After the storm, please check fencing for any damage and make required repairs to keep pets and your little ones safe.

Keeping an Eye Out for Downed or Damaged Trees

With the bad weather we have had, please keep an eye out for trees and if you see any on Shire roads or Shire land, please report it to the office for us to remove.

Also, check the trees above your houses, garages and above you as there could be broken limbs stuck in the branches that could pose a danger to yourself or others.

⚠️ Please Slow Down – Our Crews Are At Work ⚠️

This is a reminder to all road users to slow down and drive with caution when approaching any of our work crews operating on or near the roadside. This applies to both the works crew and our gardeners/town maintenance crew.

Our staff are often out on foot or in vehicles carrying out essential maintenance and improvement work, their safety depends on your awareness.

Please:

- ✔️ Reduce your speed when you see roadwork signs or workers on the roadside.
- ✔️ Obey all traffic control measures including cones and signs.
- ✔️ Stay alert – look out for people and equipment that may be close to traffic lanes.

Burning of Stubble and Garden Waste

Property owners and Residents are reminded that even though we are outside of the Burning Permit period, those wishing to burn materials are still responsible for the fires. If your fire escapes your property and damages neighbouring property or road verge, you will be issued with a letter and *may even be issued with a fine as per the Bush Fires Act 1954.*

Any road wash outs or damage from the storm, please report to the Shire so we can schedule repairs. Please note that the scheduling of any repairs will be done on a priority basis, considering the other works in progress.

Fight the Bite – Mosquito Program

With the rains and moisture, mosquitoes are becoming a problem. The Shire will be following our Mosquito Management Plan for control methods, which may include the use of fogging.

If you do not want the fogger operating near your house, please advise the Administration Office.

Cover up

Wear long, loose-fitting, light-coloured clothing, covering as much of the body as you can. Mosquitoes can bite through tight clothes like jeans. Make sure children are also appropriately covered up.



Repel

Use insect repellent containing DEET (diethyltoluamide) picaridin or Oil of Lemon Eucalyptus (OLE), also known as PMD, and always follow instructions on the label.



Clean up

Stop mosquitoes breeding in water pooling around your home or holiday accommodation by emptying water from containers.

Air Fryer Cheesy VEGEMITE & Chicken Sausage Rolls

Ingredients

- 500g chicken mince
- 125g can corn kernels, drained, roughly chopped
- 1 medium zucchini, grated
- 1 small carrot, grated
- 2/3 cup grated cheddar cheese
- 1/3 cup panko breadcrumbs
- 1 1/2 tablespoons VEGEMITE Squeezy
- 1 green onion, chopped
- 1 garlic clove, crushed
- 3 sheets frozen puff pastry, partially thawed, halved
- 1 egg, lightly beaten
- Sesame seeds, to sprinkle
- Sweet chilli sauce, to serve



Method

1. Place chicken mince, corn kernels, zucchini, carrot, cheddar cheese, panko breadcrumbs, VEGEMITE Squeezy, green onion and garlic in a bowl. Season with pepper. Mix well to combine.
2. Place 1 pastry half on a flat surface. Spoon 1/3 cup mince mixture along 1 long side of pastry. Brush edges with egg. Roll up from long side to form a log. Trim ends. Cut into 4 equal pieces. Repeat with remaining pastry, mince mixture and egg.
3. Brush tops of rolls with egg and sprinkle with sesame seeds. Line air fryer with baking paper, leaving a 1cm border to allow air to circulate. Cook on 200C, in batches, for 13 to 15 minutes or until golden and cooked through. Stand for 5 minutes. Serve with sweet chilli sauce.

The Vegemite Sandwich

And it was that every day at school, his mum would give him the same meal. That's right, the iconic Australian Vegemite sandwich.

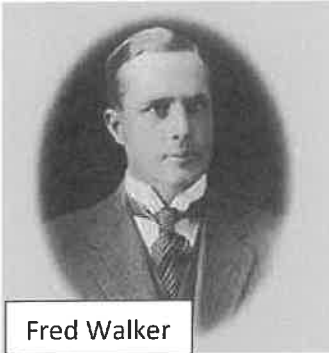


Great Australian Stuff

Hosted by Tony Armstrong, this four-part series uncovers the surprising stories behind some of our most loved - and loathed – iconic Australian 'stuff'

VEGEMITE

In 1919, following the disruption of British Marmite imports after World War I, the Australian company Fred Walker & Co. gave Cyril Callister the task of developing a spread from the used yeast being dumped by breweries. Callister had been hired by the chairman Fred Walker.

Callister used autolysis to break down the yeast cells from waste obtained from the Carlton & United brewery. Concentrating the clear liquid extract and blending with salt, celery and onion extracts formed a sticky black paste.^[1]

Following a competition to name the new spread "Vegemite" was selected by Fred Walker's daughter Sheilah, and it was registered as a trademark in Australia in 1919.

Vegemite first appeared on the market in 1923 with advertising emphasising its value to children's health, but it failed to sell well.

Faced with growing competition from Marmite, from 1928 to 1935 the product was renamed "Parwill" to make use of the advertising slogan "Marmite but Parwill", a two-step pun on the new name and that of its competitor; i.e. "If Ma [mother] might ... then Pa [father] will." This attempt to expand market share was unsuccessful and the name reverted to Vegemite, but it did not recover its lost market share.

In 1925, Walker had established the Kraft Walker Cheese Co. as a joint venture company with J. L. Kraft & Bros to market processed cheese and, following the failure of Parwill, in 1935 he used the success of Kraft Walker Cheese to promote Vegemite.



Different Vegemite jars – National Museum of Australia

Originally introduced in 57 g (2 oz) milk glass jars and in sizes up to a 2.7 kg (6 lb) tin, from 1956 Vegemite was sold in clear glass jars.

Vegemite's rise to popularity was helped by the marketing campaigns written by J. Walter Thompson advertising that began in 1954, using groups of smiling, healthy children singing a catchy jingle titled "We're happy little Vegemites".

We're happy little Vegemites. As bright as bright can be. We all enjoy our Vegemite For
breakfast, lunch, and tea. Our mummies say we're growing stronger.

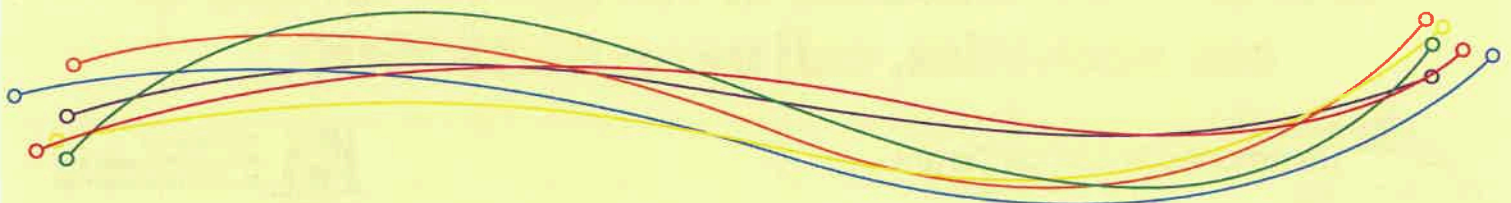

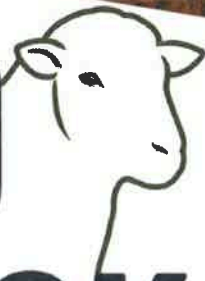

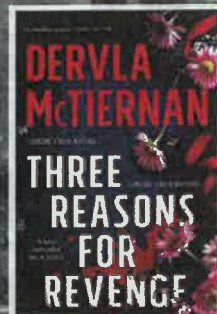
ADULT MYSTERY THRILLER: *Three Reasons For Revenge* - Dervla McTiernan

As she races to uncover the connection between three seemingly unrelated people, Judith discovers she's no longer just investigating the game - she's being forced to play.



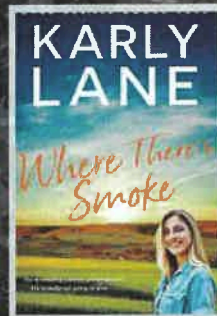

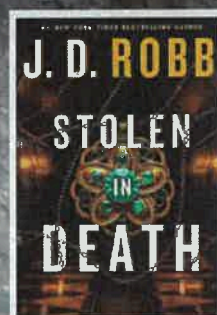


ADULT LARGE PRINT ROMANCE THRILLER: *Stolen In Death* - J.D. Robb

NON FICTION BIOGRAPHY: *Sisters Under Fire* - Colin Burgess

The nursing profession is one historically filled with everyday heroes whose work often makes the difference between life and death. Yet Nursing Sisters Margaret Anderson and Vera Torney of the 2/13th Australian General Hospital felt far from heroic as they evacuated Singapore on the converted cargo ship *Empire Star* in 1942. After Japanese occupation, every nurse without exception had requested to stay and tend to their wounded patients, but instead were ordered to evacuate as part of a hastily contrived and ultimately perilous escape plan.

The nurses were split among three ships: *Wah Sui*, *Empire Star* and the ill-fated *Vyner Brooke*. On the *Empire Star*, the courageous and selfless actions of Sisters Anderson and Torney while under fire would deservedly earn them the highest civilian awards for bravery. On the *Vyner Brooke*, 21 Australian nurses survived the ship sinking only to be shot down in cold blood on Banka Island. Against the odds, there was a solitary survivor of that massacre: Sister Vivian Bullwinkel.

This deeply researched book pays respectful homage to all Australian nurses: those who lost their lives during this tumultuous evacuation; those who became prisoners of the Japanese; and those who survived to offer their services to the wounded, time and time again.
