



# WICKEPIN POLICE

#### STATION

Wickepin Police would like to thank community members who attended the recent 'Coffee with a Cop'. It was very pleasing to see so many enjoying a quite cuppa and asking some very interesting questions.

One of those asked was in relation to electric wheel chairs or gophers. Put simply when travelling in outdoor areas under the Road Traffic Code, you must follow the same rules as pedestrians:

- Where a footpath is provided, you must use it,
- If crossing a road, you must use the shortest possible path,
- Before you begin to cross a road, you should make sure that you have a safe entry onto the footpath on the other side,
- Where a footpath is not provided, you may travel along the edge of the roadway, unless the road rules prohibit you from doing so. You must travel along the right edge of the roadway, facing towards oncoming traffic.
- You should not travel along the edge of the roadway unless you absolutely have to and the design of the motorised wheelchair allows it to be safely driven on the expected terrain. Hopefully that clears up any confusion.

We were very lucky to have Rod Thornton from 'Roadwise' along for the morning and he enlightened the 25 plus strong crowd with a humorous overview of recent media advertisements and gave background to some of the important facts and figures.

The one that perhaps stuck in my mind was that sadly the majority of road crashes and the resultant trauma that occurs are generally put down to non-enforceable matters. That means that despite our best efforts the cause of the crash was something we couldn't stop in the first place. If you let that sink in for a moment I'm sure you'd agree, that's really tragic.

Despite that, rest assured that Wickepin Police will be actively patrolling and trying our best to identify and speak with any road users who may need a quiet word or perhaps some other form of education. In particular, 'Hoon' driving is extremely dangerous and annoying to the community so we are happy to receive information that may assist us in prosecuting these irresponsible members of our community. The penalties are significant and may lead to a \$12,000 fine, imprisonment and a lifetime loss of license. Notwithstanding the costs and inconvenience that are associated with vehicle impoundment to top it off.

You may have noticed us out and about on Saturday with some help from our policing neighbours from Pingelly and Williams. We were very pleased to see that of the 110 contacts, no drivers tested positive to alcohol or drugs over the course of the day. The message will continue to be pushed that drink or drug driving will not be tolerated by our community.

Finally, please remember that even if our phone is diverted to Albany, we will always be advised of the job either by a direct phone call to the OIC's phone or if less urgent via an email so please if you think it's worth letting us know, make that call.

In the calm waters of the marina, the old salt sat in his ageing wooden boat, remembering. His thoughts turned to the long ago when he travelled the world's oceans through wild seas, winds and weather. He had loved the salt air, the spray and the excitement of visiting foreign countries and meeting their people. He was caught up in a war and suffered the results of it for the rest of his life. Ultimately his health failed and he no longer had the energy to go out to sea fishing as he used to do. His one consolation was to just sit alone in the boat on sunny days and feel the gentle rocking of the vessel. Sometimes he did some painting. At other times he would splice some rope or check his mooring lines.

One day a solitary seagull alighted on the gunwale and sat there eyeing him. At first when the man moved, she would fly up, then settle back to her chosen spot.

In the months that followed, a similar pattern developed and the old salt looked forward to seeing the bird. She always came alone.

"I shall call you Annie," he said and one day he photographed her sitting watching him. Later he placed her picture in his album amongst photos of his other friends.

The time came when the man's strength failed and he could no longer visit the boat. Eventually his life came to an end and a few weeks later, according to his wishes, his ashes were scattered out at sea by his boating friends.

During the outward journey to the deeper waters of the ocean, a solitary gull accompanied the large rescue vessel to its destination.

After the simple ceremony, the gull appeared to escort the vessel back to the marina where it alighted on the gunwale of the old wooden boat.

We shall never know, but perhaps it was Annie's way of saying a final farewell.






Heart of the Town: A Mindalby Outback Romance- Multiple Authors ~



#### Chicken, leek and mushroom casserole

#### Ingredients

- 8 (about 2.2kg) chicken thigh pieces
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 250g rindless bacon rashers, coarsely chopped
- 2 leeks, pale section only, washed, ends trimmed, cut into 2cm-thick slices
- 400g button mushrooms, halved
- 2 garlic cloves, crushed
- 2 tablespoons plain flour

- 250ml (1 cup) chicken liquid stock
- 250ml (1 cup) white wine
- 6 sprigs fresh thyme
- 125ml (1/2 cup) thickened cream
- Mashed potato, to serve



#### Method

Preheat oven to 180°C. Heat an ovenproof casserole dish over medium-high heat. Add half the chicken and cook for 3-4 minutes each side or until golden. Transfer to a plate. Repeat with the remaining chicken, reheating the dish between batches. Use kitchen paper to wipe the dish to remove excess fat. Heat oil in the dish over medium-high heat. Add the bacon, leek, mushroom and garlic and cook, stirring, for 5 minutes or until golden brown. Add the flour and cook, stirring, for 1 minute or until well combined. Add the stock, wine and thyme, and bring to the boil. Return the chicken to the dish. Cover and bake in oven for 1 hour or until the juices run clear when the chicken is pierced with a skewer. Use tongs to transfer the chicken to a plate. Transfer the remaining leek mixture to a medium saucepan. Add the cream and bring to the boil over medium-high heat. Cook for 5 minutes or until sauce thickens slightly. Divide the mash among serving plates and top with the chicken. Pour over the leek mixture to serve.

#### Maple Glazed Pears

50g unsalted butter, chopped 4 ripe pears halved, cored 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon https:

1/2 cup maple syrup cream or ice-cream to serve.



Melt butter in large non-stick frypan over a medium heat until bubbling. Add pears cut-side down. Cook for about 3 minutes until light golden underneath. Turn pears over. Sprinkle with cinnamon. Pour over maple syrup. Bring to boil. Gently boil for 3-5 minutes or until pears are tender. Spoon syrup over pears. Serve with cream or ice-cream.

#### gardening tips

Time to Prune!

Winter prune your rose bushes and spray with Lime Sulphur to help eliminate bacteria and fungal spores.


Prune stone fruit trees and spray with Copper Oxychloride to prevent against curly leaf and provide a broad spectrum barrier for other bacteria and fungi.

Veggie patch - keep the patch weed free and liquid fertilise as needed.













#### SMALL BUSINESSES TO BE PAID ON TIME, EVERY TIME

Small and family businesses in O'Connor will now receive payment for government contracts under \$1 million in 20 days.

Federal Member for O'Connor Rick Wilson said the Morrison Government is backing the 3.4 million small and family businesses that underpin Australia's economy by ensuring they get paid on time, boosting their cash flow and helping them grow.

"We understand the importance of cash flow to small businesses - cash flow is vital to each and every business. That is why we are doing everything we can to ensure businesses are paid on time," Mr Wilson said.

A report from Xero last month found half of all payments from big to small businesses were late, totalling more than \$115 billion a year.

"It is clear big business needs to do more to pay contracts on time and we will also continue to look at ways to improve this delay," Mr Wilson said.

"The Government is working to require large businesses tendering for Commonwealth contracts to match the 20-day payment terms.

"Also in development is an annual reporting framework requiring large businesses with over \$100 million turnover to publish information on how they pay small businesses.

"Our promise to small and family businesses is clear, we want them to pay less tax, cut red tape and have better access to finance to help grow their businesses."
