



STEPHEN AND ANTHEA'S TRIP TO VIETNAM, CAMBODIA AND SINGAPORE IN JULY 2017

We started our trip by flying to Singapore for a stopover to Vietnam. The Airport is huge and inside the airport we visited the butterfly house. Flight to Ho Chi Min city (Population of the city-9 million) and taxi to our Air BnB and there are so many motorbikes/scooters here (7.5 million) and the only rule is to not fall off in the traffic. They also use the footpath as a road as well- very hard to cross the road and which way to look. Our B&B was a brand new apartment with cooking facilities and it was near a river and a local market. There are a lot of places to eat and get cheap drinks plus road side venders. We visited the Ci Chu tunnels-there so many tunnels- for the soldiers which go for kilometres and booby traps for the enemy, secret passages, air vents that looked like termite mounds and bunkers. We got to hear how loud an AK47 was and how fast it fired. Went on a tour up the Mekong and saw how the local bricks were made, coconut lollies and a bike tour around a village, Stephen even tried to climb a coconut tree -was very hard. We had met a local lady who took us to a local market and brought some food for a 3 course lunch (\$6) then she came and showed us how to cook and prepare in our B&B- very nice. She wanted people to talk to her in English so she could practice it and get better. Visited the War Remnants Museuma lot of pictures and information from the Vietnam War and the Indochinese war, very graphic and sad. We took a bus trip across the border into Cambodia- 6 hours long- to Phnom Penh. There are tuk tuks everywhere and waiting for your business, the tuk tuks take you anywhere you need to go in the city. We Visited the Museum with a lot of statues and artefacts from prehistoric times and culture history. Met the other people from Australia (we are in group of 21 and our Leaders and organisers), we are going to build houses for a village in Kampot for the Tabitha Foundation. Went in a bus to the Tabitha Foundation Headquarters and met Janne (the founder). She told us some of the history of the Cambodians, the Khmer rouge and Pol Pot. She is helping the survivors and their families from this horrible era and also building a hospital for women. Visited the Tuol Sleng Museum and one of the killing Fields- so sad and very graphic. Journeyed to Kampot and here is where we go out to a village and build houses. Met Addheka who is helping the poor, teaching English in her school and such an inspiration to us all. The 15 houses our team built over 2 days were just a 1 room structure about 6ft off the ground. Wooden floors that we nailed in and tin walls- the roof and the main structure were pre done from building contractors. The villagers were very happy and very humble that we had come to build houses for them. There was a language barrier but we communicated through basic instructions and sometimes an interpreter. Lots of banging and hammering-many people stepping outside their comfort zones. Enjoyed a final ceremony in the village -we gave each family our team built a house for a ceremonial blanket and the families were so happy and hugging everyone to say thank you. Visited a local school out in a village- the children only go to school in the mornings-we had games, songs and laughter. Many of our group left sporting goods, paper, crayons, bathroom supplies, posters and plastic animals. These children just have the basic facilities and things for school. Said goodbye to the team and we headed to Siem Reap via an internal flight- not sure if we will do that again as very rough and basic. We went to some of the temples of Angkor Wat and the surrounding areas. WOW what a place, so much history, monuments, carvings, temples, buildings we are not sure how they still standing, trees and roots invading the temples, restored areas and amazing figurines- all built in the 9th-11th century. Such an amazing place to visit. At night we visited Pub street with all its food, restaurants, bars, shops for clothes, rice, meat, nic naks, deep fried scorpions, crickets, snakes and spiders. Flight to Singapore and there is such a contrast in where we have just been (Cambodia and Vietnam) in the city, the structures (housing complexes), the high rise, the freeway tunnels, Santosa Island, the amazing hotels, the gardens by the bay (amazing structures and flower domes), the cleanliness, the price of things and all the ships that visit Singapore. All in all an amazing holiday over 3 weeks, we all did a fantastic job helping building houses and you come away from developing countries thinking about what we have here and just how lucky we are to live where we live.

<u>Wickepin Sculpture Workshops September 2016 – October 2016</u>

The Wickepin Sculpture Project engaged artist Neil Elliott in a 6 day residency based in Wickepin between September and October 2016. Neil facilitated a series of weekend sculpture workshops with local residents using repurposed wood, found objects, farm junk and recycled materials.

The workshops were held at a project art space created in the Wickepin She Shed He Shed community space. The art space was open to visitors and provided inspiration and the sharing of ideas between participants as well as a central place for discussions with the artist-in-residence. A key component of the project was to motivate and inspire those in the community and to create engagement and conversation.

Participants worked on their own individual sculpture pieces and collectively on a community sculpture. Neil provided a brief to the participants prior to the workshops explaining the focus on regional bird life and the idea of creating fun sculptural pieces. He encouraged community discussion on the subject. Neil worked closely with workshop participants and Shire of Wickepin staff throughout the weekends to help refine ideas and assist in determining the form the community sculpture would take.

The community sculpture created has been called the 'Bird Park' and is installed along the Wickepin Heritage Walk Trail. A series of local 'birds' has been created from the found and recycled objects. They have been attached to salvaged Western Power poles from Wickepin, creating a striking upright sculpture.

Wickepin Art Prize 14 - 16 October 2016

Art Prize 2016 had over 170 artworks on display with artists from around the Shire, the South West and Perth. Judging was done by Neil Elliot, an artist and sculptor from Perth who had been facilitating the Sculpture Workshops leading up to the Art Prize. The Acquisitive Prize was won by Jo Duffy with her artwork 'Sunset Ridge'. This is on display at the Shire Administration Office.

'Arty Party' opening night entertained 200 locals and visitors. Cr Wes Astbury MC'ed for the evening and introduced judge Neil Elliott; Kate Russell, daughter of Arthur Russell; and announced the winners of the Townscape and Cultural Planning Committee Garden Awards.

'Feast on Art', a long table lunch, was held amongst the artworks on Sunday. Around 50 people sat down to enjoy the food, company and art. Catering deliciously provided by Christine Hill Food.













The Arthur Russell Exhibition was held in the front room of the Town Hall and ran all weekend. Arthur's daughter, Kate Russell, loaned around 50 of Arthur's works, along with photos and memorabilia spanning many years, to Wickepin for the exhibition. Kate generously gifted the Shire with an artwork of Arthur's from 1993, titled Babakin.









Wickepin Cemetery Opening 14 October 2016

Following the completion of the Yealering cemetery, work commenced on an upgrade to the Wickepin cemetery and niche wall. Feedback and comments were received during 2013/14 and plans were finalised during 2014 prior to a period of consultation with family and community members. The upgrade to the Wickepin Cemetery was completed December 2015. This included a new Granite Niche Wall, gazebo and seating. Landscaping was completed during the winter months of 2016. The cemetery upgrade provided an opportunity to update the records of those interred in the wall.

The official opening of the Wickepin Granite Niche Wall had a large crowd gather to hear Hon Terry Waldron representing Hon Paul Miles Minister for Local Government, Community Services; Seniors and Volunteering and Youth officially open the redevelopment. CEO Mark Hook MC'ed the opening and Rev Linda Myres blessed the cemetery.

Visitors numbering around 500 from the Great Southern and Perth areas spent the weekend exploring the region and visiting Wickepin and the Shire as part of the trail.

The Wickepin Town Hall was filled with art displays by Caroline Coate, Mesha Hall, Debra Scidone, Helen Warrilow and a photographic display by Rachel Guinness. Prema Sexton created a photographic portraiture pop-up studio; She Shed He Shed wowed everyone with the diversity and quality of their recycled/upcycled metal sculptures; Silvery Moon created bespoke silver jewellery; Something Painted, TinkerBay Frames and That's Sew Kate showed the region the depth of local artisans; Selina's Garden was abundant with greenery: Christine Hill Food catered all weekend; Belinda Dycer awed everyone with her floral art. 
Tourism, Marketing and Promotion

Spin-off promotion for the entire Shire of Wickepin as a result of the events held during the year is very good. Public Relations credibility and advertising the Shire of Wickepin achieves through allowing the use of its facilities is worth thousands of dollars. Shire had many minutes of free regional ABC radio airtime promoting events and the Shire in general. Caravan clubs and individuals are making separate trips to experience Lake Yealering, wildflowers and Harrismith and to further explore the town and surrounds of Wickepin as a result of the events held during the year. The positive promotion and complimentary word-ofmouth advertising for the Shire are well-worth the investment in the weekends/events and in Shire waiving or reducing fees. The aim of good Public Relations is to generate a positive and favourable view of the Shire and persuade our public, employees and stakeholders to maintain this view. These events are achieving this aim.

We have still advertised in the traditional tourism lift outs aimed at the over 45's, caravanners and gray nomads. We continue to attract the younger set that is enthusiastic on taking road trips and exploring through our instagram account: @wickepin_shire for those of you who would like to contribute and post images of the Shire.

Councillors and members of the public are encouraged to friend, like or follow our social media pages and share the content and posts that the shire staff regularly posts. Adding comments to the posts also raises the profile of the post and encourages more social traffic to the Shire of Wickepin, which in turn raises the global profile of the Shire.

Shire of Wickepin has enlisted the help of Tangelo to create a new digital map of the Shire and the townsites for tourist purposes. The ESO and CDO incorporated images and text of the Shire with the map creating an A3 tourist map. These will be distributed to local businesses and tourism venues.















Walk Trail

The Shire of Wickepin was successful in receiving funding from Lotterywest to upgrade the Walk Trail signage in Yealering, Harrismith and Wickepin. The funding enabled the Shire of Wickepin to engage consultants from TPG to create signs for the walk trail focussing on the heritage sites and points of interest in Yealering; wildflowers in Harrismith; and the buildings of note along Wogolin Road in Wickepin. Jason Signs and Midland Monumental manufactured the signs and they have been installed along the trail by the Manager of Works and the works crew.

The design, manufacture and installation of trails signage assists the Shire of Wickepin to encourage more people to engage with and explore the stories, buildings and landscapes that shape their sense of place and environment. The heritage trails signs for the towns of Wickepin and Yealering focus on the historical areas of the town and highlights the interaction between the new and old facets of the area. The trails signs assist users to understand the history of the towns and interpret it in a modern way. The heritage trail signage in Harrismith links the history of the town but mainly focusses on the Wildflower Walk Trail, which has a wide variety of rare orchids and wildflowers. Seats were installed in all 3 townsites to complement the new signage.





IN THE KITCHEN

Serves 4

grated zest and juice of 1 large lemon
2 garlic cloves, peeled and crushed
2 thsp basil-flavoured extra virgin olive oil
4 thsp freshly chopped basil
salt and freshly ground black pepper
450 g/1 lb skinless, boneless chicken breast,
cut into bite-size pieces
1 onion, peeled and finely chopped
3 celery stalks, trimmed and thinly sliced
175 g/6 oz/1/½ cups wiped and halved mushrooms
2 thsp plain/all-purpose flour
150 ml/½ pint/½ cup white wine
150 ml/½ pint/½ cup chicken stock
350-450 g/12 oz-1 lb/4-6 cups linguine

Lemon Chicken with Basil & Linguine





To garnish:

lemon zest and fresh basil leaves

- Blend the lemon zest and juice, garlic, half the oil, half the basil and salt and pepper in a large bowl. Add the chicken and toss well. Allow to stand for about 1 hour, stirring occasionally.
- 2 Heat the remaining oil in a large nonstick frying pan, then add the onion and cook for 3–4 minutes until slightly softened. Using a slotted spoon, drain the chicken pieces and add to the frying pan, reserving the marinade. Cook the chicken for 2–3 minutes until golden brown, then add the celery and mushrooms and cook for a further 2–3 minutes.
- Sprinkle in the flour and stir until the chicken and vegetables are coated. Gradually stir in the wine until a thick sauce forms, then stir in the stock and reserved marinade. Bring to the boil, stirring constantly. Cover and simmer for about 10 minutes, then stir in the remaining basil.
- Meanwhile, bring a large saucepan of lightly salted water to the boil, add the linguine and simmer for 7–10 minutes until al dente. Drain well and turn into a large serving bowl, pour over the sauce and garnish with the lemon zest and fresh basil leaves. Serve immediately.



EASY STRAWBERRY BANANA BREAD


Serves 12 Prep 30 mins (+ 5 mins standing & cooling time) Cooking 1 hour


2 cups (300g) self-raising flour 1 сир (220g) brown sugar 1 tsp baking powder 2 overripe bananas, mashed 2 Coles Brand Australian Free Range Eggs, lightly whisked 150g butter, melted ½ cup (125ml) buttermilk 1 cup (130g) chopped strawberries Halved or quartered strawberries, extra, to decorate Strawberry buttercream 75g strawberries, finely chopped 1 tbs caster sugar 125g butter, softened 11/2 cups (240g) icing sugar mixture

- 1. Preheat oven to 180°C. Grease and line the base and sides of a 10cm x 22cm (base measurement) loaf pan with baking paper, allowing the 2 long sides to overhang.
- 2. Place the flour, sugar and baking powder in a large bowl. Whisk the banana, egg, butter and buttermilk in a medium bowl. Add the egg mixture and chopped strawberry to the flour mixture and stir to combine. Pour into the prepared pan. Bake for 1 hour or until a skewer inserted in the centre comes out clean. Set aside in the pan for 5 mins to cool before turning onto a wire rack to cool completely.
- 3. Meanwhile, to make the strawberry buttercream, combine strawberry and sugar in a small saucepan over medium heat. Cook for 5 mins or until the sugar dissolves and strawberry breaks down. Cook for 2 mins or until mixture thickens slightly. Set aside to cool.

- 4. Use an electric mixer to beat the butter in a bowl until very pale.
 Gradually add the icing sugar, beating well after each addition. Beat in the strawberry mixture.
- 5. Spread the strawberry buttercream over the top of the banana bread. Top with halved or quartered strawberries.







EASY CROCHETED POPPY

Gather your supplies

1 ball 8ply yarn in red; scraps of 8ply yarn in green and black; novelty yarn in black.
3.50mm crochet hook; wool needle for sewing in yarn ends.

Note: Tension is tighter than normally recommended.

Here's how

Petals

Using 3.50mm hook and red yarn, make a magic ring.

1st round: 3ch, 9tr into ring. Pull the slip ring tight to close centre of ring, sl st in 3rd ch at beg to join.

2nd round: 3ch, 1tr in first st, 2tr in each st to last st, sl st in 3rd ch at beg to join.

3rd round: 3ch, 2tr in first st, 3tr in each st to

last st, sl st in 3rd ch at beg to join.

4th round: 3 ch, 1tr in first st, 2tr in each st to

last st, sl st in 3rd ch at beg to join.

Fasten off. Sew in ends.

Centre

Using 3.50hook and green yarn, make a magic ring.

1st round: 3ch, 9tr into ring. Pull the slip rin tight to close centre of ring, sl st in 3rd ch at beg to join.

Fasten off. Sew in ends.

Join black yarn with a sl st into edge of circle on right side. 1ch *1dc into first st, 1ch.
Repeat from * to end of round. Sl st to join.
Fasten off leaving a long tail. Sew in ends.

To make up

Using wool needle and black tail, attach centre to petals invisibly. Decorate with novelty yarn if desired.

EASY KNITTED POPPY

Gather your supplies

1 ball 8ply yarn in red: scraps of 8ply yarn in green and black; 3.50mm knitting needles; wool needle for sewing in yarn ends.

Note: Tension is tighter than normally recommended to maximise the curl in the petals.

Here's how

Petals

Using 3.50mm needles and redyarn, cost on 120 stitches.

1st - 4th rows: Work in garter stitch (every row knit).

5th row: *Slip1, knit 2 together; pass slip stitched over, repeat from * to end ... 40 stitches.

6th - 9th rows: Knit

10th row: Knit 2 together across the row ... 20 stitches

11th - 14th rows: Knit

15th row: Knit 2 together across the row ... 10 stitches. Cut yarn leaving a 15cm tail. Thread wood needle with tail, insert through remaining stitches and pull up tightly to form a circle. Join sides using mattress stitch.

Centre

Using 3.50mm needles and green yarn, cast on 8 stitches.

1st row: Knit · 2nd row: Purl

Repeat 1st and 2nd rows until work is square (8–10 rows). Cut yarn leaving a 15cm tail. Thread wool needle with tail, slip through remaining stitches and pull tight noting purl side is front of work. Using running stitch around edge of square, ease into a circle and tuck under.

To make up

Stitch the poppy centre, tucked-side down, to the body of the poppy using black yarn. Sew in ends.



If you would like to knit or crochet poppies for remembrance day, please drop completed poppies into the CRC who will display them in the window.
