Eulogy - Colin Lang

Most of you will remember Dad as a happy, kind, loving man. He was all of that, but he was so much more. It is my privilege to speak on behalf of Bev and Janine, about 97 years of life filled with love, caring, determination and sheer hard work.

Dad was the first child of Sam/Bram and Myrtle Lang. He was born in 1928 in Narrogin when Wickepin was just past the first settler stage. He came home to the farm that his father had purchased only 5 years earlier and the farm became the epicentre of Dad's life for the next 80 odd years. The Depression, rabbits and WW2, affected Dad's generation but surprisingly not their optimism and zest for life. In fact, we learnt in later years that Grandad and Nan tried to sell the farm for an easier life in 1931, but couldn't find a buyer. Gosh that would have changed Dad's life. Dad's siblings arrived, Kevin, Shirl and young Murray in 1936 completed the family. Happy Birthday Uncle Murray who turned 90 on the weekend.

Ok, some stories to paint a picture of Dad's life. I feel that most of the stories about Dad were acquired by osmosis over the 60 years that I saw him most days, because he spoke about himself very rarely.

The story surrounding the photo of Dad on the horse Tommy at the Narrogin Show as a 10-year-old is legendary in our family. In 1938 Dad and Tommy got on the train at Malyalling on Friday, stayed with his uncle in Narrogin that night and rode in the Narrogin show on Saturday. Dad and Tommy couldn't afford the luxury of a train home on the Sunday, so Dad rode the 55km home. Jimmy Rose, happy 98th birthday yesterday, Jim, remembers that day in 1938 and Dad calling in with Tommy to get a drink and a feed. Mrs Rose cooked lunch for Dad and sent him on his way with another 20 odd km to go. I have no doubt that Tommy and Dad were back together and wandering off to school the next morning, as they did every school morning.

However, Uncle Kev remembers the story differently. He remembers that Dad rode Tommy to Narrogin on Friday, travelling with the Gallagher family. So, Dad rode both ways but had adult help at least part of the way. Either way, it was an amazingly different world within one lifetime. Uncle Kev and Auntie Shirl's recollection is that Dad was a very good horse rider and won many events. Another tale of Dad as a primary school child was his fence checking of Philbin's. A leased block some 9km east of the farm, now part of the farm, Dad would set off at sunup every Saturday and go and check the sheep and fences. Hard work, focus to task, helping the family and a love of farming, were values that Dad displayed all his life.

Dad's family life has always sounded more like work than play to me. Holidays, what are they? One of the photos shows Dad & Kev with their Mum & Dad on a ship to Adelaide to meet their grandmother and years later, Shirl did that trip on the train with her father. School we've heard a lot about, particularly the teacher Fred Chaney, who went from Malyalling Primary School to Federal parliament. Dad's secondary education took him to Albany High, Denmark Ag College and Narrogin Ag in 1944, when it had re-opened after being used for war efforts in 1941-43. In fact, google told me that Narrogin Hospital was sandbagged in 1942 to protect it from Japanese bombers. Dad grew up in an uncertain world.

Dad found his happy place in 1945. He and his hard-working father put in a huge crop of 600 acres of wheat. 10 inches of rain in June another 10 in July and a return of 900 bags of wheat delivered to Malyalling made the Lang family the biggest deliverers to Malyalling wheat bin that year. That's 1.5 bags/ac for those non mathematicians. Contrasting today's 4t/ha or 20 bags/ac. All this crop was ploughed worked back seeded and harvested with horses and Dad's love and affinity with horses grew. After 1946 all of Dad's seeding and harvesting were done with a tractor. 24th March 1949 tragedy struck the family with the passing of Bram, dad's father. This thrust great responsibility on Dad as the eldest boy. So he just worked hard and protected the younger siblings and took on responsibilities he probably wasn't ready for. Brother Kevin gave up his dream job at the newspaper to help the family and Shirley and Murray in particular credits Dad with being very protective and a father figure/role model at a tough time in their adolescent years. Nan was very strong, as were the neighbours especially the Hemley's and Dad was particularly fond of Bill and Rene who were the first to offer help.

Although Dad did step up, the stress of his Father's passing had its consequence, Dad quietly suffered the effects of that stress all his life but learned to cope.

In happier news, Dad was playing football for initially Malyalling, then Wickpin. Dad was a determined, hard at it over winning premierships at Wickpin in 1952 and 1953, being crowned the best and fairest in the 1953 premiership year. Dad's other playing highlight was winning the fairest & best at a Northam Carnival which was the equivalent of today's country week and getting an invite to train in Perth for the WAFL. This was an offer he declined due to his responsibilities to family and farm. A different person may have been enticed by the bright lights, but not the dad that I knew. Uncle Murray described Dad as a good footballer with a short fuse, as evidenced by his bottom lip which got rearranged one day. It was scarred now I come to think of it.

In 1949 a combined 21st with Jim Rose, Nina McLean and June Hoskin was held in the hall just down the road here and Dad had passed a significant milestone for those times. Dad met Mum, through his mate Bill English, maybe as early as 1949, and by 1951 a romance has ensued. Dad's letters to Mum, while she was in Perth at teachers' college, describe a lot of farm work and a very vibrant social scene in Wickpin. Many dances and private parties. Dad and Mum got married on the 16 July 1955 and were married for almost 60 years. Together they made a family, Bev, Janine and I, established the farm business from his father's estate, built two houses and eventually slowed down a little in retirement in Wickpin together. Bev, Janine and I had everything we needed for a great childhood. Dad's protective instincts and his never waning energy gave us a great ride. Bev remembers feeling like dad never treated her like **"only a girl"** and he was disgusted when the old bloke at CSIRO ended Bev's dream of becoming a scientist with the comment **"but you're a girl"**. Janine remembers Dad was small in height making him hard to find in a crowd. However, he had the biggest, brightest, most contagious laugh which could always be heard wherever he was. When trying to find him no-one needed 'Find my phone' and you didn't have to wait long for that big laugh to let you know exactly where he was.

I remember many farm stories and being proud of him for starting D grade footy in Wickpin. Apparently, he turned many a young lad into a later champion, but that may have been just Snowy talking about himself? He followed my footy and the Wickpin Football club closely and until he left Wicky in 2015. Dad still barracked for Wicky against the Hawks, even when his grandsons Sam and Ben played for them, much to the displeasure of Bev.

The farm post Bram was quite a journey, initially in partnership with Murray and Jude and then with Sue and I. Dad and Murray worked together for a long time. All of us kids will remember waiting or playing in a shed, on a road or in a paddock while the two brothers discussed farming and world political problems. Gosh that was boring! They remained close confidants, initially Dad as a father figure but in typical Dad fashion he had the humility to accept the younger persons opinion as Murray grew older. Lang Brothers was dissolved in 1976, and they embarked on their individual journeys. Dad was also an innovator. When I wanted to put lupins in Jo Anchors paddock in about 1992, he wasn't pleased. When we discussed it, I found out that Dad had learnt at Narrogin Ag in 1944 about sub clover and its Nitrogen fixing abilities. He'd brought the new technology home to the farm and got permission from his father to try something new. My Lupins were going to mean that his clover sown in 1945, wouldn't persist any longer. A few more days of debate and Dad said something like **"nothing lasts for ever"**.

Hard work was never far from Dad and for about 10 years in the 1950's he went shearing between seeding and harvest. Dad's motivation was to get money for his family which was scarce at the time. He had a 2-stand plant which he dragged from shed to shed. He and his mate Bill English were competing as contractors, and they were always competitive those two. He shored his last sheep around his 80th birthday.

Sheep did however expose the other side of Dad's personality. If he had a little white line fever in footy, he had a massive dose of brown board fever in the sheep yards. Sheep and dogs coped incredible torrents of abuse when progress was stymied. It was always when things didn't happen quickly that Dad would lose it. I found it quite incredible that you could be so upset in the yards and then come home and tell Mum he'd had a great day doing sheep work. The dogs reconciled this better than me and Dad had some great dogs.

Dad was also a very keen participant in the Wickepin Pasture Improvement Group (may have started it) and the learnings from Alec Brown and the Kiwis were implemented. The pasture was consumed by sheep, eventually starting the Wyoming Downs Merino stud. This was inspired by Clarrie Russell and his Yarling Brook merino stud which was probably the leading stud in Western Australia at the time and Colin Russell was a mate of Dads from Malyalling Primary school. I was fortunate to have a dad with an inclusive mindset, so all the changes I wanted to make were rarely given the no deal. Dad was very proud of the farm that he started and we continued.

The later years when Dad and Mum, moved to Wickepin, life slowed a little. Dad still came to the farm but was very happy to hand over the responsibility of being the primary driver, he had after all carried that responsibility from 1949 till the mid 1990's. Dad took care of the sheep which was his love and it was only once he stopped doing it that I realised how much he actually did. He spent Friday nights at the club, played a lot of bowls, (which Dad played from the formation of the club for 50 years), enjoyed some travel and was an excellent Grandad to seven grandies. Our kids were especially lucky living so close to Grandad & Grandma.

Dad, his siblings, their partners and Mum's family were incredibly close. They mixed across family lines as though they were all siblings and they travelled and socialised a lot together. Christmas included Langs and Murrays just whoever could make it. Dad & Mum travelled through the UK, Europe, America, New Zealand and saw most of Australia. They travelled often with Mums brother Colin and Auntie Heather or Auntie Joan & Uncle Chris and one highlight I remember is them being shown around Philadelphia and New York by Mum's cousin Tricia, who lived in Philly. They had a particular love of wildflowers and chased them locally and all over the state, often in their caravan, eventually settling for annual trips to Carnarvon to escape the winter cold.

Karinya was Dad's home for the last 10 years of his life. The care and generosity that all the staff showed dad was something that comforted Bev, Janine and I. There is a saying that you reap what you sow and that applies very much to Dad at Karinya. He always was polite, respectful and accepting of whatever came his way on his downhill run. He was also up for a bit of fun. Dad's delight at the racing channel and his banter with a young Karinya staff member about having a punt, (that would have been a first), I suspect was just Dad admiring the horses which as we have heard he had a long affinity with. Bev's care of Dad during her twice weekly hour-long visits, also needs recognition. She was Dad's carer and best mate for the last ten years, since Mum passed away. Not always an easy job but enormous thanks from particularly Janine and I.

Dad was universally regarded as a "good bloke". Google's AI defined a good bloke as a man who is honest, reliable, friendly and generous. 4 ticks. Dad also used his inner drive to make life better for his siblings, his family and his community. Rest now Dad and feel the love you so richly deserve.

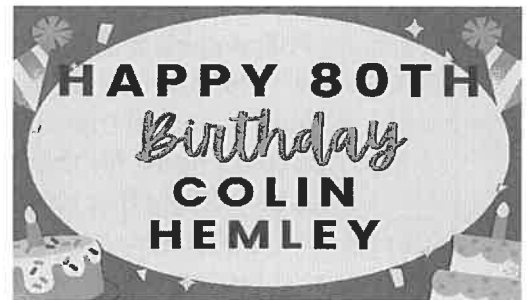

Help make your neighbourhood greener and get a cash rebate too. For the next four years, up to 10,000 Western Australians a year can claim a rebate on the purchase of a native tree to plant on their private property as part of the new Treebate initiative.

Western Australians who purchase a native tree from a local nursery can make a claim of up to \$150 via the ServiceWA app.

It's as easy as One, Two, Tree.

One: Buy a tree. Two: Plant the tree. Tree: Make a claim via ServiceWA.

And don't forget you'll need to keep your tax invoice and a photo of the plant label to get your rebate. The State Government is committed to strengthening WA's urban canopy for the future, with Treebate opening from 28 July 2025.

Eligibility

All Western Australians aged 18 years and over are eligible to claim **one native tree**.

To receive the rebate you must:

- Choose a **native tree** with a canopy that reaches at least three metres in height when mature.
- Have a photo of the plant label showing the scientific or common name to upload in your claim.
- Get a tax invoice as proof of purchase. You will need a valid tax invoice to claim your rebate.

King Rocks Wind Farm

Transportation of wind turbines



Thank you to the community for your patience during the transportation of wind turbine components as part of the King Rocks Wind Farm.

The transportation of components and infrastructure for 17 wind turbines commenced in late May 2026 and will continue until approximately October. Weather and transport conditions permitting, deliveries are occurring up to seven days per week, setting off from the Port of Bunbury at sunrise.

The blades, which measure 80m in length, are scheduled to pass through the Shire of Wickpin in the middle of the day before travelling through the Shire of Kulin to the wind farm.

Blades and other turbine components will be escorted by traffic pilots. If you find yourself behind an oversized load, please do not pass until the pilot has given you an instruction to do so. The blade transport delivery sizes will be up to 94 metres in length, 4.4 metres in width, and 27 tonnes each load. The oversized load will be stopping every 20-25 km along the route to relieve any traffic behind them.

About the project



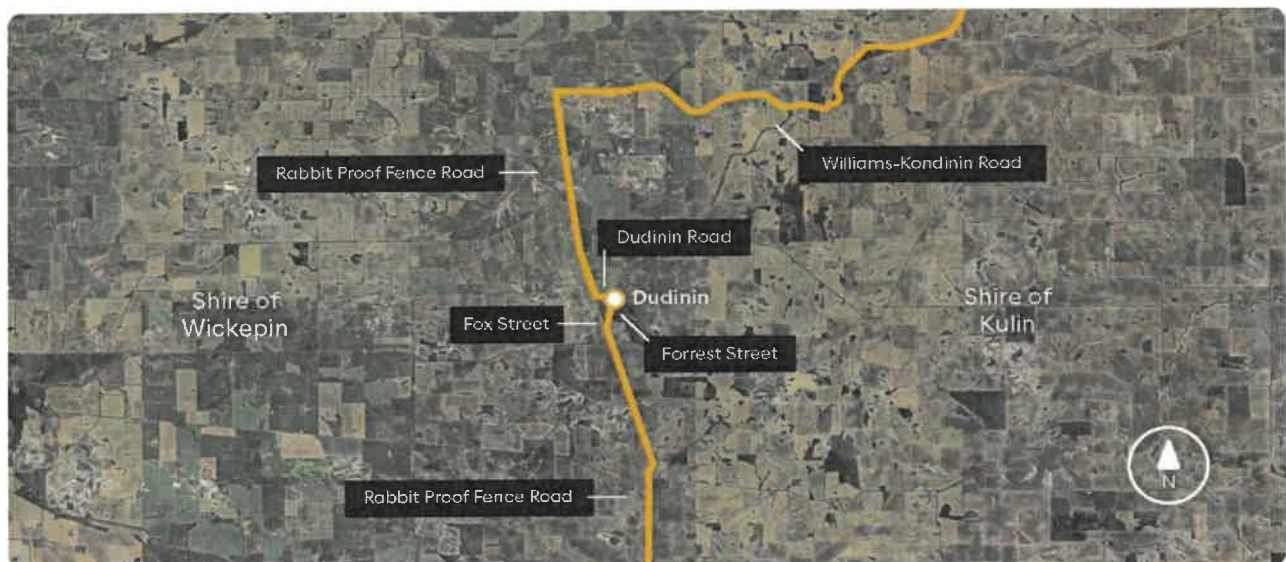
The King Rocks Wind Farm will generate up to 105 megawatts of renewable energy from 17 turbines installed 35 km north-east of Hyden.

Turbine components are being delivered from the Port of Bunbury to the wind farm site.

If slowed behind an oversized load, school bus operators are asked to contact the pilot using a UHF channel 40 to notify them of their position behind the load. The load will then pull over when safe to do so and the pilot will signal for the school bus to pass.

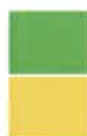

Christmas in July recipes

Embrace the joy of a winter Christmas celebration with these warming festive recipes.

Mulled wine

Ingredients

750 millilitre bottle red wine
2 tablespoon cointreau or orange liqueur
1 cup (250ml) water
2 x 5cm pieces orange rind
2 oranges, juice of
1/2 cup (110g) caster sugar
2 cinnamon sticks
2 star anise

Method

Combine wine, Cointreau, water, orange rind and juice, sugar and spices in a large saucepan. Bring to the boil, stirring to dissolve the sugar. Simmer for 5 minutes or until warmed through and some of the alcohol has evaporated.



White Christmas

Celebrate Christmas in style with white chocolate, dried fruits and nuts and crispy puffed rice.

Ingredients

500g white chocolate, chopped coarsely
1 cup (35g) rice bubbles
1 cup (160g) sultanas
1 cup (140g) macadamias, roasted, chopped coarsely
1 cup (160g) dried apricots, finely chopped
1 cup (130g) dried sweetened cranberries
3/4 cup (105g) pistachios, roasted, chopped coarsely
1 teaspoon ground cardamom



Method

Grease a 20cm x 30cm rectangular slice pan; line base and long sides with baking paper, extending paper 5cm over sides.

In a large heatproof bowl over a large saucepan of simmering water (do not let water touch base of bowl), melt chocolate. Remove from heat; quickly stir in remaining ingredients.

Press mixture firmly into pan. Refrigerate for 2 hours, or until firm.

Cut into about 32 pieces to serve.

CHRISTMAS CRACK RECIPE

INGREDIENTS

- ☐ 1 CUP (227g) UNSALTED OR SALTED BUTTER
- ☐ 1 CUP (220g) PACKED LIGHT OR DARK BROWN SUGAR
- ☐ 40 SALTED SALTINE CRACKERS, ABOUT 1 SLEEVE
- ☐ 1 PKG (270g-300g) MILK OR SEMI-SWEET CHOCOLATE CHIPS
- ☐ ADDITIONAL TOPPINGS LIKE NUTS, CANDY, OR SPRINKLES.

INSTRUCTIONS

1. PREHEAT OVEN TO 350F. LINE A LARGE BAKING SHEET WITH HEAVY DUTY ALUMINUM FOIL. (IF USING REGULAR FOIL, SPRAY WITH NON-STICK COOKING SPRAY FOR EASY REMOVAL).
2. SPREAD THE CRACKERS OUT ON THE FOIL IN A SINGLE LAYER AND FOLD UP THE EDGES OF THE FOIL TO BOX IN THE CRACKERS. SET ASIDE.

Christmas in Australia

Christmas in July is a festive celebration held in mid-winter, offering a wintry Christmas experience with food, decorations, and events, especially popular in Australia.

Christmas in July is a **celebration that mimics the traditional Christmas experience** but occurs in July, during the Southern Hemisphere's winter. It provides an opportunity to enjoy **snow-themed decorations, cozy fires, mulled wine, festive feasts, and Christmas music**—elements that are difficult to experience during Australia's hot summer Christmas on December 25. The concept originated from the French opera *Werther* in 1892, with the first known event in 1933 at a girls' summer camp in North Carolina. In Australia, it became popular in the 1980s, reportedly inspired by Irish tourists in the Blue Mountains who encouraged a winter-themed celebration

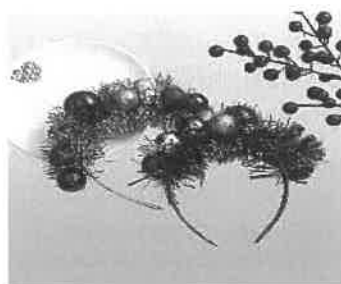

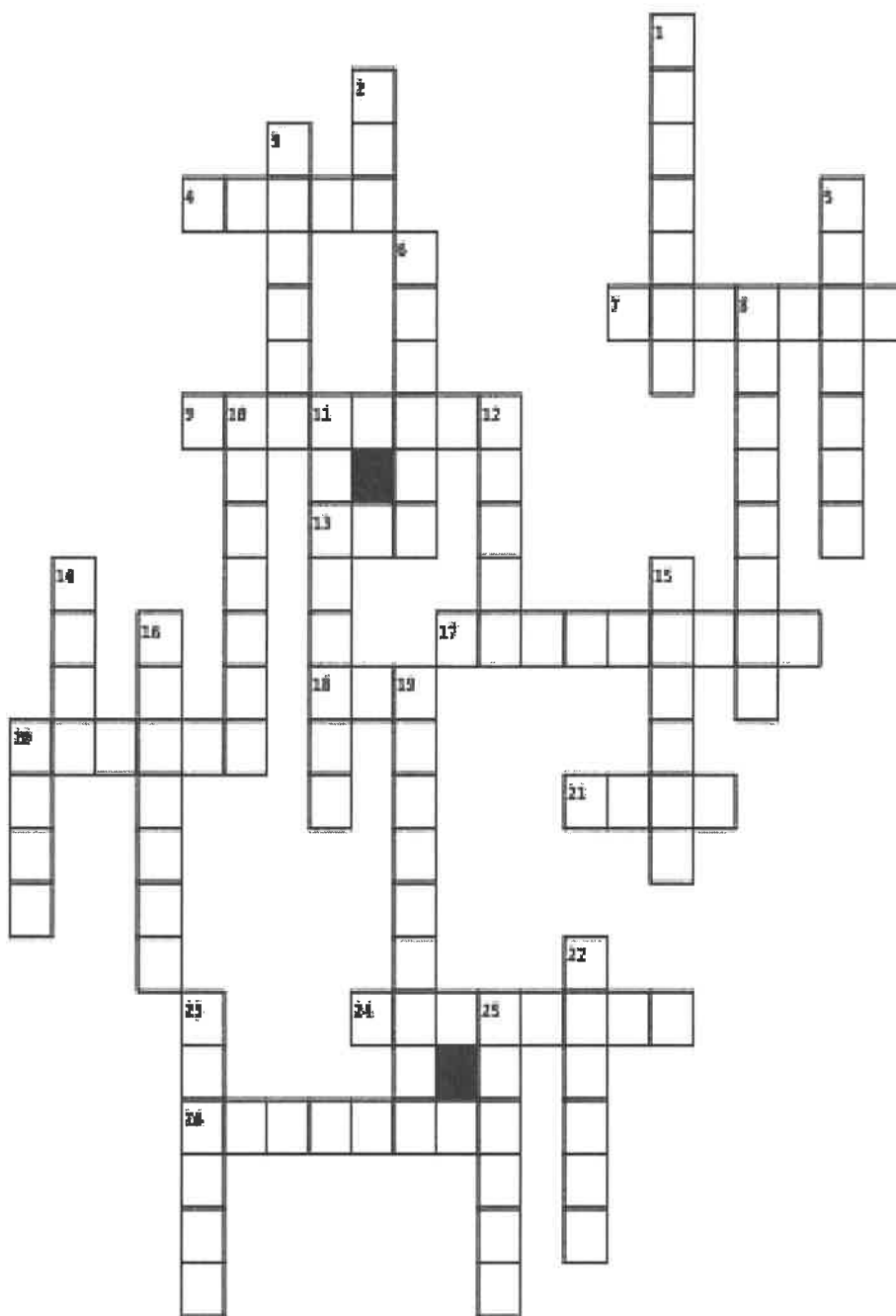

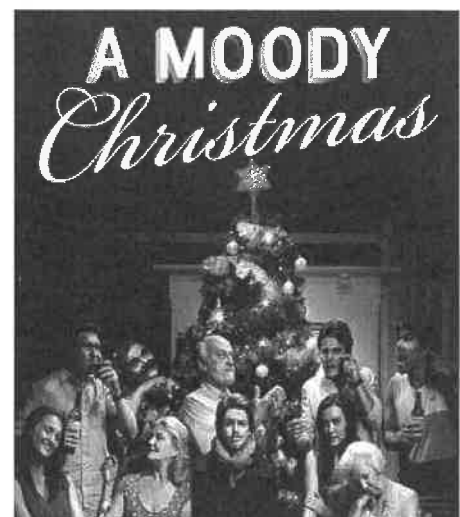

ADULT CONTEMPORARY FICTION: *Good Joy, Bad Joy* - Mikki Brammer

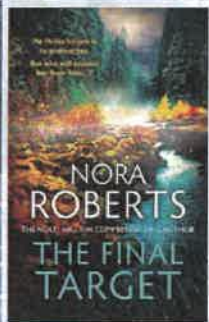

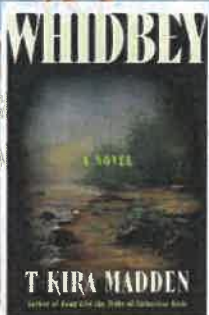

King Rocks Wind Farm

Transportation of wind turbines



Thank you to the community for your patience during the transportation of wind turbine components as part of the King Rocks Wind Farm.

The transportation of components and infrastructure for 17 wind turbines commenced in late May 2026 and will continue until approximately October. Weather and transport conditions permitting, deliveries are occurring up to seven days per week, setting off from the Port of Bunbury at sunrise.

The blades, which measure 80m in length, are scheduled to pass through the Shire of Wickiepin in the middle of the day before travelling through the Shire of Kulin to the wind farm.

Blades and other turbine components will be escorted by traffic pilots. If you find yourself behind an oversized load, please do not pass until the pilot has given you an instruction to do so. The blade transport delivery sizes will be up to 94 metres in length, 4.4 metres in width, and 27 tonnes each load. The oversized load will be stopping every 20-25 km along the route to relieve any traffic behind them.

About the project



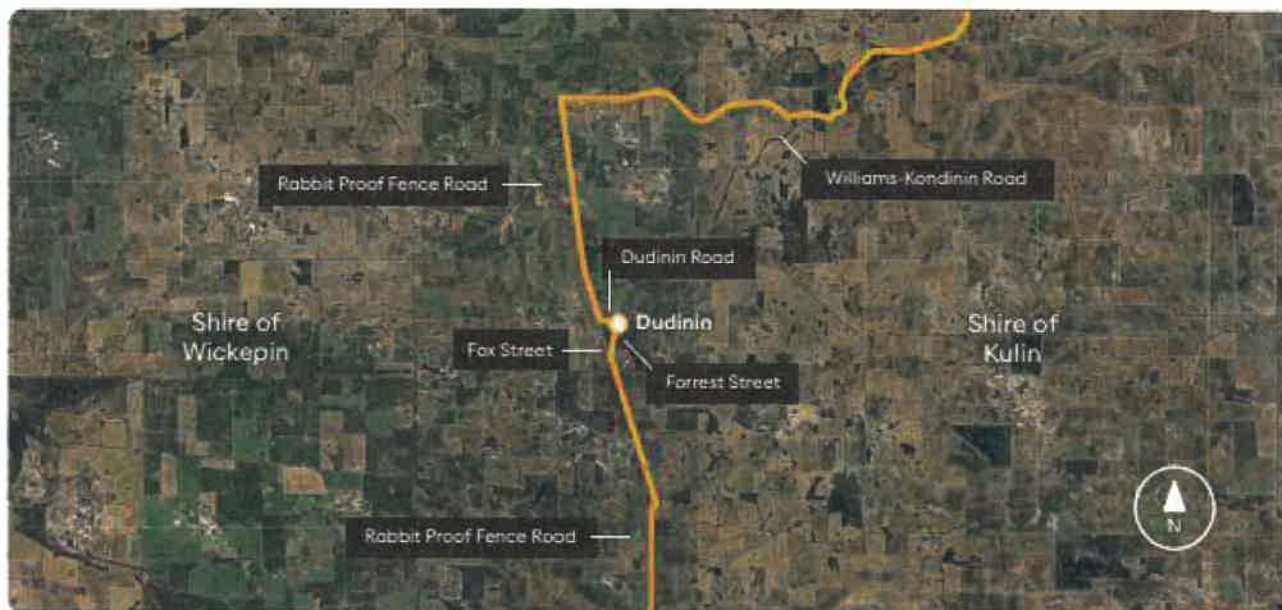
The King Rocks Wind Farm will generate up to 105 megawatts of renewable energy from 17 turbines installed 35 km north-east of Hyden.

Turbine components are being delivered from the Port of Bunbury to the wind farm site.

If slowed behind an oversized load, school bus operators are asked to contact the pilot using a UHF channel 40 to notify them of their position behind the load. The load will then pull over when safe to do so and the pilot will signal for the school bus to pass.

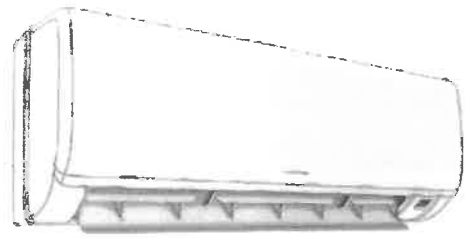

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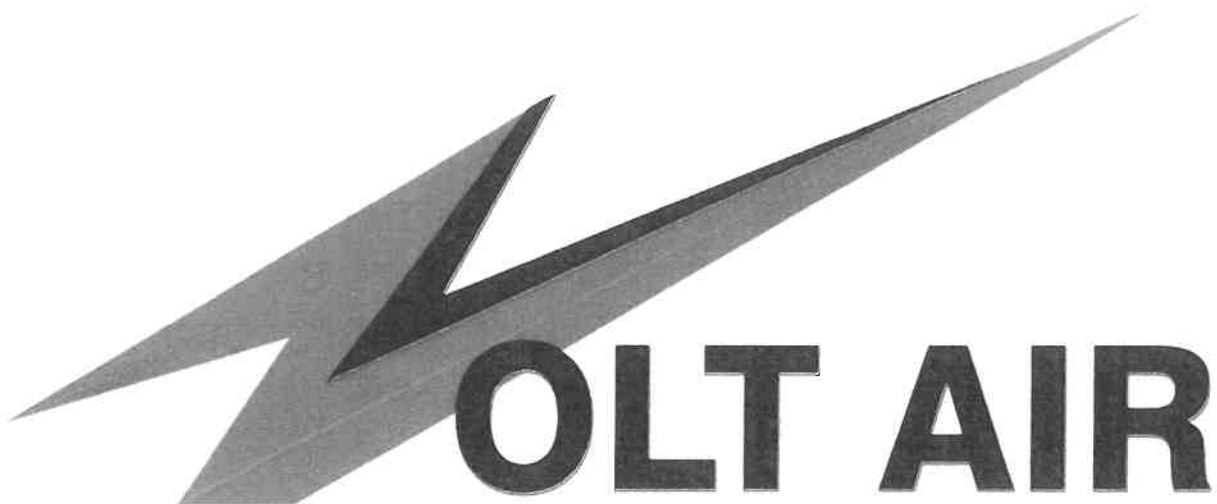

The Astrotourism Towns are now a Dark Sky Stargazing Trail Network on the Trails WA website and app.

The Astrophotographers' Paradise Road trip takes visitors through Western Australia's southern Wheatbelt, where heritage buildings, granite outcrops, woodlands, lakes and dark country skies create striking opportunities for night-sky photography. Beginning around the Shire of West Arthur, the route includes Darkan, Arthur River, Hillman Siding, Six Mile Cottage and Lake Towerrinning before continuing towards Narrogin, Wickepin, Lake Yealering and Lake Toolibin.

By day, explore historic townsites, country heritage, nature reserves, walking trails and lakeside landscapes. By night, the trail becomes a playground for astrophotographers, with places such as Six Mile Cottage, Yilliminning Rock, Dryandra Woodlands and Lake Yealering offering atmospheric foregrounds for Milky Way images, long-exposure photography and relaxed stargazing.

The Wickepin Shire has two locations included on this trail.
