

THE GREAT OCEAN WALK ON THE OTWAY RANGES, VICTORIA

Along with two sisters and a friend, a local reader recently spent six days walking this amazing coastal walk along the south coast of Victoria. Our walk started at Shelly Beach just to the west of Apollo Bay and concluded at the Twelve Apostles just to the east of Port Campbell. Each day the scenery varied and the coastal scenery was truly magnificent. This was enhanced by the great autumn weather we experienced for the whole period of the walk.

Day 1 we walked through tall timber country going quite a way inland meandering along old logging tracks before descending to the coast at Blanket Bay. Day 2 was a coastal walk through coastal bushlands and thickets of grass trees glimpsing our destination for the day, being the Otway Lighthouse, now preserved as a tourist attraction, which we explored before walking into Bimbi Park which was our digs for three nights. The café at the light house provided a real treat of latte and cake at the conclusion of this days walk. Day 3 was a long day, walking along the coast from the lighthouse to Castle Cove Lookout which is the only spot that the Great Ocean Road meets the coast along the walk. Other access points to the walk are by minor gravel roads and tracks. Hence the only way to really get the feel of this part of the south coast is to do this walk. We crossed the Aire River inlet about lunch time – this is accessed via a dirt track and is frequented mainly by fishermen and walkers. There was a spectacular view as we approached the river mouth, feeling totally alone in the world, and, there far below were two beach fishermen, peacefully enjoying their day also.

We stayed three nights at Bimbi Park, just north of the cape Otway Lighthouse. Each day we would take our car to the end of the days walk and were picked up, by prior arrangement, and taken back to the commencement point. The track is "One Way", so met no walkers coming towards us, which enhanced the feelings solitude and peace experienced during this walk.

Day 4 was coastal walking and a section walking along Joanna Beach, where a great surf was roaring at the time, making sitting on the rocks a spectacular spot to enjoy lunch. The track then left the coast and headed steeply inland through farming country for a few kms where we picked up our car and stayed o/n at the tiny village of Lavers Hill, enjoying a good pub meal.

Day 5 – a tough one to The Gables car park, the narrow track winding up and down along this section of rugged coast line with many steps, again spectacular scenery. We drove to Port Campbell for our last two nights. While this little village has grown in the past 50 years and now quite a "yuppy" weekend destination, it has maintained its beauty in the small beach and rugged lime stone cliffs, that I remember visiting many times as a child.

Day 6 we walked through Princetown and onto the conclusion of our walk at the Twelve Apostles.

While such a spectacular end to this walk, it was also quite confronting, as after the peacefulness and solitude of our past days walking we suddenly among many hundreds of tourists exploring the area. Coachloads come from Melbourne daily for a day trip only.

We walked around 100kms over the six days, a truly memorable experience, so, I recommend this walk, as a wonderful "holiday with a difference".

WICKEPIN POLICE STATIL

AMNESTY - Firearms, Accessories, Parts and Ammunition

1 July 2017 to 30 September 2017

Western Australia Police is a participant in the national firearms amnesty, which will operate in all states/territories from 1 July to 30 September 2017. All police stations will be able to receive surrendered firearms, accessories, parts and ammunition from the community for destruction.

,Whilst it is unlikely many residents of the Shire of Wickepin will be holding unregistered firearms, many people do inherit firearms and ammunition from deceased relatives or friends. These items need to be licenced or surrendered to police.

Some will also discover that they still have ammunition for a firearm they no longer own or a part that is no longer of use, which is not listed on their firearms licence.

Please Note - Possession of ammunition or parts without the correct licence is an offence.

If you do have any licenced or unlicensed items that you would like to dispose of please take this opportunity to surrender them legally.

Drain pineapple, reserve 1/4 cup syrup for sauce. Add pineapple to mince, breadcrumbs minced pepper and sauces, mix well. Shape into 16 patties, coat lightly with flour, fry in hot oil until browned on both sides and cooked through.

SAUCE METHOD

Combine mayo. tomato sauce & reserved syrup.





Beat well then spread over pastry which has been spread with rasberry jam. Bake in a moderate oven for 20 minutes.


WICKEPIN LADIES HOCKEY CLUB

FACEY GROUP TRIAL UPDATE



Incorporating Lime to Depth on Duplex Wheatbelt Soils

2017 will be the third year of the COGGO funded trial, which focuses on both the agronomic and economic responses from five lime incorporation methods. The trial was installed in 2015 and the treatments include control (nil), top dressed lime, direct drilled Omya Calciprill, deep ripped (top dressed lime, deep ripped) and spaded (top dressed lime, deep ripped then spaded). These treatments are replicated three times on PA scale plots.


This project came about from local growers needing to see a better response from time applications, as most growers practice no-till seeding and have previously only used top dressing for lime application. There is also a distinct lack of local sub-soil acidity research undertaken on clay/duplex soil types, as most previous research has only focused on sand plain soils.

The first year of the trial showed that the greater the level of soil disturbance, the more reduced the germination was. Yield and quality at harvest did not show any significant difference in 2015, as canola has the ability to compensate for bare areas by closing over the canopy. It is likely that if the trial area was planted to cereals, the variation between yields may have been greater in the first year.

In 2016, after a year of the soil firming, all treatments achieved consistent germination across the trial, which was sown to wheat. The spaded treatment yielded higher than other treatments, averaging 2.45 t/ha and control had the lowest yields with an average 1.7 t/ha. These results are likely due to the spaded treatment having a higher crop nitrogen utilisation, which is likely due to the mixing, aeration and breakdown of the soil organic matter which results in increased mineralisation of nitrogen; the possibility of improved root growth and access to nutrients due to the deeper tillage technique loosening the soil; as well as the mitigation of any water repellence through soil inversion. The spaded treatment also had the highest protein average and it also saw all plots grain quality assessments reach APW1 specifications. In the control treatment, there were large variations in the grade specifications, with one of the control plots even being graded to AGP1.

Over the two years the trial has run, the economic analysis shows that the spaded treatment had the highest gross margin, followed by Calciprill, deep ripping, control and lastly top dressing. The highest return on investment (ROI) was Calciprill followed by top dressing, deep ripping and then spading, which is likely due to the large upfront expense of implementing the treatment. The control was excluded from the ROI as it has no implementation expense.


The trial was sown this year on the 18th May to oaten hay and it is expected that this year will begin to balance out the full benefits and return on investment of each treatment in this trial, given the results from applying lime are expected to last for many years. Having this information at a local level will allow growers to integrate the results into their own farming systems to achieve greater yields and increase on farm productivity and profitability.


