As the stars are known to the Night.*

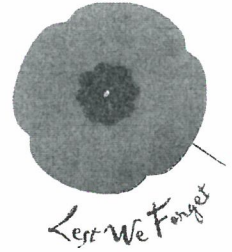
*As the stars that shall be bright when we are dust,

Armistice Day 2018

Service held at the War Memorial Wickepin



Introduction and address by Cr Julie Russell Shire of Wickepin

Good Morning Ladies & Gentlemen, Girls & Boys, and welcome to our Armistice Day Centenary Ceremony.

We gather to commemorate the Silence of the Guns and the end of all hostilities on the Western Front between the Allied armies and the German armies of the Great War – World War 1 – by the signing of the Armistice, which occurred in the early hours of November 11th 1918, and took effect at the 11th hour of that same day – 100 years ago today.

We also Remember, and Thank, All Current and Ex-Service Personnel that have fought in All of the Wars, including the Current Conflicts.

On the 1st anniversary of the Armistice – at the 11th hour of the 11th Day of the 11th Month of 1919 – two minute's silence was instituted as a part of the main commemorative ceremony, to remember all of those who died in War. After the end of WW2 in 1945, the Australian and British Governments changed the name to "Remembrance Day" as an appropriate title for a day which would commemorate ALL war dead.

In 1997, the 11th November was formerly declared to be "Remembrance Day" and all Australians were urged by the then Governor-General, Sir William Deane, to observe 1 minute's silence at 11am on 11th day of the 11th month each year to remember those who had died or suffered for Australia's cause, in All Wars and Armed Conflicts.

WW1 was particularly significant to this district, due to Youth enthusiasm and ignorance; Mateship; Education of duties; Social expectation of commitment; and the Power of the Press, the Narrogin district – which included Wickepin – achieved the remarkable distinction of having sent more men to the "Front" pro-rata to it's population than any other section of the British Empire.

In fact, over 1,000 (or approximately one-sixth) of the total adult population volunteered, and were recruited, from the Williams-Narrogin electorate.

Of the 1,000 plus volunteer recruits from the District, Wickepin area alone had 267 enlistments, of which

59% (or 158) were farmers, or worked in farm-related jobs;

86% (or 229) were single men.

36% of these single men (or 82) died.

Total deaths were 91.

The death toll, plus those that didn't return to the district after the War, meant that the community sustenance and growth was initially compromised significantly by the loss of young men and women, and working class families.

To Honor The Returned, The Fallen and The Un-returned we have, undercover, a memorial Armistice Plaque which will be unveiled shortly, Blessed with our "Prayer of Remembrance", and ultimately placed in the lawn at the base of the steps alongside the "Pillars of Remembrance" to etch the Centenary of Armistice within our War Memorial Precinct.

I am very pleased to now welcome Local Historian, Stefanie Green.
Stefanie is a local Farmer, who works alongside her husband on the farm, she has 2 children and enjoys any type of history, and so has taken the names of the "91 Fallen" and put their faces and stories into words in her detailed book "Fallen but Not Forgotten", which tells stories of the ordinary men and women of our district who left their families behind to fight the War, but focusing on Those who didn't survive.

Silence Falls

**The echoes die, the smoke-clouds thin and pass
The cannons are like statues dumb and cold;
Silent the crosses wait and in the grass
The spent shells gleam like gold.**

**All spent he lay and dreamed till the moment came;
Now, waking with a cry he looks all wonder to see
the empty sky hurl down no flame:
To hear no crack of Thunder.**

(Stefanie's Address)

Welcome.

My name is Stefanie Green and I grew up in a small town in central Germany. I arrived in Wickepin 15 years ago and, after marrying a local farmer, have made this town my home.

I have been interested in history all my life and so it was natural to become involved with the telling and preserving of Wickepin's history as well. Having assisted with the editing and publishing of many local history books over the past few years, this book is the first project I have undertaken as a whole.

I would like to thank everyone who has made this book possible:

- ~ the Shire of Wickepin and the Department of Veterans Affairs for financing the project
- ~ the community, family members and relatives of soldiers who, in some cases, went to great lengths, finding information and providing photographs
- ~ and anyone else who has supported me and this project.

10 years ago the Shire of Wickepin enlisted my help in identifying the names on the Honour Board for the Service Personnel of the Wickepin Shire from World War 2 onwards. This was my first foray into military history and really the starting point for this project.

In 2015 the Shire erected the Memorial to the Fallen and I was honoured to be asked again to help in identifying the soldiers on the World War 1 Honour Roll. It became clear to me very early on that the research of the soldiers who served more than a hundred years ago was going to involve a lot more detective work than I had previously experienced. I am grateful that a myriad of documents is freely available online, as they helped to solve many mysteries. Writing the stories of the Fallen was a natural progression as it became apparent, that there was so much to tell.

Many Memorial Boards are merely a collection of names and I think you all agree that they rarely satisfy ones curiosity. Questions, such as, "Who were they?" and "Where did they come from?" are all too often asked, and seldom easily answered. This book now helps to put a face to these names and tells the story on how they came to be there.

Some stories were easier to write than others. Soldiers who came from large families, and whose descendants are still living in the district today, had often been mentioned in other local history books or private family histories, and offered a wealth of information. Others, especially migrants who came on their own or travelling workmen, were much more difficult. It took many hours of painstaking research and in some cases years, before I was able to find any information about them. Added difficulties included the incorrect spelling of names and the use of nicknames instead of given names.

Despite many of the men sharing similar backgrounds all of their stories are vastly different. There is the case of William Sampson, whose death at Gallipoli, although tragic also turned out to be a source of joy for his grieving sister. William had a son, who was born out of wedlock, and whose existence only came to the attention of his sister, when the war service office contacted her in regards to the disbursement of William's war medals. I would like to quote an excerpt of the letter which William's sister Mabel wrote to the authorities in response: *"I find it quite true that my brother left a little son. The mother and child have the most right to all that belongs to my*

brother. I would never have known of this child if you had not written to me about the medals."

Although many families had several sons serving in the armed forces during World War 1, and in fact there are 35 sets of brothers on the Wickepin War Memorial, it is the case of the Ryan brothers I found particularly sad. Dennis, Eugene, Dick and John Ryan were born in Victoria and arrived in the Wickepin District around 1909. They all enlisted early on in the war, and Dick, the second oldest brother, was the first to lose his life, barely a month after joining the fighting at Gallipoli. Eugene, the youngest brother, joined up just days after Dick's death and was killed in action at the Western Front within weeks of arriving. Dennis, the oldest brother and the first to enlist, managed to survive the ill-fated Gallipoli campaign before fighting at the Western Front. In August 1918 he was shot in the back, and, gravely ill, was invalided to England. The bullet had penetrated his spine and left him a paraplegic. With his condition slowly improving he asked to be sent home to Australia. Sadly, once he was on the ship back to Australia, his condition deteriorated and he died at sea of blood poisoning. Only the third oldest brother, John, survived his war service and returned to Australia.

The story of Frank and Harry Hale is another which has stuck with me. The brothers were farmers at Dorakin when they enlisted together in Wickepin in May 1915. Older brother Harry was drafted into the 28th Battalion and departed Australia in June. Younger brother Frank did not leave immediately, with two entries in his service record "teeth require attention" followed by "fit for service", the only clues as to why. Frank finally left in July as part of the 2nd Reinforcements of the 28th Battalion. From then on the brothers served side by side, first at Gallipoli and then the Western Front, until the battle of Pozieres cost both men their lives. On the 5th of August 1916 Harry was killed in action and Frank received a gunshot wound to his back. He developed Meningitis and died two weeks later. What a shock it must have been for the parents, to receive the news of their sons' deaths so close together.

Whilst war service is predominantly associated with men, we must not forget the service contribution of women. During the Second World War the Hodgson family from Yealering sent four of their children off to war. Although their three soldier sons, Bill, Jim and Dick, all returned home safely, such was not the case for their daughter Minnie. A trained nurse, who had worked at hospitals in Perth, she was Matron at the Kondinin Hospital when she decided to enlist in the Nursing service. In September 1941 Minnie embarked on a hospital ship for service in Singapore and Malaya. With the fall of Singapore it was decided to evacuate all nursing sisters back to Australia. Minnie was among the last contingent to leave on board the ill-fated S.S. Vyner Brook in February 1942, which was sunk by Japanese aircraft. Sadly her survival was short lived, when Minnie and the other nursing sisters were executed by the Japanese on Banka Island, despite being prisoners of war.

The impact of war is wide spread and does not differentiate or discriminate. Each man and woman on our Memorial Boards played a part in our history and as such deserves to be remembered and commemorated. Although their stories are only a hundred years old, time goes by so fast that it is important to tell them now, before more time elapses and no one is left to remember them.

My understanding of war, and the impact of war on everyone in the community, has broadened as a result of this research, and it is my hope that this book helps to keep alive the memory of these ordinary people, who lived through an extraordinary time.

ARMISTICE SERVICE

The Centenary of Armistice service was held on Sunday 11 November at the Wickepin War Memorial and was very well attended by locals and visitors to the town.

Shire President, Cr Julie Russell welcomed everyone who had gathered to commemorate the Silence of the Guns and the end of all hostilities on the Western Front between the Allied armies and the German armies of the Great War – World War 1 – by the signing of the Armistice.

The service also included the launch of **Fallen but not Forgotten**, 'a record of the soldiers of the Wickepin District who served their country between 1914 and 1995, with a focus on those who sacrificed their lives to shape our nation'. Local historian Stefie Green spent 10 years researching, collating and writing the book and gave an insightful overview of the book and her foray in to military history and how it was the starting point for her project. Stefie's book is available for purchase directly from the Shire Office. The cost of the book is \$35 plus \$15 postage if required.

A huge thank you to the shire staff and community volunteers who helped with the organising, preparation and assistance on the day.

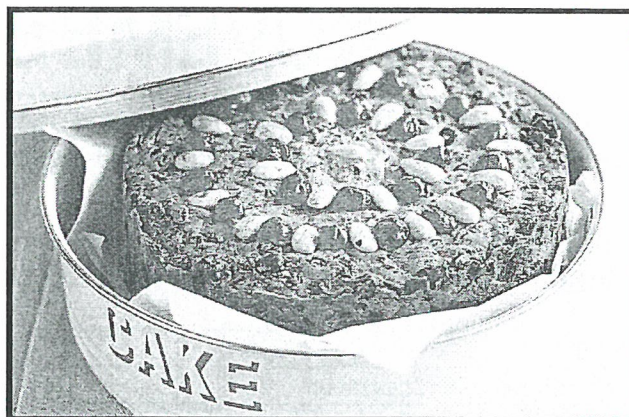

CHRISTMAS COOKERY

Christmas Cake

Ingredients

510g (3 cups) sultanas
265g (1 1/2 cups) Sunbeam flame raisins
155g (1 cup) currants
150g (1 cup) pitted dates, finely chopped
1 x 100g pkt red glaze cherries, quartered
75g (1/2 cup) Ocean Spray raisins
75g (1/2 cup) dried pineapple, finely chopped
50g (1/4 cup) mixed peel
185ml (3/4 cup) brandy
2 teaspoons finely grated orange rind
Melted butter, to grease
250g butter, at room temperature
200g (1 cup, firmly packed) brown sugar
4 eggs
300g (2 cups) plain flour
2 teaspoons mixed spice
Blanched almonds, to decorate
Red glaze cherries, extra, halved, to decorate
2 tablespoons brandy, extra



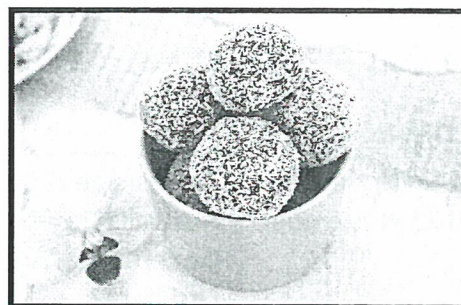
Recipe from Taste

If you're after an old-fashioned Christmas Cake, look no further. This fruity cake will be the star attraction at any festive feast!

Combine sultanas, raisins, currants, dates, cherries, raisins, pineapple, mixed peel, brandy and orange rind in a large bowl. Cover with plastic wrap and set aside, stirring occasionally, for 2 days to macerate. Preheat oven to 150°C. Brush a round 22cm (base measurement) cake pan with melted butter to lightly grease. Line the base and side with 3 layers of non-stick baking paper. Use an electric beater to beat butter and sugar in a bowl until pale and creamy. Add eggs, 1 at a time, beating well between each addition until just combined. Add butter mixture to fruit mixture and stir to combine. Add flour and mixed spice and stir until well combined. Spoon into prepared pan and smooth the surface. Lightly tap pan on benchtop to release any air bubbles. Arrange almonds and cherries on top of the cake. Bake in oven, covered with foil, for 2 hours 40 minutes to 3 hours or until a skewer inserted into centre comes out clean. Drizzle hot cake with extra brandy. Set aside to cool before turning out.

EASY RUM BALLS

250g chocolate ripple biscuits, finely crushed.
250 g Scotch finger biscuits, finely crushed.
1/4 cup cocoa, sifted.
1/4 cup rum
395g can sweetened condensed milk.
1 cup shredded coconut.



Sift cocoa into a bowl. Stir in all ingredients, except coconut. Wet hands and then roll into bite-sized balls. Roll in coconut to coat. Refrigerate for at least an hour before serving.

Celebrating 90 years of clay court tennis at Toolibin

A club's dedication to its sport and its community was highlighted recently when Toolibin Tennis Club celebrated its 90th anniversary.

Over 130 people travelled to the small club, south of Wickepin, to help commemorate 90 years of playing on clay tennis courts. Toolibin Tennis Club is believed to be one of the last tennis clubs in WA, if not Australia, which still plays on locally-sourced clay. When the club was founded in 1928, it built two courts on the existing site using pick and shovel and horse and dray work. Among the families which were founding members of the club were the Hoyles, the Northwoods, the Gobles and the Lavaters. The club started off its first season with a membership of 46 – 33 senior players and 13 junior players. As club membership grew so did the number of courts with a further two courts being added in 1934 and a final two being added in 1953.

While many clubs converted their courts to hotmix or synthetic grass surfaces, Toolibin remained true to clay. In 1953 courts 1 and 2 were relaid with colas (bitumen) surfaces. However these proved unpopular and difficult to maintain and so in early 1960s they and the other four clay courts were resurfaced using white gum or salmon gum clay. These courts are still in use today and according to current club president, Andrew Borthwick the fact that the club has continued to play on clay is "testimony to the pride and sense of ownership past and present members have in their club".

"It is the efforts of past and present members at the countless busy bees, pennant matches and social days which have kept the club going. The club has recently had an influx of new members who will help keep it going for another 10 years at least".

Toolibin Tennis Club competes in the Dumbleyung – Toolibin Association pennant competition. It is a competition which formed in 1962 between the clubs of Dongolocking, Tincurrin, Dumbleyung and Toolibin. As the smaller clubs of Dongolocking and Tincurrin folded, the competition expanded to include clubs to the east. Today Toolibin players enjoy a robust pennant competition against clubs from Newdegate, Lake Grace, Tarin Rock, Kukeerin, Dudinin and Dumbleyung.

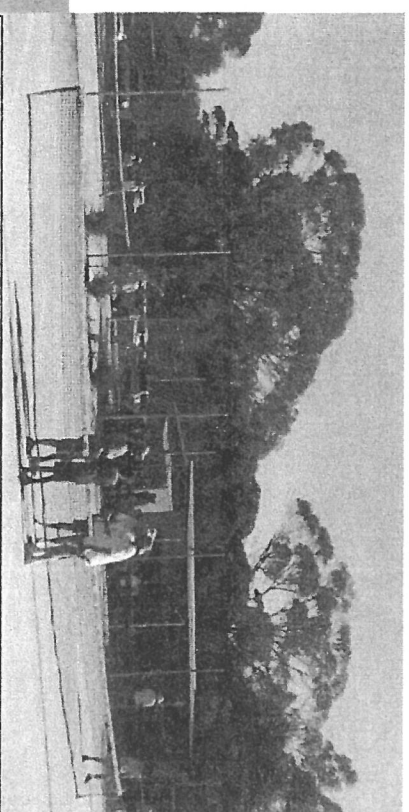
Of the large crowd which gathered to mark Toolibin's 90th anniversary, some 50 people had also come to play – keeping all six courts busy across the day.

Some hadn't played tennis for over 40 years and the wooden racquets they brought with them, once dusted off, proved more than able to keep up with their more modern counterparts.

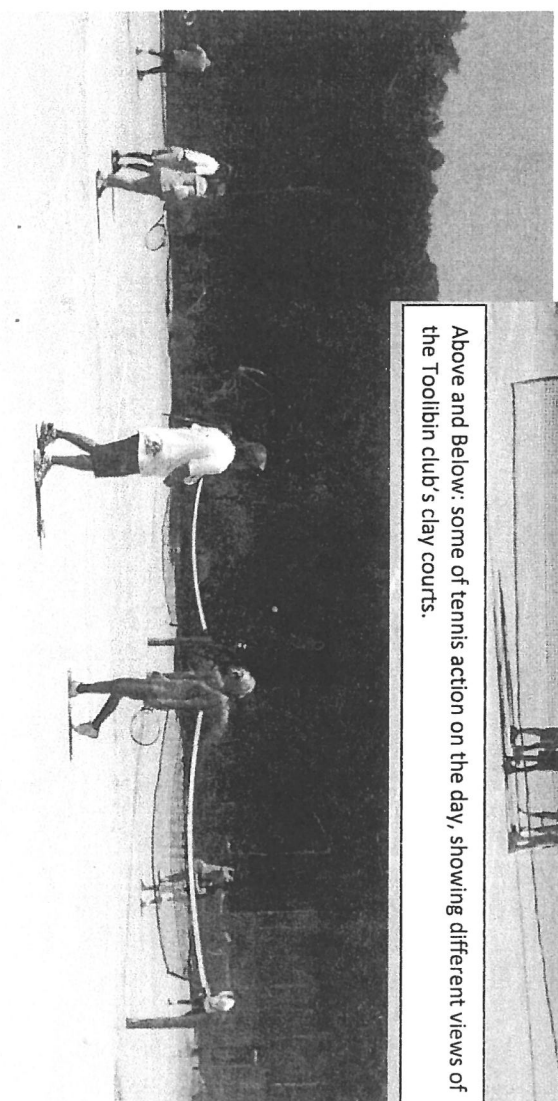

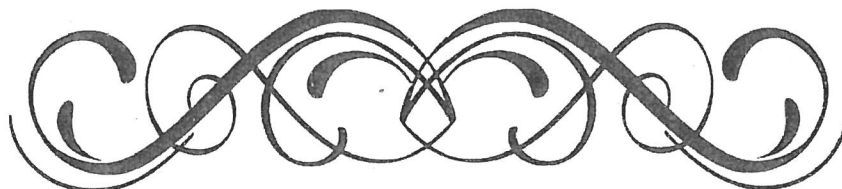

Free mammograms for WICKEPIN women

If you are a woman aged 40 or over you can access the FREE screening mammography service in Wickepin. BreastScreen WA's mobile service will be located at Wickepin Sports Club, beside bowling green, Wogolin Road from 27/11/2018 to 29/11/2018.

Breast cancer is the most common life threatening cancer for women and one in eight women in Australia will develop breast cancer in their lifetime.

Having a screening mammogram (breast x-ray) every two years significantly increases the chance of a woman surviving breast cancer and reduces the amount of treatment required. More than 75% of breast cancers occur in women over the age of 50. Research shows that screening is most effective for this age group.

BreastScreen WA's Medical Director Dr Elizabeth Wylie, said screening mammography was the most effective method for early detection of breast cancer.

"Screening every two years is vitally important to increase the chance of a breast cancer being detected when it is too small to feel or be noticed. Finding a cancer at this early stage often means that the breast cancer is small and more treatable".

"A free screening mammogram is one of the best things that women can do to look after their health. Breast screening saves lives and only takes 20 minutes," said Dr Wylie.

Screening mammograms may detect 70-90% of breast cancers.

Any woman with a persistent change in a breast should see her doctor immediately.

The oldest boy looked thoughtful.

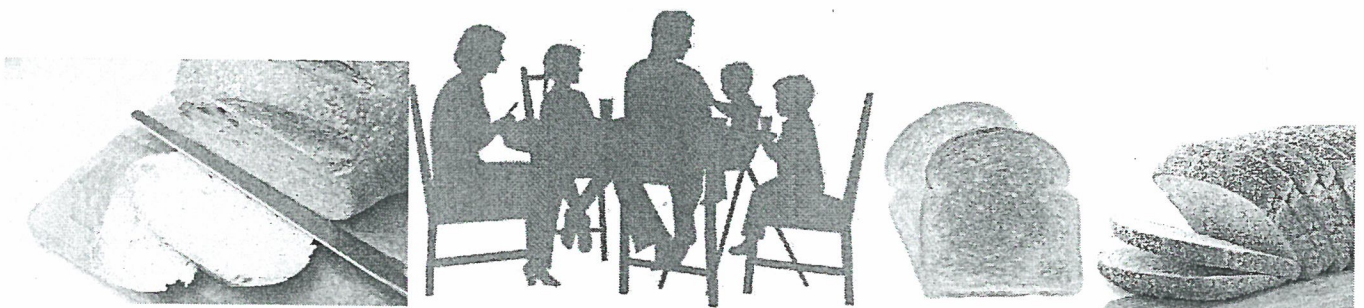
“But that was ages ago, Dad, conditions are better these days.”

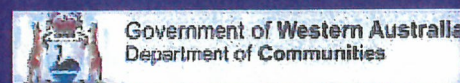

Firearm Licencing Checks

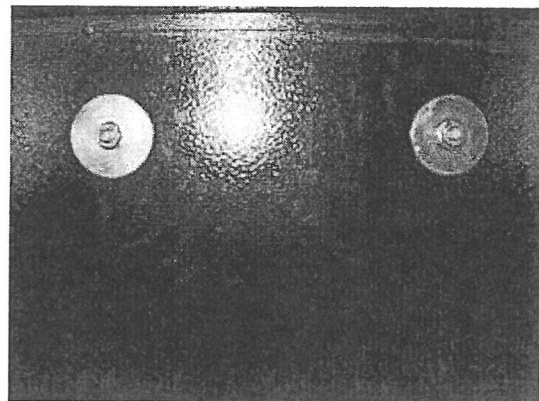
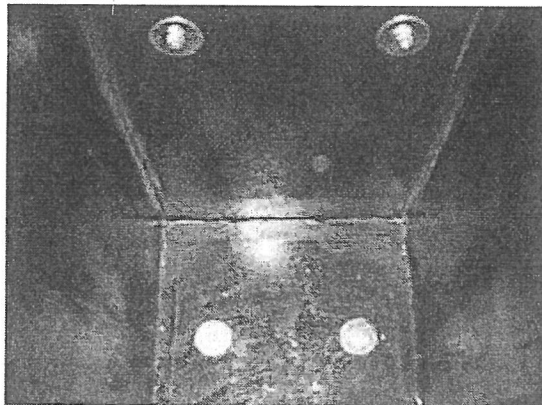
As some of you will be aware there is a current operation underway to check on Firearms Licence Holders and their compliance with safe storage of their firearms in the Shire of Wickepin.

As part of the operation we will be checking the following common issues:

- Does the firearm cabinet meet current construction compliance (more on this below)?
- Is the cabinet locked and keys stored safely away from cabinet in a location known only to the licensee?
- Are all firearms on your licence present or accounted for and locked away in the cabinet?
- Are the firearms stored unloaded (you are not allowed to store loaded firearms in your cabinet).
- Is the ammunition locked away in a separate lockable compartment from the firearms, either within or separate from the firearms cabinet (you are not allowed to store ammunition with your firearms).

Cabinet Construction:

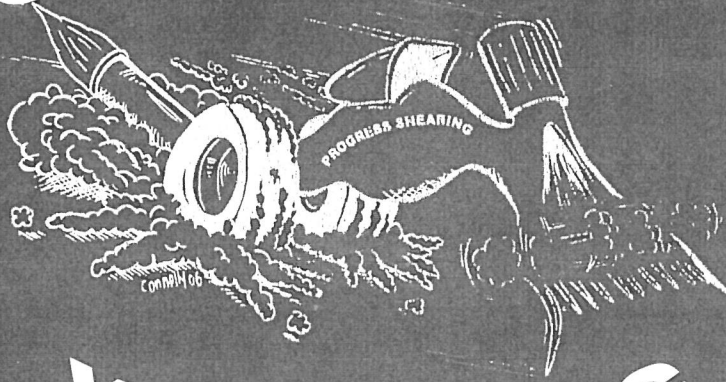
We are checking that fixings are at least 8x75mm and there are two on two separate sides. Two of these should fix the cabinet to the floor and the other two to a wall, preferably brick or something of substance. The washers on these fixings should also be at least 40mm x 40mm x 2mm. Examples of which are below.



We have conducted 13 checks in the last week and approximately a third of those have had issues, some more serious than others. We will be continuing to conduct checks over the next 4 weeks, if you are aware of any issues you may have, please endeavour to rectify them prior to our inspection.
