


Games of Yester Year were held later that afternoon on the oval, with a slow start to the games the enticement of free chocolate was offered and people turned up from everywhere.

Wickepin offers clubs the advantage of being just three hours drive from WA's four carriage driving clubs at Albany, Dwellingup, Perth and Northam. The drivers continue to be impressed with Wickepin as it has an amazing array of wildflowers, many scenic routes and pioneer tracks suitable for carriage driving, as well as a most friendly and welcoming township with great public facilities.

Highlights of the weekend included the Wickepin Town Drive, Street Parade and Presentation on Saturday, with lunch at Facey Homestead, culminating in a BBQ and Dance at the Community Centre. The Community Centre was decorated to reflect Showing of Agricultural Achievements over the past 100 years. The historic exhibits were provided by Ray and Helen Lewis from Lewisdale Merino Poll Stud as well as several other Wickepin families. Frank Heffernan gave an entertaining historical overview of the Wickepin Show through the 50s and 60s. Frank Bird, long time identity of the town also related his memories of the "Wicky Show". Ray Lewis reflected on his first show entry at the age of 6 with two "mongrel chooks". Ray and Helen Lewis also sponsored a children's free BBQ, show bags as well as a clown and DJ to entertain. The dinner was attended by 96 local residents and carriage drivers, with 50 children enjoying an early sausage sizzle celebration. Sunday consisted of a 35 km return drive through country lanes, paddocks and roads to Tarling Reserve for a picnic lunch.



ACROSS THE DITCH Precision Agriculture Tour WA to NZ

A week full of inspiration, challenge, thought provoking, exhausting, networking, fun and work (of course) was had on a truly remarkable study tour to New Zealand, North Island from the 15th - 21st October. The group was made up of WA producers, researchers, consultants and extension delivers and a few east coasters and MLA representatives.

To kick off the week we attended The International Tri-Conference for Precision Agriculture in 2017 in Hamilton. The conference encompassed a range of speakers in the precision agriculture space from new research being undertaken to the practical on farm use from all over the world. There is a lot of preliminary research being undertaken in this space with plenty of thought provoking on how different technologies can be utilised and tested within the agricultural space - an area to keep up to date with and revisit to see where the fit may be for us locally in the future. A reflection and demonstration of how technologies are being used on farm and within systems was also a key take away message for the group, with many technologies already available but under utilised, giving many thoughts to how we could possible use our data better and manage things.

From the conference rooms we stretched our legs and headed to the Gallagher Head Office based in Hamilton. This company was truly inspiring with complete investment from all the staff and a real sense of pride. We toured the facilities and were able to gain insight into the production line of products that we see upon shelves in our local retailers stores. It was impressive to see the culture of this organisation and the fact that they manufacture locally rather than outsourcing overseas. A few great tools were sighted along the way for livestock management which I think would be great to utilise in WA for grazing and monitoring of stock.

We met with AgFirst - Agriculture and Horticulture Farm Consultant Network representatives and discussed the organisation and services as New Zealand's largest network of consultants across the primary industry. Farm IQ demonstrated their farm management program and initiated discussions on how this could potentially be adopted in Australia and linkage options to other farm management software and apps. To finish out the day we were presented to by Beef and Lamb New Zealand (think similar to MLA for us in Australia) and discussed the structure and role within the New Zealand livestock industry.

The bus then became our friend, up steep hills and along winding roads to the next destination of Landcorp Farms (Wairakei Estate and Aratiatia Station) between Taupo and Rotorua. Landcorp Farms is a government owned organisation with land leased from independents. Across the two farms we were shown the systems and integration of precision agriculture for management and reporting. This visit enlightened us to the traceability of dairy cattle for the management of health, mating and production with collar tracking and also explored the options of genetics for the reduction of nitrates. We toured the Aratiatia Station and looked at the management of the farm through pasture management and livestock production and monitoring.

From here we travelled to Napier and met with Atkins Ranch, Maori representative and Nuffield Scholar. Atkins Ranch took us through their journey as a family owned business supplying grass fed


products to markets globally. Shane Walker provided us with an insight to Maori culture and took us on the journey of plans ahead. Nuffield Scholar Sam Long presented his project around sustainability in farming systems around the world through Regenerative Farming.

On our final day of touring we headed farmers in Palmerston North, along the Rangatangi river who have integrated cereals, horticulture and livestock production. We toured the farm and explored the management structure of the business with a board setup and the integral part of understanding all aspects of the business from finance to operations. Following this we met with Massey University representative and were presented with information around Big Data for the beef and dairy industry in New Zealand. We were shown the different precision agriculture tools that are currently being utilised and options for looking into hyperspectral imaging and other traceability options.

MYFARM concluded our visits, an investment organisation matching investors to the agricultural industry of New Zealand, with potential for the movements of the family buying out investors over time and we challenged the thoughts as to how this structure may fit within Australia for the succession of farms or for those that are moving into the agricultural space.

A huge thank you must go to Erin Gorter, who instigated the tour and for the organising behind the scenes and to MLA Donor Company who supported the tour for industry in WA. But last and not least I must thank the Facey Group for the support and encouragement to attend this tour.

I believe there are so many opportunities that can be explored and through the friendships and networks that we have all established from a week in each other's pockets we really are inspired to ensure that livestock in WA and Australia can benefit from such a dynamic industry. Let's just say we all agreed that this is not the end of tour, so watch this space, because the inspiration and dedication to ensure we do something for this industry locally was prominent and I am determined that there are some amazing opportunities ahead for us all.





I can still remember Sammy telling all in his best English. 'The bus – She no go! Bitumen roads, apart from the main street in Wickepin had yet to appear and it took a lot of pushing and wet get to get the bus moving.

A reminder to Bush Fire Volunteers; Bush Fire uniforms are available from the Shire of Wickepin admin office with one free uniform per registered brigade volunteer.

BUSH FIRE SEASON 2017/2018

Council would like to remind residents of the Shire of Wickepin that they are required on or before 1 October 2017 and thereafter to 14 April 2018 to plough, scarify or otherwise provide and maintain firebreaks clear of all inflammable material at least 2.5 metres wide as follows:

Rural Land

Inside the boundary of all land held by each owner or occupier, their firebreaks need not follow the perimeter of any paddock but will be acceptable following land contours in an endeavour to overcome water erosion;

- To subdivide each holding into lots of no greater than 200 hectares; and
- To surround the homestead, out buildings and fuel storages on any such land.

Townsite Land

All lots within the townsites of Harrismith, Tincurrin, Toolibin, Wickepin and Yealering are required to be cleared and maintained free of all debris or inflammable material. Failure to comply with these







Special Salmon Pie

Serves 6	Calories:	500	Fat: 16g
Saturated	fat: 5g	Car	bohydrates: 43g

- * 100g (3½oz) asparagus
- * 1.5kg (3lb) small potatoes, sliced
- * Few sprigs of mint
- * 2tbsp olive oil
- # 3 leeks, trimmed and sliced
- * 100ml (31/2fl oz) white wine
- 2tsp English mustard
- * 150ml (¼pt) single cream
- * 2tbsp dill
- * 500g (1lb) salmon fillet, cut into chunks
- * 500g (1lb) smoked haddock, in chunks
- * 300g (10oz) large prawns
- * Juice of 1 lemon

Bring 2 pans or salled water.

boil. Add the asparagus to one and Bring 2 pans of salted water to the the potatoes and mint to the other. Return to the boil. Simmer for 5 mins, until almost tender, then drain.

- Heat oven to 200°C or Gas Mark leeks and cook gently for 10 mins.
- Add the wine and mustard and Ocook for a few mins, then turn off the heat and stir in the cream and dill.
- Arrange the salmon, haddock Tand prawns in a pie dish. Add the asparagus, season and squeeze over the lemon juice, then pour over the leeks and creamy sauce; mix together.
- Cover with potato slices. Season and drizzle over the rest of the oil. Bake for 35 mins until the potatoes are golden and the fish is tender.

Do you love pomegranates but hate taking the seeds out. Cut it into and hold it upside down over a bowl and whack it with a wooden spoon. Give it a try!

Apple, Plum & Blackberry Meringue

Serves 6 Calories: 280 Fat: Og Saturated fat: Og Carbohydrates: 64g Not suitable for freezing

- 450g (1lb) Bramley apples, cored and sliced 450g (1lb) plums, stoned and, quartered
- 450g (1lb) blackberries 300g (10oz) caster sugar
- 3 egg whites
- 1tsp white vinegar
- 23cm (9in) ovenproof dish

Heat the oven to 180°C or Mark Gas 4. Put the apples, plums, blackberries and 110g 31/40z) of the sugar in a large

pan over a medium heat. Cook for 10 mins or until the fruit start to soften. Put into a large dish.


Beat the egg whites in the bowl of an electric mixer, until stiff peaks form. Gradually add the remaining sugar and the vinegar. Beat until the mixture is thick and glossy. Spoon the mixture over the fruit and bake for 10 mins or until the meringue is a light golden colour.

FELICITY'S TIP

Egg whites are ready when you can upturn the bowl and they don't move. Just add Itbsp of sugar at a time.
