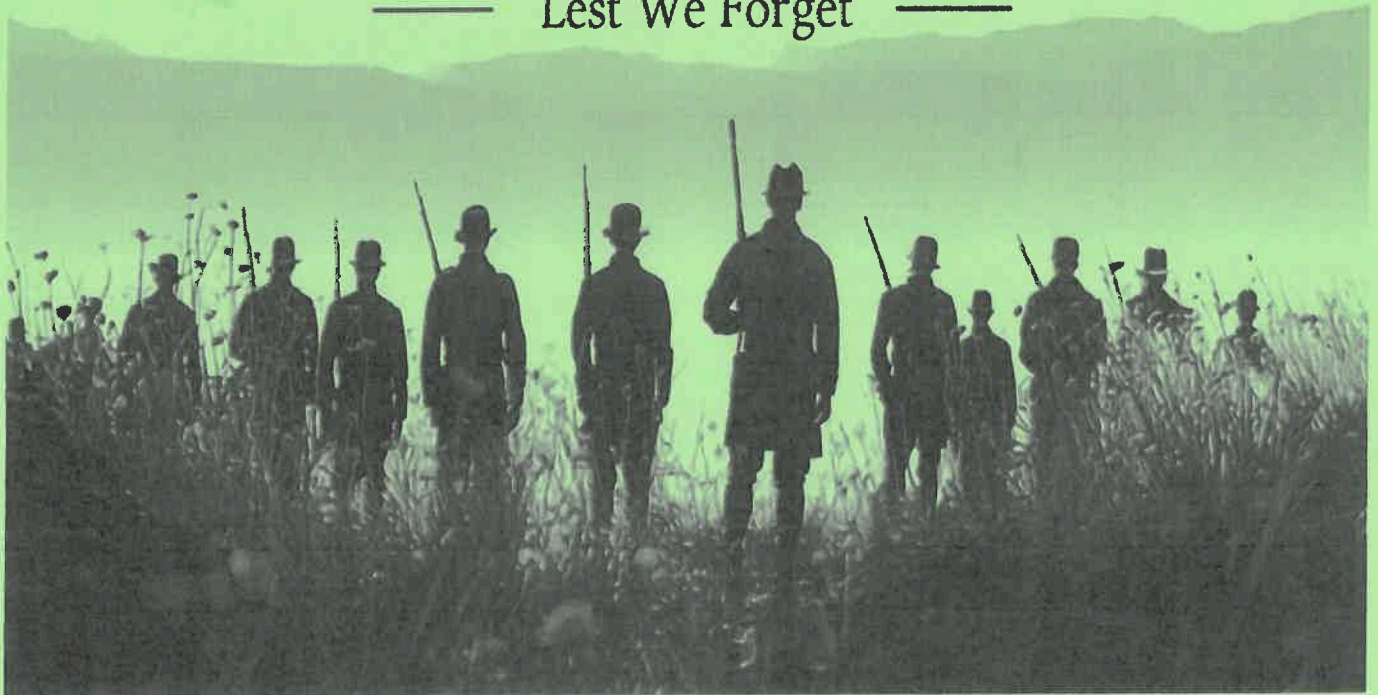

**ANZAC Day is a national day of remembrance in Australia and New Zealand, observed on 25 April to honor the soldiers of the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps (ANZAC) who served and died in wars, conflicts, and peacekeeping operations.**

### **Historical Background**

Anzac Day commemorates the landing of Australian and New Zealand soldiers on the Gallipoli Peninsula in 1915 during the First World War, which was their first major military engagement. The campaign aimed to capture the Dardanelles and open a route to the Black Sea, but it faced fierce resistance from the Ottoman Army. The battle lasted eight months, resulting in heavy casualties, including 2,721 New Zealanders and over 8,700 Australians, with many more injured. The term ANZAC stands for Australian and New Zealand Army Corps, and the soldiers were known as Anzacs.

### **Purpose and Significance**

Anzac Day is not a celebration of victory but a solemn occasion to honor the bravery, sacrifice, and service of all military personnel, both those who died and those who returned. Over time, the day has expanded to commemorate all New Zealanders and Australians who served in wars, conflicts, and peacekeeping missions. It is a time for reflection, remembrance, and recognition of the suffering endured by service members.

### **Observance and Traditions**

Anzac Day is observed annually on 25 April. In New Zealand, it is a public holiday and many people participate in dawn services, parades, and ceremonies at Returned Services Association (RSAs). Traditional symbols include the remembrance poppy, which has been used since 1921 to honor war dead. If the date falls on a weekend, the holiday may be "Mondayised," meaning the following Monday is given as a day off work while the commemoration still occurs on 25 April.

### **Modern Commemoration**

While the first Anzac Day services focused on Gallipoli, later commemorations also recognized New Zealand's involvement on the Western Front and in other conflicts. Today, Anzac Day serves as a unifying occasion for Australians and New Zealanders to reflect on the courage, endurance and sacrifice of their armed forces across all wars.

# Twenty-Two Years on Charlies Run

A country mail run has its ups and downs variety and plenty of human interest as Charlie Fulford of Wickepin has discovered.

It will be 22 years in October since Charlie took over the two mail runs of East Wickepin and Wickepin East Dudinin. In that time, he has grown to know the countryside well. All parts of the run are dry bare paddocks in drought years, floods at the Wogolin in winter and plenty of dust on unsealed roads.

On a perfect November morning I accompanied the mailman on his Wickepin-Wogolin run. By 10 o'clock the station wagon was loaded with a variety of goods-bread, groceries, odd pieces of machinery and a large quantity of mail and papers-these all stacked in order of delivery. Any special orders had been phoned through to the Wickepin store and collected by Charlie or Mrs Fulford in time to catch the mail. Then, all set to go, there was a slow take-off through the town heading east.

Along the Kulin Road we passed through undulating country. Crops were ripening and bales of hay waiting to be carried. Cattle and sheep grazed and wildflowers bordered the roadway.

Charlie drew my attention to a particularly lovely view from a truck bay where caravans are often parked.

At each stop, the driver systematically grabs mail, papers, plus any parcels from the back and hurries to the mailbox, at the same time collecting any parcels or mail to be returned to Wickepin. It's a "keep fit" job with plenty of movement and little time to waste. However, with company, Charlie usually takes longer, slowing down to point out features of interest along the track.

Some orders are quite large, and most mailboxes are built to accommodate them. On pulling up near a 44-gallon drum, Charlie remarked:" Sensible size – if I get a case of fruit, I can stick it in there; no trouble."

A large tin trunk painted white and clearly named rests on a cement wash trough stand. One night a practical joker shifted the whole lot down the road where there were no gates on either side.

An old refrigerator painted black with white lettering makes a handy and unique mailbox while Ginginning's ornate silver painted tractor and matching mailbox makes quite an impact.

All the way along there's a cheery greeting from folk down to meet the mail and sometimes a quick exchange of news. Often there's a request, written or asked; "Would you mind leaving this at the Co-op, or would you deliver a message to so and so." All such requests are obligingly dealt with, an outback service that many city people would envy.

Over the past 21 years, many changes have taken place. The population has dwindled, small schools have disappeared and school bus routes have increased in length. Farmers wives no longer send eggs to market, but in the early years Charlie was taking 100 dozen eggs to Wickepin each trip for dispatch by rail to Narrogin. Cream cans were seen on the roadside then, but now bottled milk has taken its place and milking is a rarity. One of the few exceptions is Mrs W.J. Randall, who still milks several cows and always has delicious fresh cream and home-made butter.

The February floods of 1955 are well remembered by Charlie. Water lay deep in the Wogolin crossing and he recalls a flock of sheep being stranded in an expanse of water. Bales of hay were tied to the fence posts for them to eat until they were rescued by a team of volunteers. Even in a normal year it's very wet through this part of the country and most of the mailman's travelling is done over unsealed roads.

The wet years seem to have made more impact than any extremes of heat. At some stops a comment was made; "Wonder where he is – he hasn't collected Tuesdays mail yet." Or "they can't be going to town today," as a large grocery order was placed in or near a mailbox.

I was shown special points of interest along the way. A beautiful orange flowered grevillea was admired and photographed; a tree trunk hollowed out by well known bird watcher Phil Stone, who also boasts an unusual mailbox, a small Wilkins Service washing machine with colourful blue roof.



At the old 89 Gate, a pine tree and flowering gum mark the spot where a small school once stood. Here also meetings of the Wheatgrowers` Union were held.

Mr Vern Anderson, on whose property the site stands, has preserved a little of the past by leaving the trees planted by former pupils of the school, Mrs Dearlove, of Mandurah, returning to the district, loves to see the tree she planted still flourishing.

At Toolang, we stopped on a rise from where one can see the route of the old mail run to Kirk`s rock. Another landmark along the way is the M.C.G. (Malyalling Cricket Ground), now overgrown with weeds but once the venue of many cricket and football matches. Nearby is the site of the Malyalling school, close to the Bergin property. Each year bulbs planted long ago bloom briefly on this spot, a reminder of past pupils.

Further on is the Ahrens home, built of clay bricks made on the farm. Remains of a kiln built to fire the bricks can still be seen on this property. It`s a solid old house which brough back memories to Charlie. About 1950, a pre-wedding party was held there for Dolly Ahrens and Cam Orchard. Charlie commented on the beautiful fast floor, little knowing it had been scattered with linseed instead of sawdust. It remained slippery for a long` time, to the owner`s annoyance, but that evening everyone was out to enjoy themselves. Wally and Tilly Ahrens played the Accordion, keeping the guests on their toes until the early hours. They came from Malyalling, Wickepin, and Yealering for the celebration.

It was April, after early rains when I accompanied Charlie on the Wickepin-West Dudinin trip which takes in 30 properties. We had called on 35 on the first journey. The van was loaded with the usual assortment, including fresh, warm bread, very tempting after an early breakfast! Heading east again beyond the townsite, Charlie drew my attention to houses once built for a Jewish community, an old school site and almond and pepper trees planted by the settlers.

Off the main highway, we were soon heading down a winding bush road. Tractors were busy on each side and the country was patterned in the green and brown. Women came down to meet the mail and took home fresh bead for lunches. Drums are the most common mailboxes and sometimes with a hinged lid or a bag to protect the contents.

At "Longacres," mail is delivered almost to the door, round a curved drive to a mailbox in the front garden. We passed through the well-known "Lewisdale" property, where yellow jam trees bloomed against brown ploughed paddocks, and close to "Allandale" homestead, where handsome trotters gazed inquisitively at the mail van.

Elsinore school site, on the old Sprigg property, is marked by pepper and kurrajong trees. Fences are still standing and so are the frames of a large swing. This was another social centre when farms were more closely settled, the school being used as a meeting place and hall. Dances were often held there with the Ahrens family, Tilly, Wally, Delf and Bill, providing the music. Tennis was played there and each year a Christmas Tree was held at the school. Happily, this tradition continues and the Elsinore families still have Christmas Tree in the shearing shed with a buffet tea provided and plenty of fun for children and grown-ups.

Mail to be posted in Wickepin is often accompanied by a handful of small change-another job for Charlie when he returns to town. Letters are stamped and posted to catch the afternoon mail.

An extra charge is made by the contractor for all the parcel deliveries on he`s run. This charge hasn`t altered in over 20 years.

The Wogolin and its branches cross and recross the mail run. According to local history, Wogolin is an aboriginal word for snake-and is apply named.

There are empty farmhouses along the run-a sign of the times. In some cases, the owners have moved into town, or the property has been bought by a neighbour. A neat, white painted mailbox is secured to a big tree near P.J. Healey`s gate, a far cry from long-ago days when mail was dumped at Healey`s Tree in chaff bags bought out from Narrogin by horse and sulky. Mrs Henderson, of Dudinin, referred to this in book "From Birdville West."

There is little that escapes the mailman`s notice- a romance flourishing frequent letters, mail from far away places and foreign stamps- all mean something to a man like Charlie, who is interested in everyone on his run.

Empty houses have a history and there`s a story around those lone pines and pepper trees.

CHARLIE FULFORD, who is a well-known figure in Wickepin, came from England in 1920, vowing to return to his homeland in ten years.

Before leaving and while looking up information about Australia, he came across the photo of "Coonigan," first home of the McCall family of Wickepin. It was included in a government publication of early settlers' homes.

His first years were spent in Victoria and then in W.A., where he worked in the Kulin district before farming the Watkins property at Malyalling for three years after marrying in 1935. His Wedding to Alice Kemp took place in the little Methodist Church in Wickepin, an iron building still in use.

The Fulford's lived at Muchea for a time before Charlie joined the army. In 1951 they moved to Wickepin, taking over a small business, and in 1953 Charlie got the contract for the mail run and business from Mr. McVeigh. His first vehicle on the route was a utility, but for some time he has driven a large, comfortable station wagon.

Mr. and Mrs. Fulford take an active part in Wickepin's community life and on March 2<sup>nd</sup>, when they celebrated their 40<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary, they received congratulations and warm good wishes from a wide circle of friends and relatives.

Charlie had planned to retire this year but decided to keep on the job for some time.

From comments heard on the run, I'm sure people of East Wickepin and West Dudinin hope he continues the good work for many months to come.



A special mention to the lovely and talented Mulvie Corke. She has given us a snapshot of life in 1975 and shown the vital importance of the mail run at that time.

Mulvie farmed at Yealering with her husband Doug.

It was a sign of the times that she was published as Mrs DG Corke.

Charlie Fulford and Mulvie Corke were two local legends and unsung heroes of Wickepin.

Kevin Pauley nominated Phil Watson and Charlie Fulford after we asked for Local Legends and Unsung Hero stories.

Phil Watson's story was published last year.

# 'Everything IN' wartime stew

## Everything IN wartime stew

1 lb of mince beef or a mixture of leftover meats  
1 small cabbage  
1 onion or 1 leek  
Any veggies that need using up  
Several soft tomatoes that are no good for anything else  
Oxo and marmite (marmite is optional)  
Salt and pepper  
Water



## Method

Brown the mince or leftover meats and onions  
Chop up the remaining veg into smallish pieces  
Chop up the soft tomatoes and add to meat and onions and then add water (about a 1000 ml)  
Add the oxo and marmite and stir  
Add the chopped veggies  
Cook and occasionally stir adding salt, pepper and some dried herbs like thyme to your own taste  
Cook on medium heat in the saucepan for about 20 further minutes  
Enough for 8 served with mashed potatoes or bread and butter.

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## Spam Hash

### Spam Hash Ingredients (for 1 person)

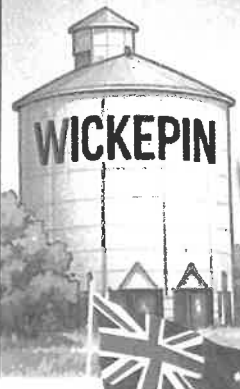
2 largish potatoes  
1/2 onion  
1/4 can of spam  
blob butter/margarine



### Method

Wash potatoes  
Cut into quarters and boil until firmly cooked, remove from water and cool  
Chop onion  
Chop up 1/4 can spam into chunks  
Take large frying pan add in large blob of butter and heat  
Add in onions and cook gently until nice and translucent  
Take potatoes and chop them into smaller chunks  
Add these and the spam chunks into the pan with the onions and continue to fry and stir  
Turn down frying pan and cover if possible and continue to cook for another 5-10 minutes.  
At this stage you can add in some chopped tomato if you like.  
mixture is sticking too much add in a little bit of water and stir  
Once cooked served with your favourite veggies!

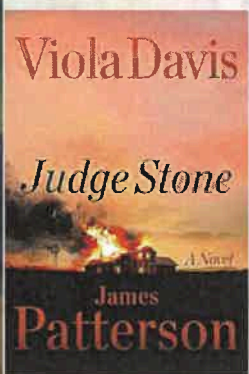


### **AUSTRALIAN ADULT CRIME THRILLER: Dead Fall Lake - S.R White**

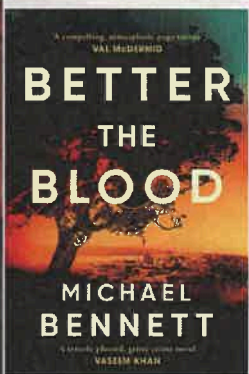
### **ADULT CRIME THRILLER: Better the Blood - Michael Bennett**

# Garden Snippets...

## Backyard Composting



## ...Trash to Treasure

Turn household waste into a garden helper with these easy composting tips...

We all know that we can do more to reduce household waste, and one easy and productive way to cut down your rubbish is by Composting. It's the natural process of recycling organic waste into a nutrient-rich fertilizer for the garden. This improves the soil and helps it hold moisture and nutrients, enhancing the overall growing conditions for your plants.

Your choice of composting system comes down to Space and the Type of waste that you have.

Traditional composting involves layering food and household and garden waste into an above-ground bin or tumbler, but if you have mostly kitchen scraps, choose a worm farm or bokashi bin. A bokashi bin can be kept in the kitchen where it breaks down food scraps through fermentation, while a worm farm should be outdoors in a cool or shaded spot. Both systems are great if you are time poor, and are as easy as throwing scraps into the rubbish bin.

Above-ground compost bins are ideal if you have the space. You can process more food scraps and large amounts of garden waste. Position bins or tumblers in an easily accessible spot – a shadier setting will help the compost stay moist, while direct sun will speed up the composting process.

**Recipe for Success:** The type of waste added to compost bins is the key to success. You need alternating layers of nitrogen-based (green) and carbon-based (brown) materials. Greens consist of food scraps, grass clippings and fresh garden clippings. Browns consist of small twigs and branches, straw, newspaper and non-glossy paper and cardboard.

Get into the habit of tearing or cutting up the materials into small pieces as this helps increase the rate of decomposition.

Water and Oxygen are also essential. Introduce oxygen by aerating your compost regularly, which in turn promotes microbial activity, which helps break down the materials faster. Use a compost aerator to bring more air into the mix. Only a small amount of water is required – not too wet, but not too dry – in order to create the moist environment which will allow the microbes to flourish.

**Balance:** For the perfect compost, balancing all of the elements is important. One part Green to two parts Brown, Aerate frequently and Maintain moisture levels.

*The result of this recipe will turn waste problems into garden solutions.*

**Maturity Timing:** The time to mature varies between systems – a compost bin can take as little as four weeks, but a worm farm can take three to six months. Compost is ready to use when it becomes dark brown, crumbly and has an earthy smell. It also needs to be cool to touch. If it is hotter than ambient outdoor temperature, it needs to rest before use.

Once ready, spread it in existing pots and beds or use it to prepare new planting zones.
